## DAY IN COURT DUE BUS LINE

Friday in Superior Court was the second scheduled hearing in the case of Aztec Bus Lines vs Alpine School Board. At that time the amended complaint filed by Aztec satisfied Judge Hugo Fisher that there was a triable issue and a date will be set for late 1969 or early 1970.

However, no preliminary injunction was issued which would discontinue bus service under this controversial contract.

In mid-September the board awarded a contract to Patchetts Bus Line even though Aztec had submitted apparently

### JOHN REYNOLDS SELLS HOME

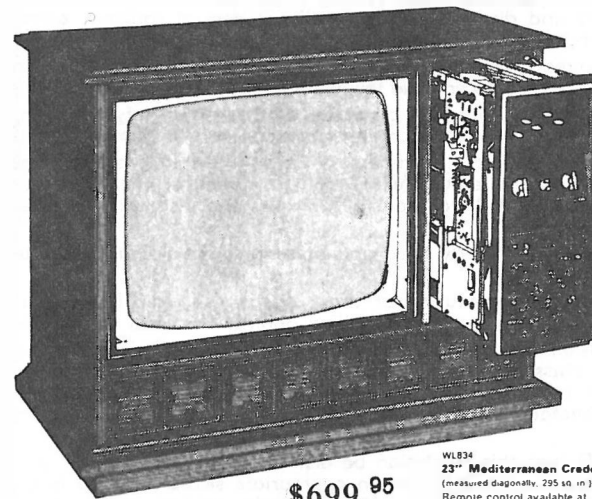

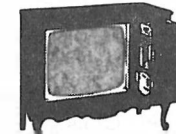

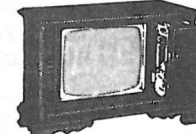

# EDITORIAL

## ELKS ISSUE RESOLUTION FOR LAW AND ORDER

From the monthly Elks Trail of the SD lodge of this great patriotic order, the following is reprinted and no comment is necessary. We congratulate this fine body for its stand.

WHEREAS, the members of the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks, numbering a million and a half American gentlemen who believe in God and revere our Country's flag and realize the necessity to preserve the Constitution of the United States of America and the Bill of Rights, which have served to establish the finest system of government in the world, and

WHEREAS, we deplore the presence of crime in our streets, violence and disorder on our campuses, and lack of respect by a minority of our people for our Country's flag and the rights of others, and

WHEREAS, we abhor the anarchy and chaos in our schools and communities with a continuance of riots, demonstrations, and disorders which bring about malicious destruction of property and danger to the personal safety of our people, and

WHEREAS, we and all other loyal Americans, having displayed much patience and forbearance, are angered, dismayed and disgusted with the illegal acts of radicals, extremists, trained agitators and militants, and

WHEREAS, we desire to express our concern for the future of our society and particularly our youth, the majority of whom are decent and law-abiding.

BE IT HEREBY RESOLVED that we stand for discipline of those who defy our laws, with the knowledge that public order is essential to achieve a solution to our domestic problems;

that we demand the expulsion from school of those participating in violent demonstrations, riots or the disruption of classes and the operation of schools, colleges or universities, public or private, whether on or near the school premises, and we demand the revocation of scholarships, grants or other monetary aids of a public nature to those participating in such acts.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this resolution be distributed to all lodges of our Order where it is to be read on the floor of the lodge at an appropriate session, posted in a prominent place in the lodge quarters, reproduced in the lodge bulletin and given publicity through the local media so that not only the members of our Order but also the citizens of our Country will know that the Benevolent and Protective Order of Elks of the United States of America respects the laws of our land and supports those charged with their enforcement.

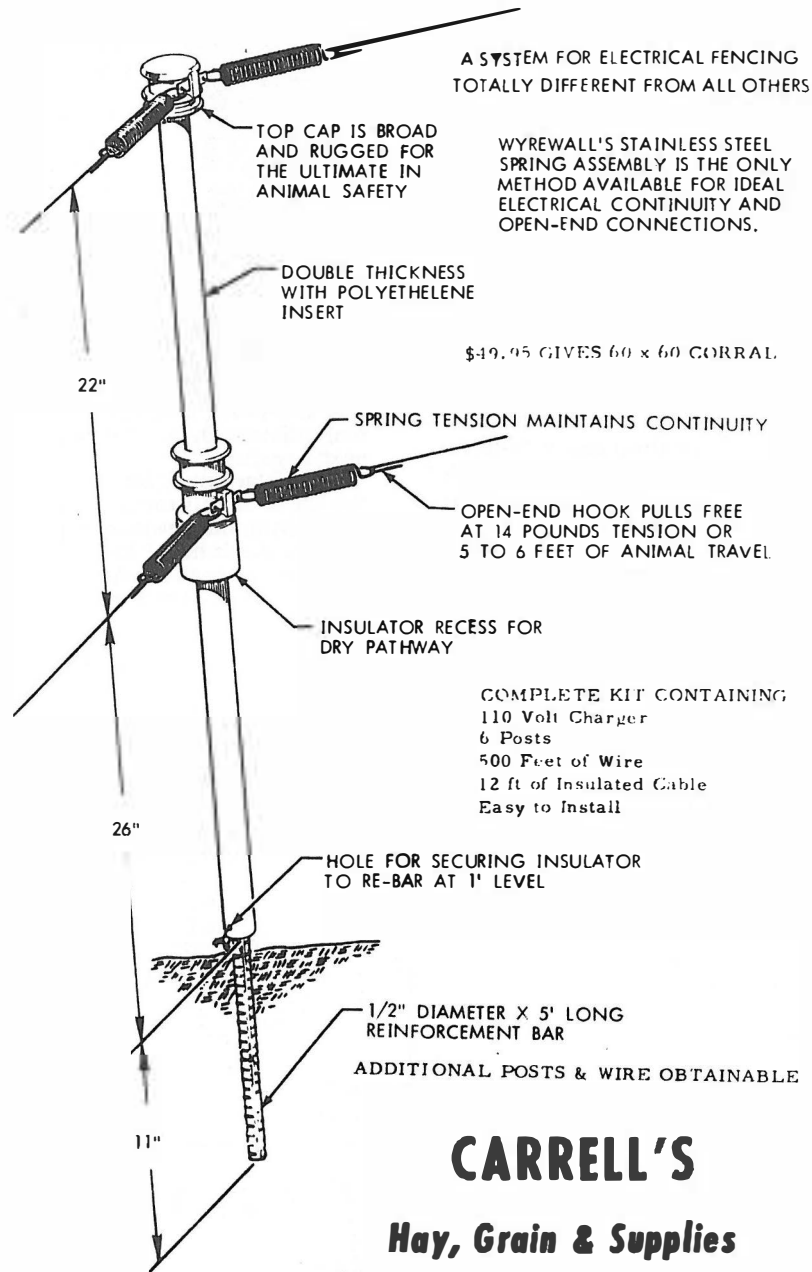

Mark is a senior at El Cap, has spent the past year getting the car ready for this event.

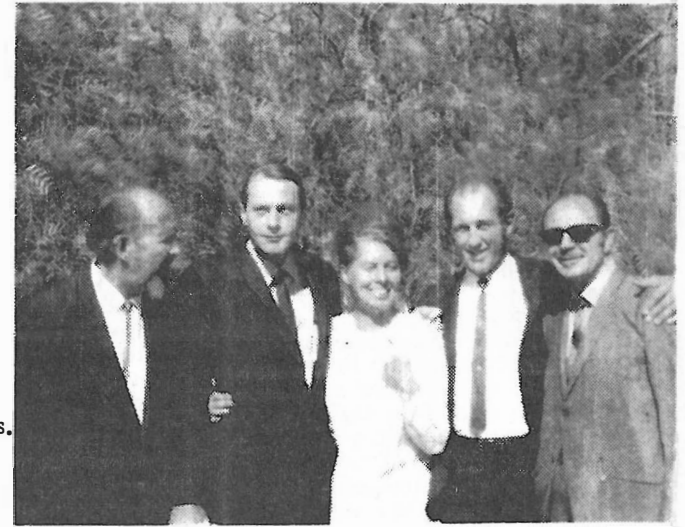

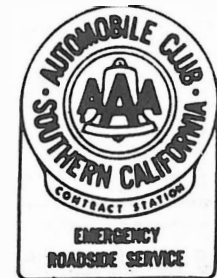

### BETTY'S DREAM COMING TRUE

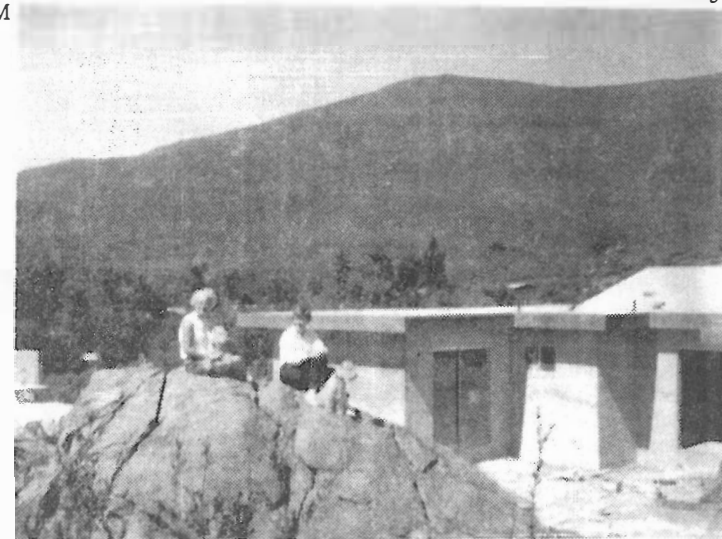

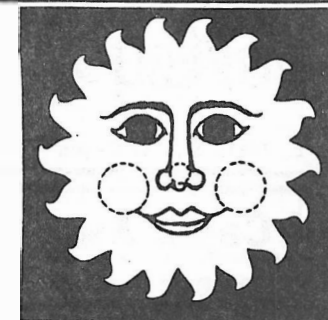

**US WARNS ON COLOR TV**

If you want to preserve your sight and other health qualities, do not sit nearer than 6 to 10 feet from your color TV set, warns the US Public Health Service. This will minimize potential radiation hazards. Also keep clear of the sides and rear of sets as the x-rays can penetrate walls as 20% of about 5000 color TV sets tested emitted x-rays at a level above the maximum safe amount recommended.

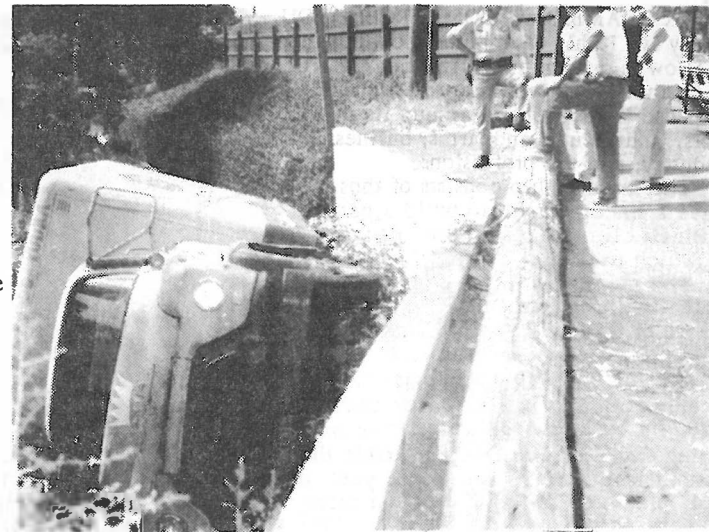

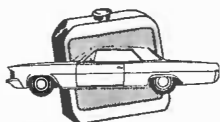

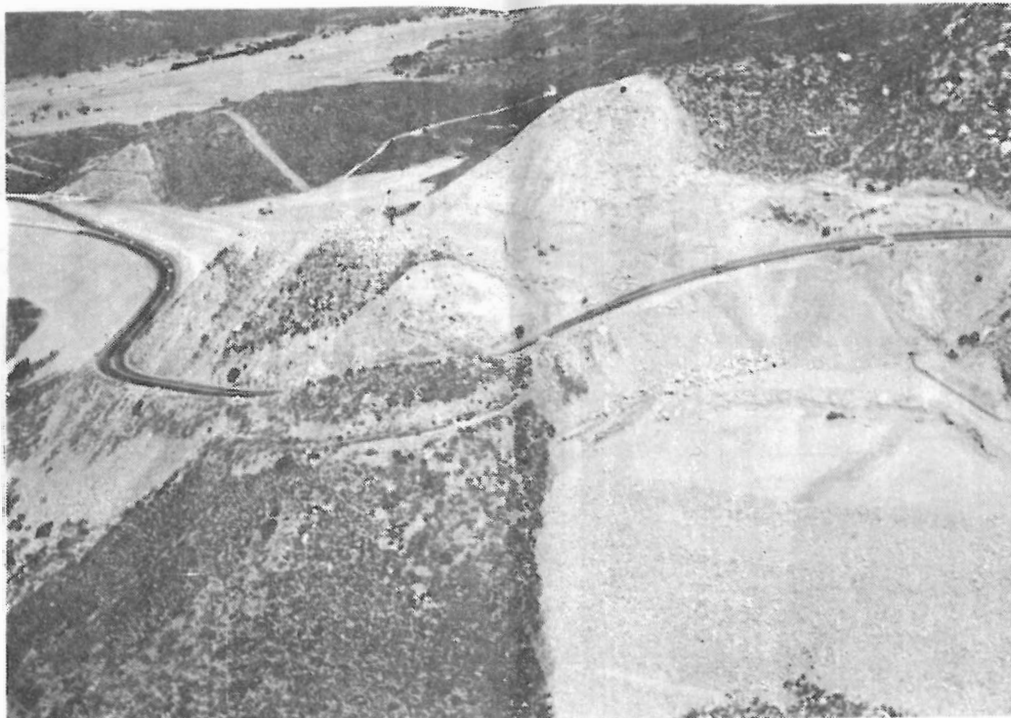

**MOUNTAIN DISAPPEARING FAST**

Here is recent airshot by Editor Irvine when he flew around new freeway job. This looks NW into Viejas Indian Reservation with Deadman's Curve on left at present end of I-8.

Note height of great fill at right, solid earth and rock taken from the mountain back of the curve. New route will come east straight from end of present freeway at left.

The M-K job will be completed middle of 1970, a fine improvement. Fill is being made with 1½ million yards of material from mountain, says

### PLAN TREE PLANTING WEEK HERE

The newly reorganized Alpine Historical Society has slated a campaign to get residents to put in bare-root trees next month, date of the special week to be announced, says the Tree Planting Committee.

"There are two valid reasons to plant in winter" says Pres. Richard Zuelke. "To save money as plants are cheaper and the manner in which planted makes it healthier and more vigorous than if set out later.

Here are their simple directions: Dig hole large enough to accommodate roots, without cramping, bending or cutting. For support drive a training stake in center. Place plant next to stake on the leeward side. Adjust depth so that the old soil line, visible at base of trunk, is at grade level. Refill, working earth around the roots.

For heavy soil, mix ground bark or other soil conditioner into the back-fill soil. Tie tree to stake in two or three places using cloth, plastic, or rubber. Form a watering basin and soak thoroughly.

Water bare-root plantings conservatively after initial soaking. Dormant plants need less water than actively growing ones, and if soil is too wet, new feeder roots will not form. Water by inspection, check soil for moisture with a trowel, if soil is damp tree does not need water.

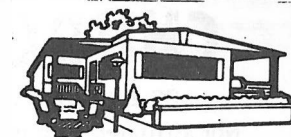

a lower one. Patchetts had provided transportation for the past 5 years. If Aztec convinces the court that Education Code No. 15951 applies here then the court would grant a permanent injunction. This section of the code states

that a contract for more than \$2500 should go to the lowest responsible bidder or all bids should be rejected.

The defense maintains that the board acted in accordance with EC No. 16802 which gives a board complete discretion to award a contract to other than the lowest bidder.

Attorney Dawson for Aztec, asked that Paul Clay, former superintendent, and William House, driver for Patchetts, be available during the trial.

The judge noted for the record that in calling for first bids in July, all bidders were notified, whereas in the second one, failure to notify bidders involved in the first one, indicated prejudice on the part of the board.
