

CHEVRON TO BUILD NEW STATION Standard Oil Co., has just signed a 15-year lease with option on the corner of Alpine Blvd. and S. Marshall Road, for a large new service station, reports Bill Brown of Brown Realty here, owner of that southeast corner.

Preliminary work started March 1 on the lot which fronts 157' on Alpine Blvd., with a depth of 120'. The old gum trees are to be removed, permits for which caused some delay. The pioneer house which the Browns occupied for their realty office, will be razed to make way for the modern station. Over \$80,000 will be invested.




# HORSE TALK

Our little breakfast and horseshow had to be postponed again because the YC ring was too wet to hold any gymkhana events. Will let you know when it has been rescheduled.


Mark and Ginney Schutzer are working on their 8-months old colt and hope to have him ready for the halter class in Viejas Days May 10 and 11.


CUBIC MAN BUYS, MOVES HERE



A big change is due here on March 13 or 17, tentative opening dates for the fine new I-8 freeway, says C. Cooling, chief highway engineer, who Monday handed the Sun this specially prepared map for this newspaper.

On the day traffic is switched from Hwy 80-- Alpine Blvd-- over to the new route, a blockade on 80 will close all traffic between the Cleveland National Forest sign, and Willows Road. Also closed for the time being is the Willows Interchange, where the unfinished bridge will be erected across the closed portion, plainly shown on the map at right, or east end.

The rest is easy; for going east to the Willows Willows Road, access roads, and points eastward, use the Tavern Road Interchange. You will also have access to I-8 going west at



the Tavern ramp.

Peutz Valley folks will go under the freeway and west to Dunbar Lane Off Ramp to get on the freeway going west. Sounds simple, but study it, says the engineer. And if you make an error, never try to turn around or go on the median. That might get you a ticket, or an accident!






LIVELY OAKS DOINGS
