WHY HIDE THE TRUTH IN SCHOOL GRADING?

Editor's Note: This candidate for the Grossmont JC School Board has gone on record as opposing the proposed change in the grading system where a student would no longer receiving a failing (F) mark.

The grading change is being promoted by two campus clubs.

Present regulations about withdrawing seem reasonable, since students are given more than 3 months to withdraw from college courses. The argument in support of giving no F's seems to be based on the premise that it is psychologically or emotionally damaging to fail a course and that some students can not enjoy one in which they might fail. I would advise these student groups to propose to the Board of Education that a system of auditing be allowed in which the term "audit" would appear on the grade card.

This would not lower standards of the college, and would give students the

chance to attend a course they might not otherwise attend.

The suggested change appears to be harmful:

- 1- Students get no F's, just D's (barely passing) or W (withdrawal) at their option.
- 2- Academic standards would be hard to evaluate for transfer purposes.
- 3. There is always going to be a low grade but why make it possible for everyone to pass? Students actually failing a course should have to repeat to learn more, and no college credit given. Do we want future doctors, etc. to be trained where it is impossible to fail?
- 4. Since the F students can receive a D, do the former D students receive a C?
- 5. Do the former C students receive B's?
- 6. What happens to the good student who receives higher marks? Is he being penalized?

The answers to these questions can only be detrimental to the reputation of our college and to the serious students.

Who is in favor of the proposed change?

- 1. Poor students who get low grades.
- 2. Lazy students, who have ability, but won't do the work.
- 3. Student political groups who are interested in disrupting the academic community and who are seeking to promote a cause to gain recruits and publicity.

Changing the standards allows some of these students to stay on the campus to agitate rather than to study.

As a candidate for the board, I stand firmly opposed to this sort of thing and do not want our college to be known as "Drop-Out-U". It could lose its accreditation and reputation since anyone who couldn't pass at other colleges, could pass at Grossmont.

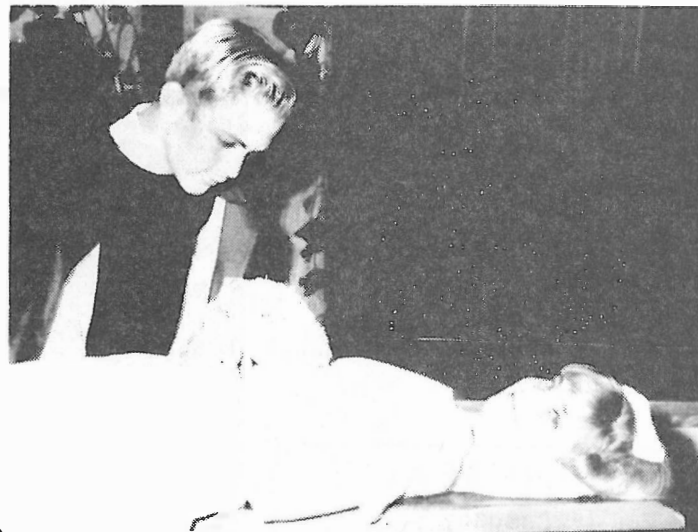
I want ours to be a place that former students would be proud to say, "I went to Grossmont College".



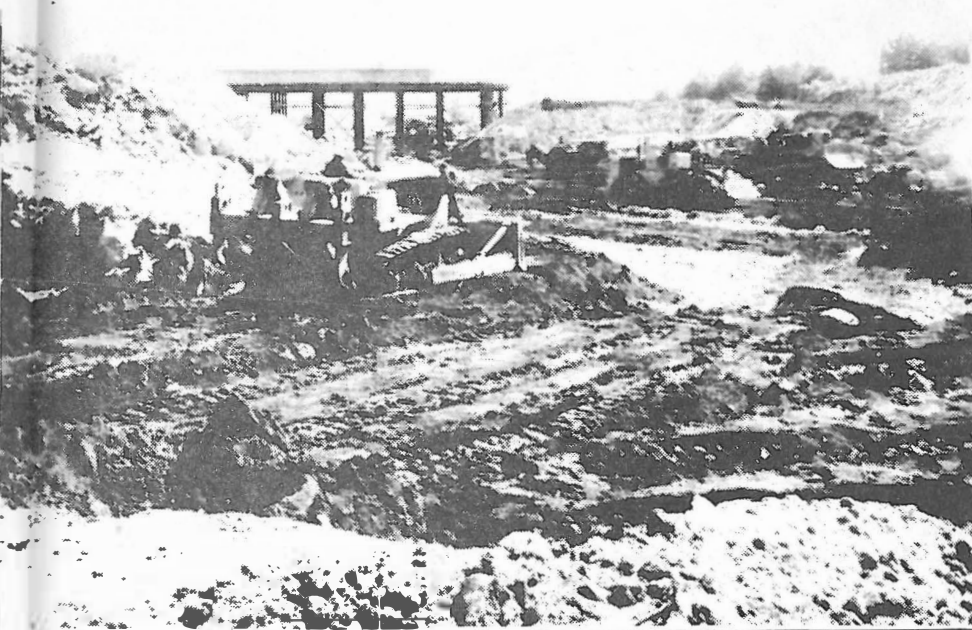
