

EDITORIAL

COST OF FOOD, MONEY, LUMBER, TOO HIGH!

Recently banks jumped prime interest rate to $7\frac{1}{2}$ %- - approaching usurywhich means that mortgage interest rises also.

Our Congressman, Lionel Van Deerlin, D-SD, former news and TV reporter, and a staunch booster for this area, says that these soaring costs are "threatening to price average SD county folks out of the homebuying market".

He told the House Subcommittee on Housing that "matters are reaching the desperation point;" submitted testimony in response to an invitation by the subcommittee, which is investigating problems besetting the building industry.

"The cost of lumber once accounted for about $6\frac{1}{2}$ % of the price of a home," Van Deerlin said. "Now it represents nearly 13%." And in a recent 14-day period, the price of lumber in California shot up \$10 per 1000 board feet, or 7%.

In the past year, increases in lumber and wood products have boosted the

"The trend is obvious - and ominous," he said. "Fewer people are going to be able to buy homes, and many honest contractors will be driven out of business when they cannot make good on wildly fluctuating material costs."

He said Congress has a duty to protect both buyers and builders from the "devastating effects" of inflation.

Every month the food index goes up. A few short years ago we thought a nickle for an apple was high but now a big apple costs 15ϕ or more! And all fruits and produce are higher than ever.

Well do I remember the soaring prices just before that tragic Oct. 29, 1929 when the depression hit and so many jumped out of windows.


A MBULANCE SERVICE OFFERED





SPRING THIS YEAR is bringing more than blossoms to the rural community of Alpine. Sometime in April, massive road-building machines will complete Interstate 8 through the town, making it just 30 freeway miles from San Diego.

Although Alpine has become easier to reach due to road improvements over the years, it has always seemed remote from city life. The freeway will speed up development of the area, but Alpine is likely to remain a refuge for people who like fresh air and horses.

Homesteaders first settled in Alpine around 1860, when the community was known as the Viejas stop on the stage line from Lakeside to the gold mines at Julian. The name was derived from 4.180-foot Viejas Mountain, northeast of town. One of the settlers said the countryside reminded him of the Swiss Alps, and in 1900, the residents decided to change the name officially to Alpine Center.

piratory troubles came to Alpine for the relief its mild weather promised. To this day, the local newspaper, The Alpine Sun, says on its masthead, "Best Climate in the U.S. by Government Report." And the Sun's editor adds, "When the weather is bad here, it's worse everywhere else."

Horseback riding is a popular activity, and the big event of the year is Viejas Days Horse Show (May 10 and 11), which draws entries from as far away as Phoenix.

Despite its name, Alpine is not on a mountaintop. Elevation of the town ranges from 1,800 to 2,600 feet, which the Chamber of Commerce points out is above the fog, beyond the smog and, most of the time, below the snow level.

The 4,300 residents of Alpine include retirees, health seekers, poultry ranchers and local businessmen. Completion of the freeway should bring more people who will live in Alpine and commute to jobs elsewhere. As a consequence, the pace of housing construction has stepped up. Further gains to the economy are expected as newcomers are drawn by Alpine's relaxed country living.




