POSTOFFICE BULGING AT SEAMS

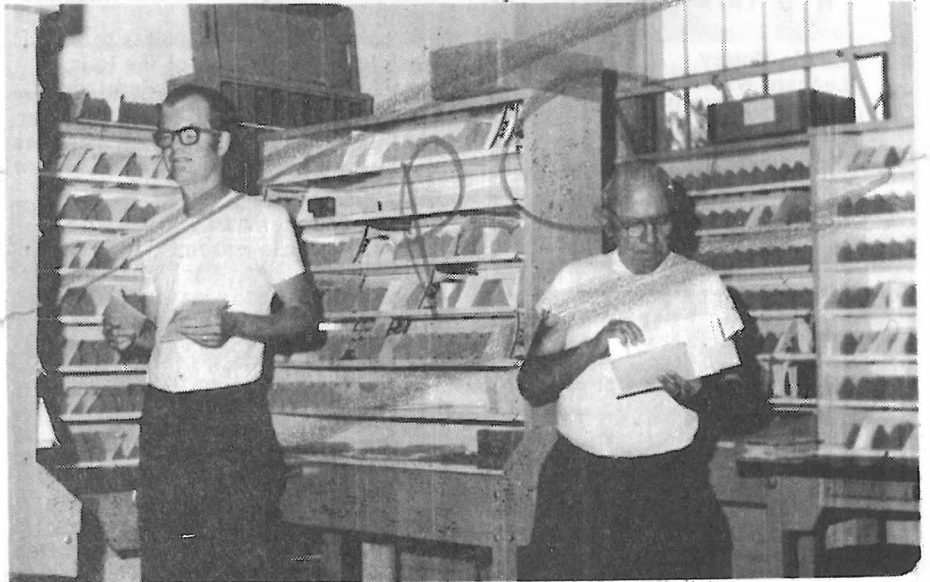

BOARD ADOPTS NEW BUDGET

Trustees of the Alpine Union School District at the last session adopted the fiscal year budget for 1969-70 of \$467-211, up from last year's total of \$458-949.

Tax rate of \$1.98, the legal maximum, will remain, says Supt. Paul Clay. This was his last meeting after 6 years' in charge. He resigned, effective Sept. 1, goes north.

The board formally ratified the contract of W. Edward Browning with salary of \$15,500 a year. He will be in charge when Clay departs.

EDITORIAL

STULL FOR MORE EFFECTIVE CAMPUS CONTROLS



California's legislature is going to put some teeth into the law to restrict unlawful activities on campuses.

It approved the proposal of a measure developed by the Assembly Sub-Committee on Educational Environment, of which Assemblyman John Stull, R-Leucadia, of this district, is chairman.

"This is the initial response to the public's demand for more effective controls on campus disorders", he says.

"Hopefully, the proposed law will solve the problems because it gives administrators the necessary tools to enforce school regulations", he adds.

"If administrators continue to be

hesitant about using such tools, I intend to return to next year's session with additional mandatory requirements," says Stull.

He deplors the hesitancy of officials to use existing guidelines in controlling such disorders on their campuses. He authored the bill, now on the governor's desk, which calls for forfeiture of state aid to students who are convicted of unlawful conduct at school.

"It is reasonable to assume that students who receive tax-supported scholarships and grants", he points out, "should be law-abiding and when they refuse to conform then they should be refused financial assistance."

The bill also permits the state to reimburse local agencies for police expenses in quelling disturbances which is only right since many cities and counties are using their own local tax monies to uphold law and order on state campuses.

Stull's bill also requires schools to adopt rules, and penalties with swift punishment. It also allows the school to declare a state of emergency in riots and so on, and act accordingly.

It looks like we should follow a get tough policy, when the state approves of such a measure. Thanks Mr. Stull! --Cl.

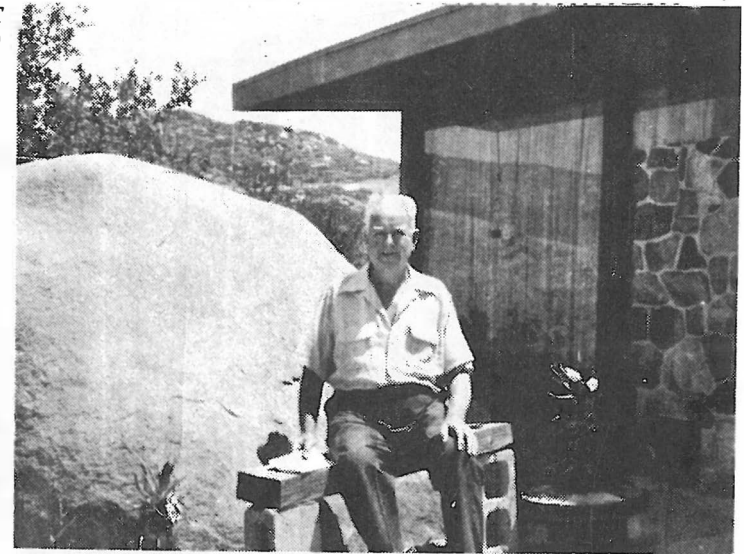

TWO DIE IN VILLA FIRE

A man and a woman burned to death in a fast fire Saturday morning in a cottage at Alpine Villa, 1539 Tavern Rd. The man was Mike Ambrose, 23, ex-

navyman, attendant at Earl's Gulf Station, who lived alone in the small cottage. The woman is still unidentified. Coroner's deputy, Robt. Gillespie said the woman was burned so badly no identification was possible, and no missing persons were reported.

The blaze was reported at 5:13 a. m. by Mrs. J. Wm. Clark, who lives across the street. Several others turned in alarms, but the quick run of volunteers under Chief Dale Bennet was too late to save the people.

Cause was said to be careless smoking. The woman's body was found on a bed, while Ambrose was in the shower where he apparently fled, turned on the water to evade the intense heat of the fast burning frame building.

"We can't praise our volunteer firemen enough" said Mrs. Jeanne Rhea, manager of the Villa, owned by Jack Katz.

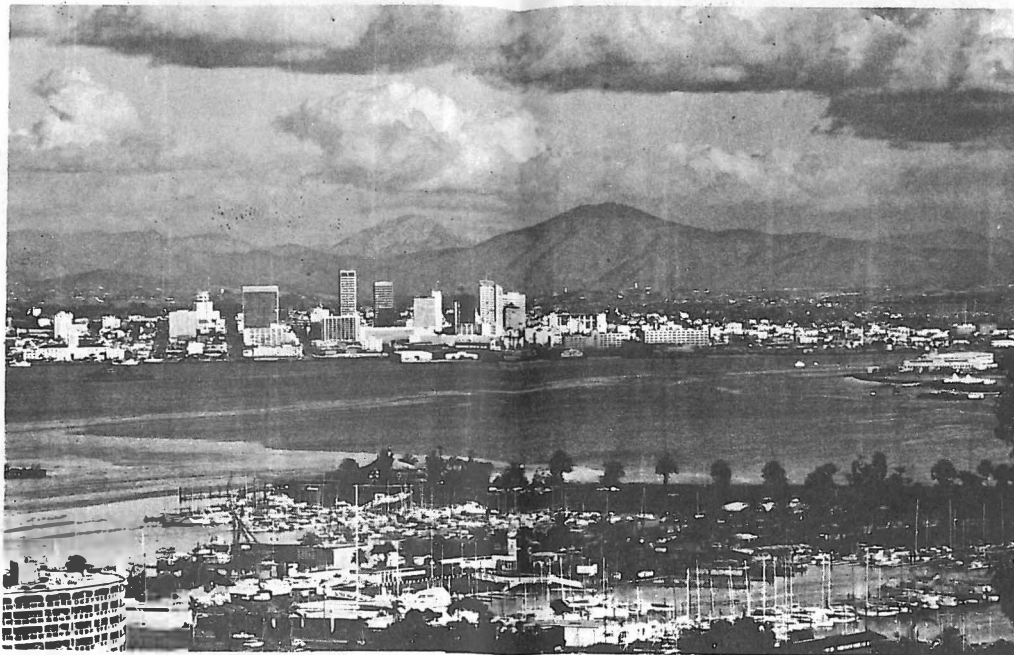

The board found that the ground water basin could not hold sufficient to keep the lake unfiltered from effluent, however well reclaimed.

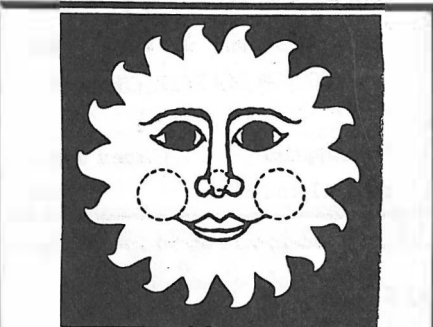

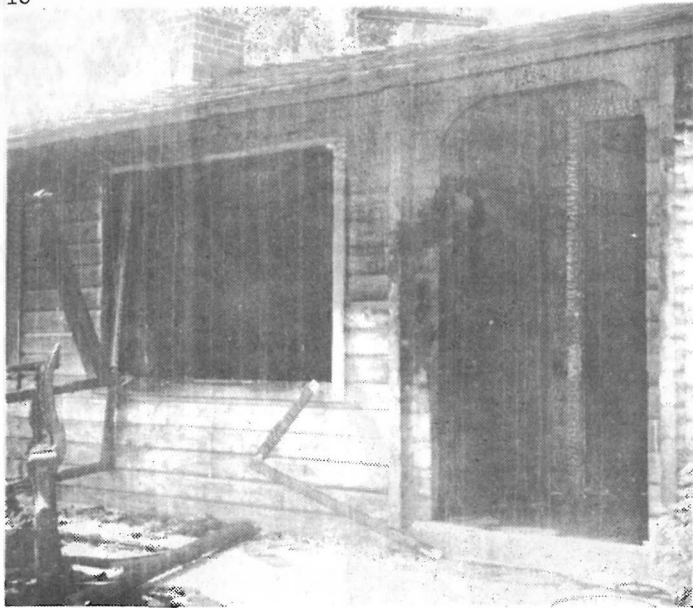
