RIO TAX RATE TAKES A DROP

The improvement district of Rio SD MWD which serves Alpine, Flinn Springs, Dehesa, Harbison Canyon and the area adjoining La Cresta, will enjoy a tax rate of \$1.98, down 2¢ from last year, according to Eng. Mgr. Ed Houser. The motion to lower it was made by Director Al Adams of Alpine, who represents this area.

The 1968-9 whole district budget was \$489,618. The drop this year is due to the fact that \$120,000 for building new water lines in the Canyon was in last year's budget. The reduction was partly offset by additional allocations for water purchase.

Rio's overall budget of \$449,446, compared with \$362,702 for last year. Increase was due to an added \$70,000 for buying water which reflects both increased demand due to population rise, and increased wholesale cost of water, Houser adds.

BOARD RAISES SCHOOL PAY

At Monday's session of district trustees they voted an 8% raise in teacher pay following a lengthy discussion with teacher representatives.

Later the meeting was adjourned for a closed executive session. It was reopened by Chas. C. Campbell, president, and a raise of 6.2% was voted for administrators: the superintendent and two principals.

The session closed after voting to re-advertise for transportation bids on contract for the next five years. Bids will be opened here on Sept. 8.

It was the 2nd session for the new district superintendent, W. Edward Browning. Outgoing Supt. Paul Clay sat with him to advise.

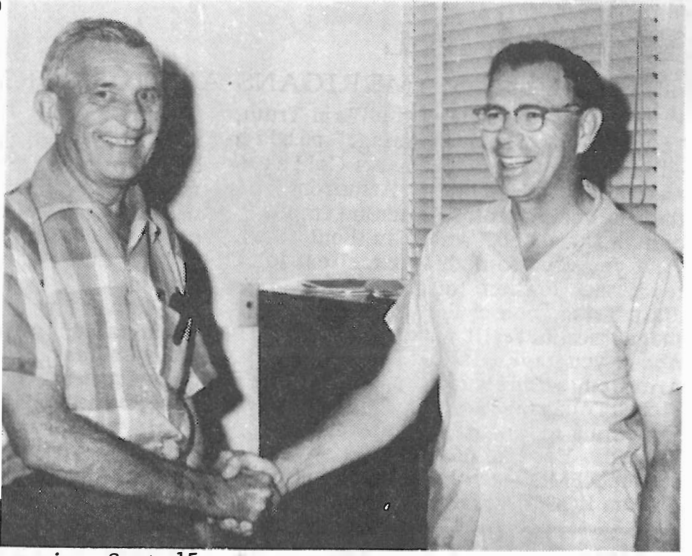

The astute authors of this Christian magazine article sum it up in five major causes for the decline and fall of the Roman Empire, deduced from the writings of Edward Gibbon, the great writer on that topic, and other historians of the Roman world.

They are: the breakdown of the family and increase in divorce; the spiraling rise of taxes, and extravagance; the mounting craze for pleasure and the brutalization of sports; increase in armaments to fight steadily increasing threats of war, and the decay of religion into myriad and confusing forms, leaving the people without a uniform guide.

All of those five factors are rampant here and in other lands. It is, to say the least, a frightening warning! CI.

INDEPENDENT COMES TO EMPIRE

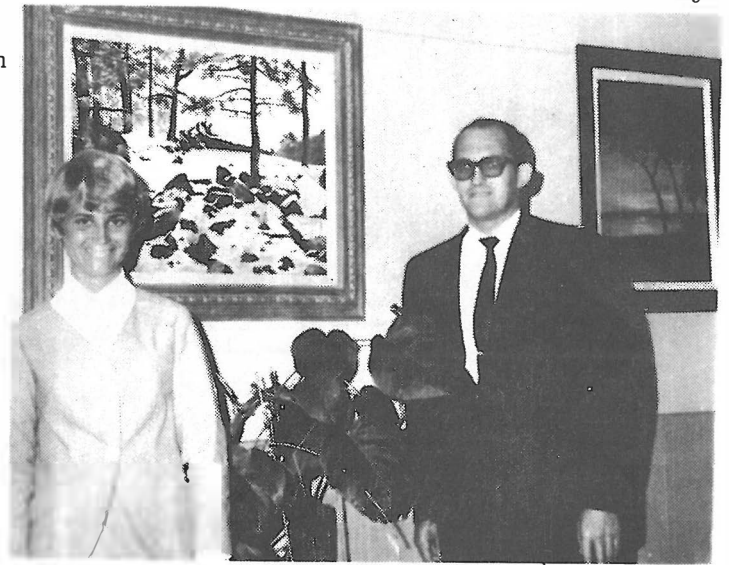

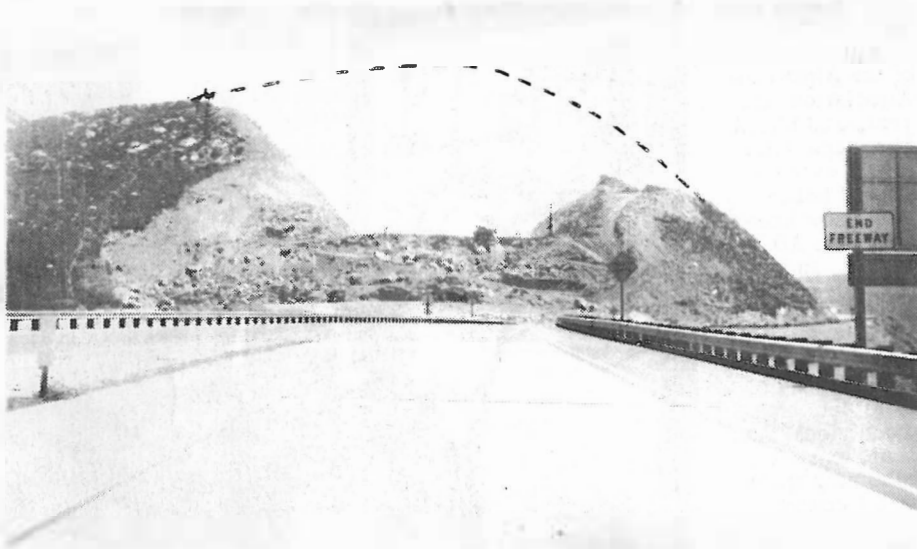

Dotted line shows outline of former mountain at Deadman's Curve on Hwy 80. Morrison-Knudsen firm is on time moving 1½ million yards of rock and earth to fill beyond curve and this side to cover old Hwy 80.

Another 1½ million yards will fill west of bridge over the Sweetwater, in photo on next page. That huge quantity is being moved west from hill on horizon.

Giant crane is poised over big steel girder 13' x 125' and weighing 36 ton which is on large trailer. Traffic had to be stopped on the curve to allow its passage. It is gingerly swung into place on concrete uprights, one end being supported temporarily by steel structure till other girder is placed, then the two ends are welded together to make one long piece of I-beam steel to support freeway lanes.

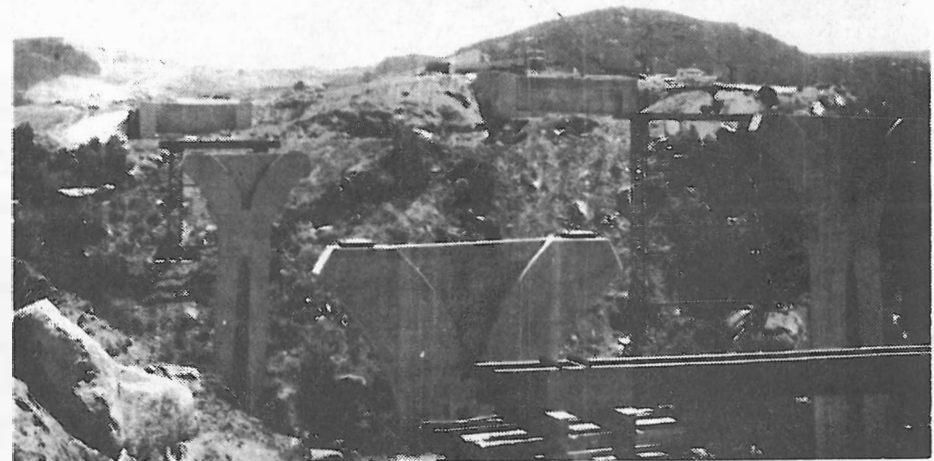

GIRDERS FOR I-8 SLOW TRAFFIC

Delays of around 30 minutes in EC at W. Main and I-8 are slated for the next three weeks, say police of that city. It is to allow detrainment of huge 10 to 13 foot by 125 foot girders for the Sweetwater bridge going in now. The steel bridge material is being routed up to Japatul Road, then down the construction road to the bridge site where an enormous crane hoists them into position on the bridge supports where two sections are welded to make one span across the chasm.

Motorists are advised to use alternate routes from around 6 a. m. to 6:30 in EC, says Sgt. Jerry Earp of the EC police.

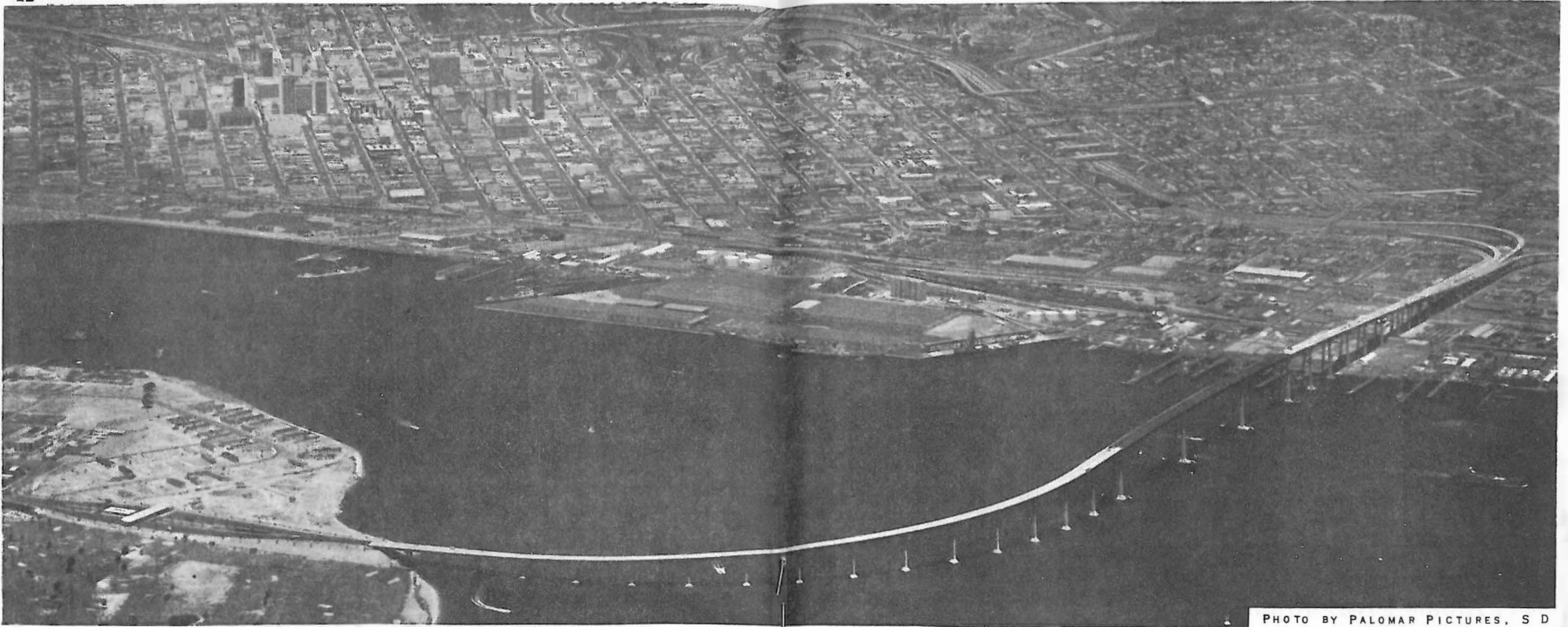

Little Sean Newton celebrated his 7th birthday Wednesday with a party at his home on Tavern Road, all report a lot of fun with nice presents for him.

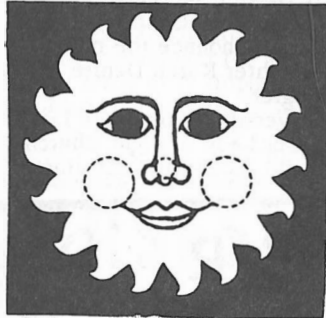

WANT TO ZONE ALL COUNTY

The supervisors and planning office are working on a new idea that will zone all unincorporated areas at an early date.

Planning Director Dan Cherrier sees a minimal residential lot size of 2½ acres in a new concept of Limited Control (LC). Special use permits would be available for smaller lots, or other uses than special service businesses.

Supervisor Boney says that maybe a business use should have to get permits with a fee and hearing. Cherrier and Chief Adm. Officer Fred Morey will report in 30 days on suggested alternatives. Presently the only zoning they have is A-1-1 which is a sort of "holding" zone, so that a lot of undesirable things might not be started.

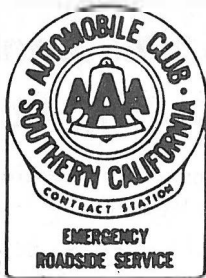

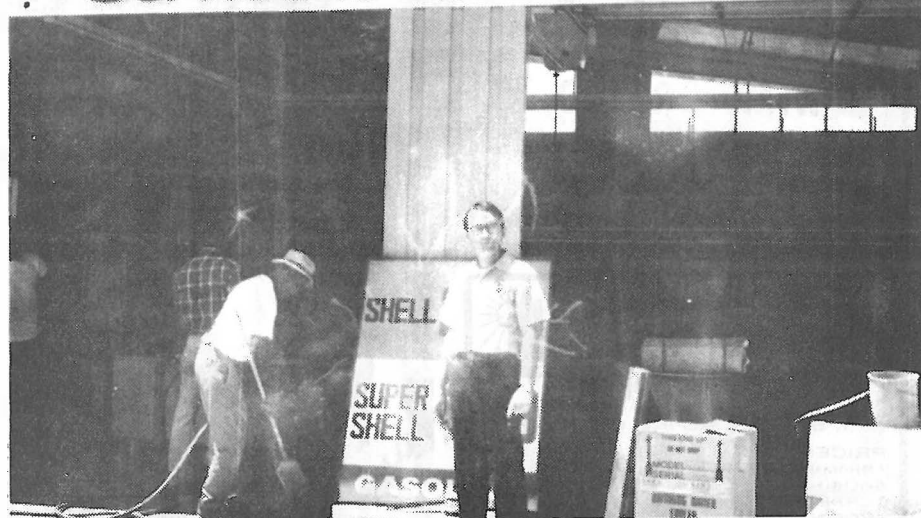
