EDITORIAL

SMALL MEN GET LESS AS BIG ONES GET MORE!

While America stands, almost shuddering, on the brink of what could be a mighty depression, those that run the country go blithely along with but little thought of what lies ahead for the little man as well as the big one.

Barney Ratliff, owner of the property that the government advertised for bids on to build a much needed new post-office here, has just had news that Alpine is among the 3 out of 4 communities that are being denied such improvement due to Nixon's cutback of 75% in new buildings.

Yet the President and legislators voted themselves big raises in salaries. So did a lot of other lesser officials. The country somehow withstands higher taxes, rising living costs, and the phenomenal pay increases of artisans. But there must come a day of reckoning.

Today the country, especially burgeoning California, needs more building of all kinds, yet high interest has choked it greatly.

Some time ago the state tried to reform the inheritance tax appraisal



system which pours close to \$3 million a year from poor heirs into the coffers of lawyers appointed as appraisers of estates. That also costs government administrative bills of \$165,000 yearly. This is just one of the many spoils systems we endure.

The Vietnam war with its billions in plums from logistics, the black market, and other war goodies, is enough to make anyone mad, let alone the kids that are marshalled into boot camps and sent over to be shot or maimed for life.

You perhaps can add a lot to the above sentiment, and list more spoils that the big man gets while the little ones suffer! -CI.

WANT POWER LINES BURIED


They are having a problem up on Alpine Heights where residents are trying to get the SDG&E to put its proposed new high voltage lines underground instead of obscuring the beautiful scenery with 75' poles across Alpine Heights Rd.

Mrs. Sam Liner and other residents sent a petition in July asking the firm to bury line to its proposed new sub-station west of Foss and South Grade Roads.

They submitted another petition on Sept. 5 to Phillip Klauber at the SD office. Objectors are, besides the Liners, Paul Ruplinger, a civil engineer who owns land on that road; W. L.

Weeks, Leroy A they, superintendent of Barret Honor Camp. He has plans ready for a new house. He has already planted 20 trees around some huge boulders, has water in and claims the proposed line would wreck his view as the firm desires a 20' right-of-way on 695 feet of his land.

Says Mrs. Liner, "Europe and many parts of the US are putting wires underground. Why should we have to lag behind? Besides it is costly to maintain and repair overhead wires which are often shot at and come down, at times causing brush fires?"



While some residents objected, the county planning office approved the improvement plan for Harbison Canyon's road project, last week.


Objectors were not too much opposed to the 102-ft-wide corridor, but to the possibility of bringing too many people into the area, killing the rural atmosphere.





Supt. W. Edward Browning, at Monday's session of the school board, was given the go ahead to apply for ESEA Title I funds of about \$10,000.

The district proceeds on the assumption that the state board will act favorably at the Nov. session so that this program can become a reality on the 15th of Nov.


