# EDITORIAL

## 'ACRE AND INDEPENDENCE' IS NOW OUT OF STYLE!

Although only 10 spoke in opposition supervisors last week passed an ordinance zoning all the unzoned land in the county, adopting the LC (limited control) rule as the zoning tool.

While but 10 spoke against this measure, there are perhaps thousands that are also opposed to it. Thus the old saying "An acre and independence", which many of us believed was a solution to getting away from it all to a speck of land in the country to live, have a garden and so on, just is no more.

The law now says you must buy 2½

acres on which you may build only two family dwellings. You may still use it for all of the agricultural uses of zone A-4. Of course existing lots smaller than the 2½ acres, still remain legal building sites whether created by subdivision or lot split.

This is going to make it hard on many areas near towns like Alpine, where land prices have soared in the last few years. So a man, working or retired, or one on Social Security, must kick in with \$5,000 for a "lot", if the price is \$2,000 an acre, which much of it around here brings. Some near town has sold at over \$5,000 an acre.

That is not the only hardship, for if a fellow wants to start a business he has no assurance that a special use permit will be granted, for which he will be charged \$200. Think of the vast amount of red tape, typing, investigation, and so on, plus countless employes chasing all over city hall conferring on your little old special use permit so that the \$200 fee may be honestly accepted! And by the time it is approved, the sages of city hall may have decided that it should be three acres, or that the fee should be \$250, or sumpin, just to keep 'em all busy!


A lot of older people are voicing opinions as to why the young people are fed up with the old way of running this wonderful country. They are asking why the high taxes, rising costs on everything, tight money, laws, rules and so on. These are ambition-killing things. Maybe the country is on the edge of a nasty precipice! -CI.

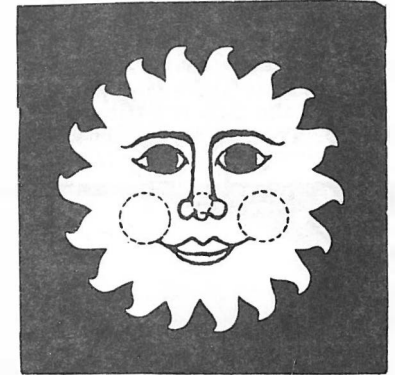

**SURPRISE SPEAKER AT PTA**

It was Mrs. Florence Shipek, M. A., an anthropologist and long time friend of Brown, who had taken on a great task of endeavoring to get more benefits for his people on Viejas Reservation.

Her special interest is in the California Indians. Through artifacts she has traced their history over 1200 years! Brown's talk was also received with deep interest.

In passing it is noted that a group of Indians in San Francisco has started what it claims is the first all-Indian publishing house in the US. Rupert Costo, president of the new Indian Historical Press, said their aim is "to correct some of the misstatements of fact, and distortions about Indians that are so prevalent in books nowadays".

Costo, a state highway engineer, is chairman of the Cahuilla tribe in the Southland. The first book, out soon, is



"Textbooks and the American Indian", of 280 pages, done by 32 Indian scholars who evaluate some 350 textbooks about the natives used in schools.

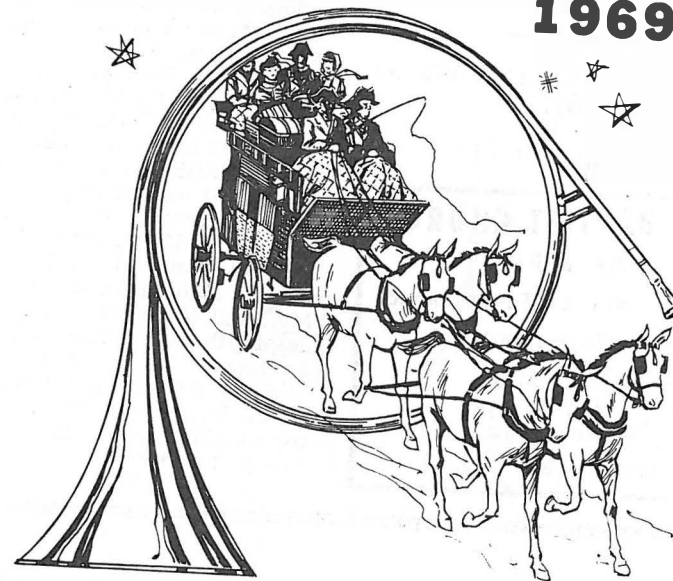

Alpine faces a sanitation problem, and now a similar one, for Beeson's Disposal Service, 228 Almyra Road in the canyon, has been forced to up its prices. As he says, "due to the new county ordinance which makes us upgrade equipment, plus higher wages, overhead, etc., we are having to change our policy to better serve our customers."

Starting Jan. 1 an extra charge will be for driveway service, twice weekly, or only once weekly, it remains the same. He is having a mail or phone vote as to which service is desired. At presstime 39 voted for the present rate once weekly, 14 for the \$1 a month rise for twice weekly.

The new ordinance he says makes us have a trash-designed body. I had to pay \$6281 for one, including payments".

The state license for such trucks runs \$80 to \$148. and the county gets \$25 for a license, "plus \$100 a year for each truck and we must operate a minimum of two. On top of that mandatory insurance is for \$300,000, and on top, we have to be bonded for \$5,000" he adds. Details from 445-3029. (See editorial this issue).

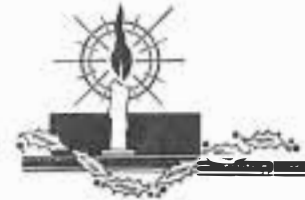

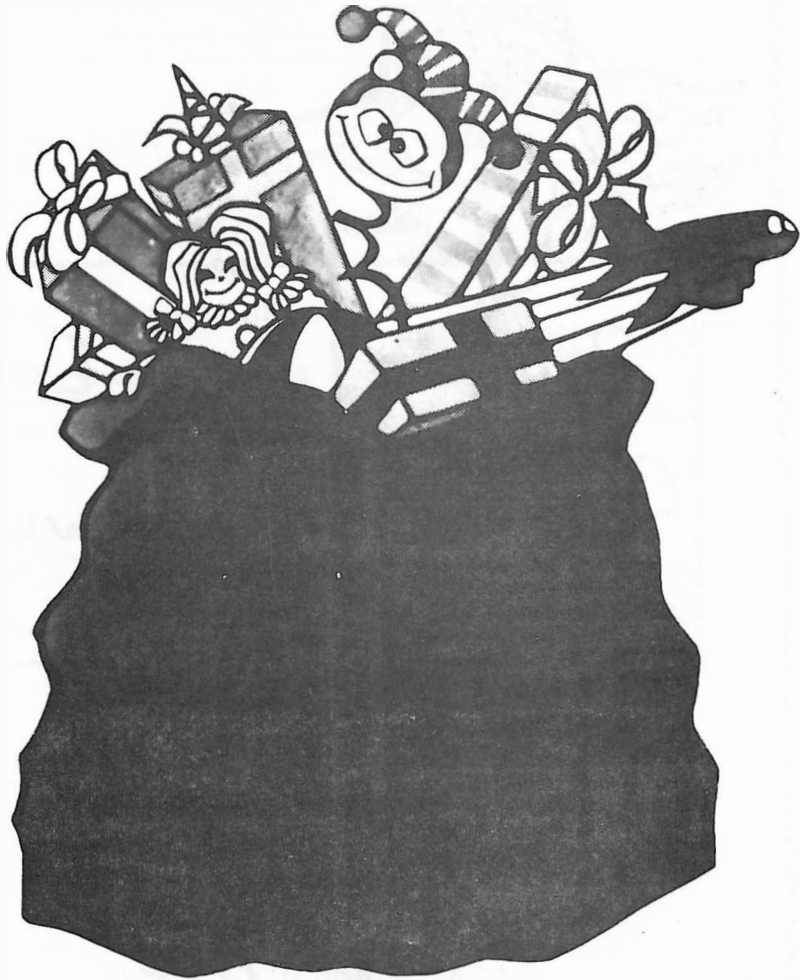

**LIEUT. FEY, USN RETIRES**

After outstanding service in the US Navy, Lieut. Edwin Cecil Fey, of 1256 Arnold Way, son of the late Robt. and Mrs. Fey, was signally honored recently aboard the USS Eldorado in SD.

Since 1940 Fey has been in uniform, saw action in three wars; WW2, Korea and Vietnam. His career began with recruit training at Great Lakes, and initial duty aboard the USS Ranger in the European theatre where he participated in the landing of General Eisenhower's forces in N. Africa.

In 1942 the Alpinier went to the Pacific where he was in the battle of Leyte, served on the USS Sangamon when he won the rate of Chief Radarman. After peace came he served with several training commands where his expertise in Combat Information Center procedures qualified him as instructor.

Later he was aboard the USS Frank Knox, then to training duty and Pearl Harbor till 1961, the year he was appointed Lieut. Jg. In 1963 he was promoted to temporary Lieutenant.

He has numerous decorations including the Bronze Star with Combat V, the President Unit Commendation 1st & 2nd Awards, the Good Conduct Award



with 6 stars and 12 campaign and service medals.

After commissioning, he served as Operations Officer on USS Chevalier and with various training commands before joining the Eldorado where he retired. He lives with his wife Margaret here, plans to stay. The widow of the late Robert Fey, also lives here.

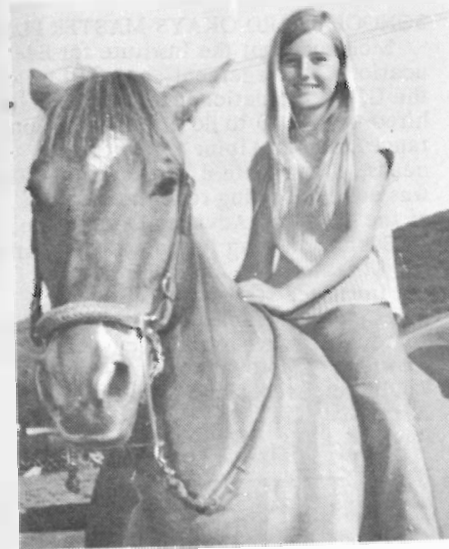

### SCHOOL BOARD OKAYS MASTER PLAN

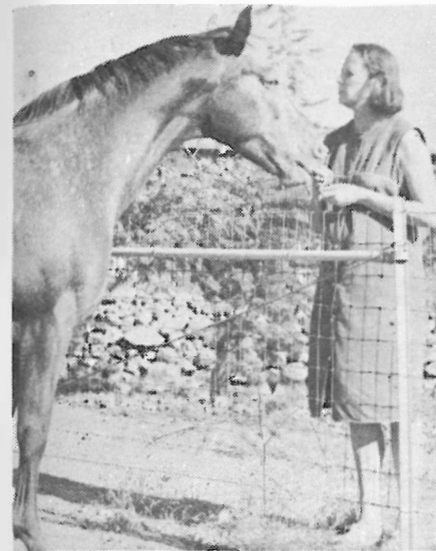

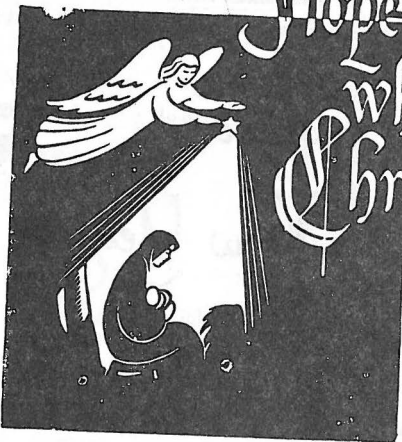

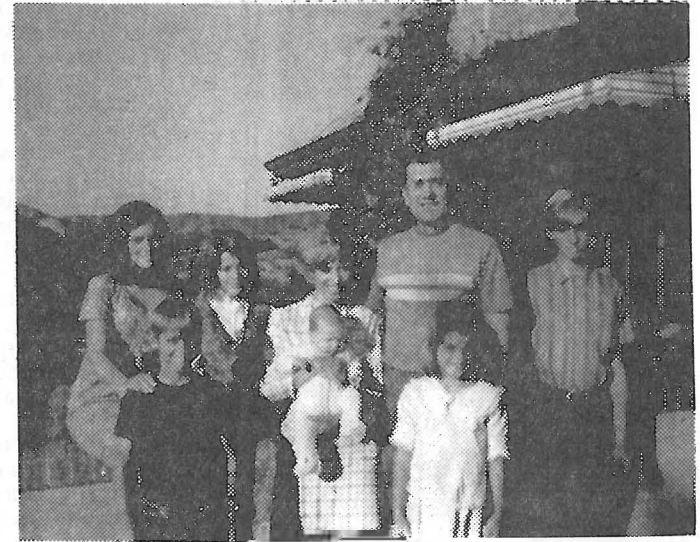
Both J.L. and Robbie are natives of Cedartown, Ga.
