

# EDITORIAL

### CARS KILL MORE IN YEAR THAN WAR DOES!

We are indebted to Travelers Insurance for this surprising material which may warn some careless drivers, and save lives, right here.

1968 was an ugly year for Americans. Tragedy of spectacular magnitude became a frequent front page occurance. But a quieter national calamity took its dreadful toll on all the days before, during and after the Tet offensive in Vietnam, the riots, the assassinations.

It was "quiet" only because it was not concentrated in a single place at a single time. There was no focus to put this misery on the front page. To the families and friends of 55,330 killed in auto accidents, however, it was the ultimate calamity. To the 4,400,000 victims of injury, it was hard-core agony. The economic loss, about \$13.5 billion, was an appalling waste.

This view of 1968 is contained in the annual booklet of highway accident statistics from Travelers Insurance,

The 1968 highway toll followed a year that saw a leveling off in the number of highway deaths and injuries. In 1967 approximately 53,000 lives were lost in motor vehicle mishaps- - 4,200,-000 persons were injured.

Why the increase? Was it because Americans were lulled by the "improvement" of the preceeding year?

There are, perhaps, as many reasons as there are people to voice opinions.

Whatever the reasons, the tragedy remains. More than 55,300 persons were killed and 4,400,000 injured.




"The 1969 Queen must be a student residing or attending school in the Inland Empire area" said Joe Knapp, contest chairman.






CAROLINE BALCH WALKER


