



An auto of ancient vintage puffed and wheezed up to a toll gate. "Fifty cents," the attendant said. "Sold!" cried the driver.






"I thought that was pretty nice" said Betty, "and rewarded him." Carl has a wife and seven kids, but believes in the old golden rule", she adds.

The Hillbilly Band will play at Alpine Convalescent Center on June 19 for the patients. Word was received that John Reynolds is improving in an EC rest home.




