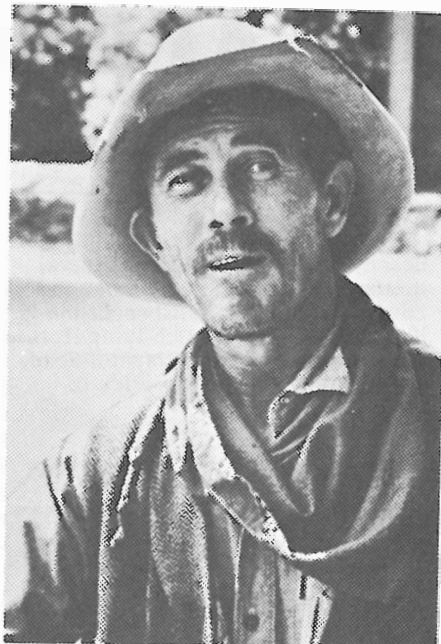

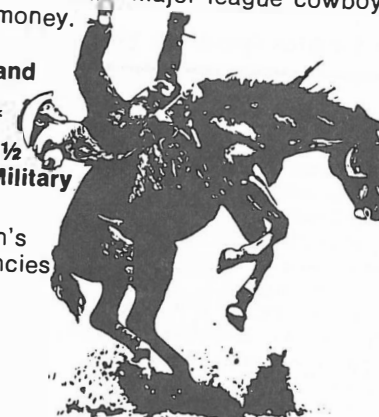

EDITORIAL

TOWN'S FUTURE HINGES ON TUESDAY'S VOTE.

Sample ballots are in the hands of all voters within the Alpine Sanitation District, which includes most of downtown Alpine. Tuesday they will ballot on the \$580,000 bond issue. Its passage means that the community can grow and develop. Denial means that no more houses or buildings may be erected. The town will thus be stymied.

Every property owner in the district should think carefully on this and vote yes. The county and the Taxpayer's Association Supporting the Alpine Sanitation District, have fully detailed the measure in papers sent to all voters. They should be studied carefully, which will assure voters that the Yes is the proper way to ballot.

At presstime the Sun learned that supervisors had given their okay for Lakeside to use the Santee district in a substitute plan which assures Lakeside of ably handling the increased volume of sewage when Alpine joins Lakeside.

This is the approved county plan developed over some time through a

comprehensive study. It will provide the most reliable long-range means of effluent disposal, which the Water Quality Control Board says must be stopped from going down the creek to El Capitan Reservoir to pollute drinking water. It will also be the most economical in capital cost and annual operation expense, plus providing for maximum use of existing sewer facilities and possibility for future wastewater reuse. In addition it will protect the beautiful rural environment of this community.

Recently Del Mar faced a similar problem but they voted bonds of about \$1½ million to insure that fine city's proper growth. Other towns are facing the same problems of pollution, a nationwide one which must be solved. The proposed financing assures that all properties which annex in future to use the facilities, will be required to pay a fair share of the cost. The Alpine district has already applied for a federal grant of \$147,000, which will be forthcoming if the bond issue carries.

Today there are small areas contiguous to the district that are desirous of annexing so as to get sewer service. The orderly and efficient growth of Alpine thus hinges on the Tuesday vote, which obviously should be Yes. Were I in the district, my ballot would be Yes. -CI.

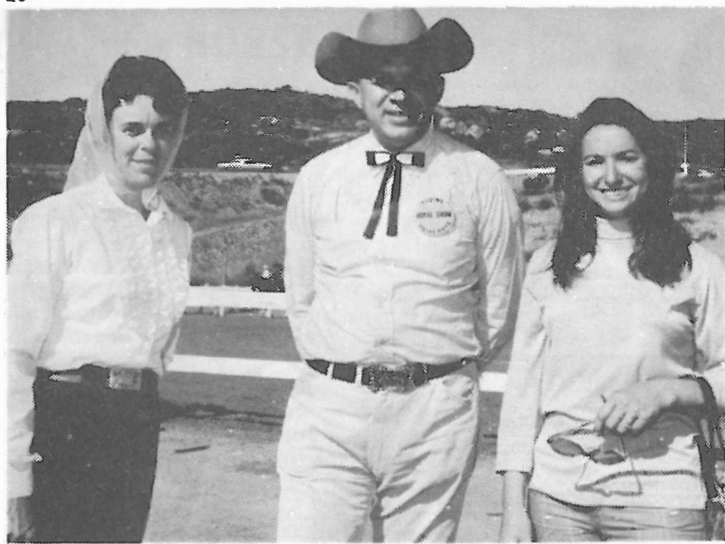

PUNCTURE WOUNDS OF THE FOOT

Of all the injuries to the foot of a horse, none is more common or more serious than a puncture wound. It may be caused by a nail, glass, wire or sharp piece of rock. If they are deep, require immediate care of a vet as tetanus (lockjaw) may follow.

These wounds are dangerous because the surface closes over rapidly and not only excludes oxygen, a condition which breeds bacteria, but seals in the blood and natural discharges which should be allowed to escape

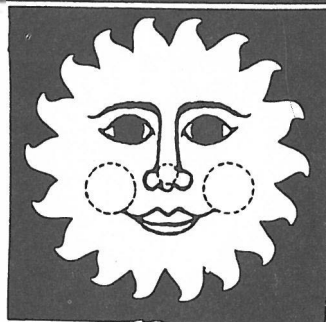

for cleansing of the wound.

Punctures not only occur quite frequently but, adding to their seriousness, is the fact that they may not always be detected promptly, delaying immediate attention. Also, the external opening is often so small that little or no importance is attached to it. Yet in a short time, swelling, pain and acute inflammation becomes apparent.

If a horse is lame and the foot is hot to the touch, a careful examination should be made for a wound. The nail or foreign body should be removed and the hoof cleansed thoroughly with warm water and soap. If the opening is small it should be enlarged to remove all foreign material and allow the collection of blood and matter to escape.

Wounds to the sole are the worse because it is hard and unyielding, it is easily infected, swelling occurs rapidly and any pressure causes severe pain. Wounds in the heel or frog are less hazardous, unless they are so deep as to injure the cartilages. If taken proper care of, a puncture wound will heal satisfactorily and lameness will disappear in a short time. In some cases it will require more time, and healing will be prolonged.

A good habit is to check each hoof before you go for a ride and when you return, clean and examine your horse thoroughly. It will pay dividends in a sound animal.

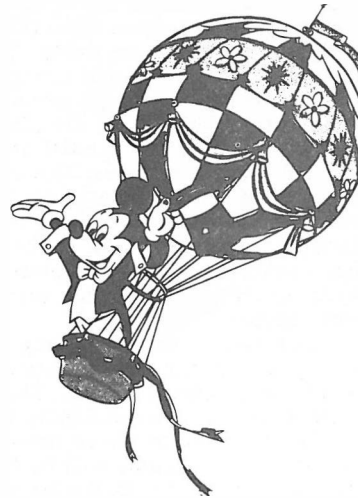
