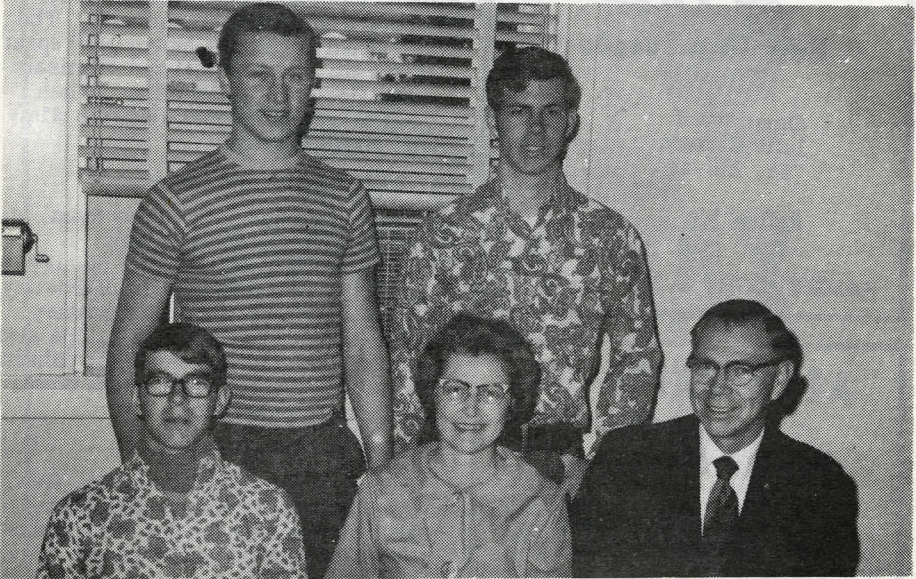
TRUCK STOLEN FROM ALPINE TV

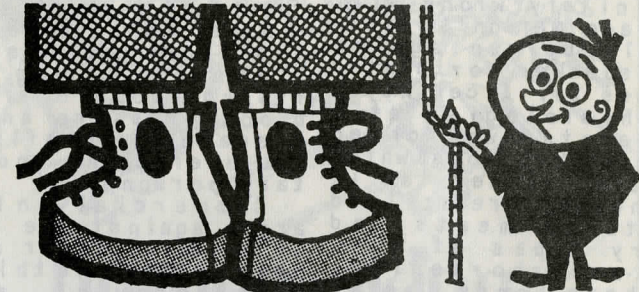

EDITORIAL



'Fat American' Showed Sins of Diet!

Recently CBS TV ran an hour-long, controversial subject on costly evening time "The Fat American" which was seen by millions nationwide. It concerned diet and health foods, and was a tacit admission by both sides that something was definitely wrong with the average person's diet. It should be run again!

Chief speaker for better eating was Dr. Ancel Keys, noted physiologist at U of Minnesota, who cited a long list of foods which cause harm; butter fat in milk, cheese, cream; lard and fats in meats and ordinary types of margarine and shortening.

All these foods, as we know, produce dreaded blood cholesterol, a factor in

coronary heart attacks and other ailments. Also speaking against our infamous diet was Dr. Paul Dudley White, heart specialist, who noted that these attacks are now appearing among youths in their 20's and 30's. He noted that one in three Americans is overweight, attributing it to overeating of fatty foods and lack of exercise.

Other noted experts gave testimony against wrong diet, soft living and the rising trouble from high blood pressure and other diseases, chiefly among the overweight and sedentary persons.

Commercial interests argue against the findings of doctors, their argument being that nothing has been "proven", as lung cancer from smoking, cholesterol from dairy and other fats.

Conclusion: Americans should cheerfully court heart disease, lung cancer, obesity, high blood pressure and other ailments to prevent a dip in profits from tobacco, dairy and other industries! We should like to see medical men come out flatly against these things that are undermining America's health. Let's call a spade a spade, no matter whose profit it hurts!-C1

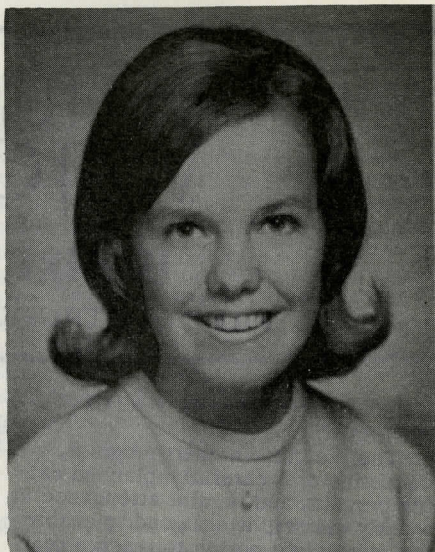

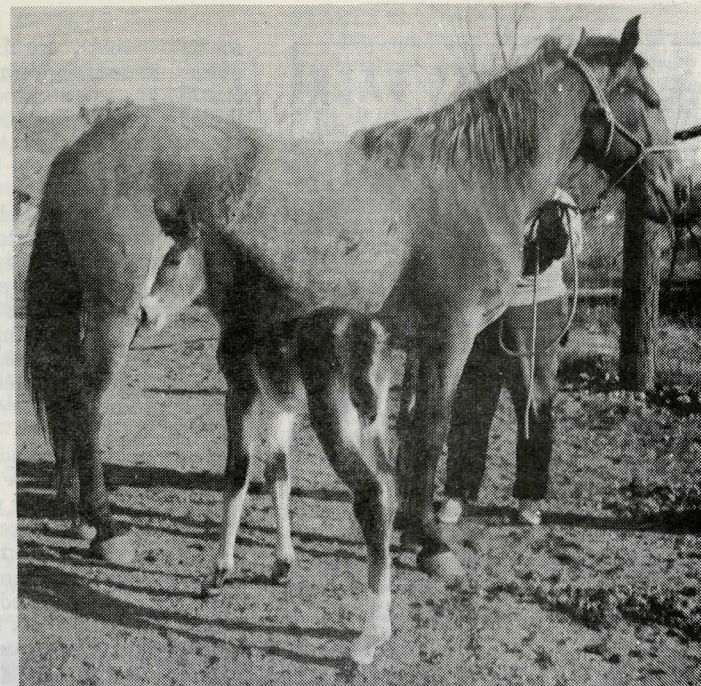

LITTLE FIRE & LITTLE WRECK

Monday about 5 p. m. they had some excitement on Alpine Blvd. in front of Vista Alpine Mobile Home Estates when children playing with matches set fire to some fibreglass rocks which they said "would not burn", but did. 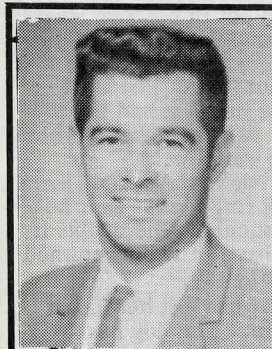

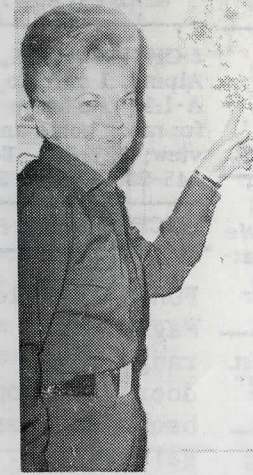
