## PLAN DETAILS FOR VIEJAS DAYS

Preparations are being made by the chamber of commerce for its big Viejas Days celebration. A parade is scheduled for Sunday, April 26 with many activities planned during the week. A quarter-horse show will be on May 2 and an open western on May 3. See next week's Sun for details.

## REVEAL PLAN FOR 50 APARTMENTS

Jack Katz, owner of Alpine Villa Cottages, told the Sun Tuesday that he and his partner, Vincent Trafficante, an IBM executive of SD, are petitioning for entry in Alpine Sanitation District so that, when more connections are authorized, they will get sewer service for 50 apartments they intend building at 1539 Tavern Road.

"We plan on starting just as soon as the sewer problem is solved and we are annexed to the district" Katz said. Buildings will be of 1-bedroom, some

two, and will be in clusters with rents low, about \$110 to \$115, a month furnished. Architecture will be Spanish. Present houses on the 9-acre site will be sold for moving out, or salvaged. This fine improvement will cost \$350 to \$400,000, in addition to the \$100,000 for the land.

### STAR PARTY TOMORROW NIGHT

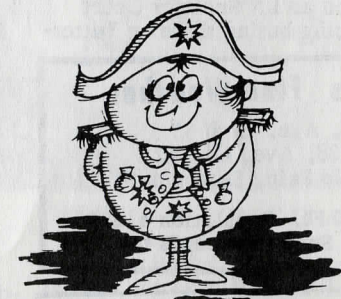

# EDITORIAL

## MANDATORY BUSING MENACES GOOD EDUCATION!

Trying to achieve racial balance by forcing school districts to bus children across town is one of the most stupid rulings ever to come out of this nation!

The colored people do not want that, neither do the whites. It is a ridiculous idea and one that could wreck the quality of education everywhere. As our good Governor Ronald Reagan said in condemning the idea, it is "dehumanizing and a monetary threat to the quality of education".

He labeled an LA Superior Court decision forcing busing there an "utter-

ly ridiculous one" and pledged state support of an appeal. This decision also poses a threat to all state districts for it would make costs rise, cut down on new buildings, books and maintenance.

The ruling is an obtuse one. We feel that an orderly going forward with changing attitudes toward the Negro, and other minorities, is the proper and sensible method to pursue. We cannot force this thing any more than we can legislate love, or kindness in the human heart.

As the governor said "Forcing children to be herded onto buses and carted across town each day-- away from their familiar home environments-- represents a vast and dehumanizing manipulation of school populations."

The LA situation, if busing is put through, approaches madness, for it would cost the city \$42 million annually to bus its 650,000 students all over town every day of the school year. This huge sum could well be used in education, not in travel and adding to the huge pollution of the brown air of LA.

However this silly measure might just be proven unconstitutional and that would be that. We should do all in our power and fiscal ability to help the minorities, but not do some stupid thing that would tear down our schools and the quality of education. We have enough troubles as it is without legislating more! - CI

In precipitation, 1941 was the highest with 33.92 inches, 1961 lowest for 7.82. (No wonder Alpine is famous for its fine climate!)

### REPORT SHOWS SCHOOLS PITIFUL!

At the Monday night meeting of the Alpine Schools Citizens Committee, researchers Dr. James M. Thrasher and assistant Nicholas Mallek, declared in a preliminary report that 4 classrooms in everyday use are sub-standard, 2 are absolutely deficient, not including the 2 classes on the stage. District schools can expect a total of 1300 students in 4 years, in grades kindergarten-8. The remaining 19 classrooms are rated minimal standard. Light, heating, and ventilation are criteria for rating classrooms. Mal Pappin was chairman, Glo Newton, secretary.

The lack of a library or learning center for research was sharply criticized. Non-laboratory science, shop and home economic programs were also said to "leave much to be desired" in terms of what other districts offer.

Based on less than 15% slope being a building site, the saturation of like land in Alpine could some future day bring the area's population to 467,000.

Costs of temporary buildings are running \$16-17 a square foot. New structures currently cost \$20-23. From time of a bond passage to a finished plant takes from 18 to 36 months.

The attending senior citizens, parents, developers, and new residents were reminded that passage of the June 2 bonds will not raise tax rates. April 4th was discussed as a possible date for a bus tour of the entire district and the next meeting.
