


Starting at noon Sunday, the 7th annual barbecue and gymkhana show is to be in Jamul horse ring sponsored by St. Pius Church.


#### JOE LYMAN



This week will give you a few points on one of the reasons your horse rubs the skin off his neck or other parks of his body.

If you notice your animal rubbing a lot and scratching be sure to check for lice. The neck, mane and back parts are the most frequently infested. Lice are small parasites that live on the skin surfact and will cause the loss of hair due to rubbing. If you run your hand along the place with the hair rubbed off you will sometimes see the creatures imbedded in the skin.

Animals with long hair that are not groomed properly or not at all are the most susceptible. Lice may be spread through direct contact and by equipment and stables that have not been cleaned or sprayed.

The parasites occur most frequently in late winter or just before summer shedding. Stables may remain infested from year to year if not properly cared for. Good grooming, clipping and disinfection of equipment is the best means of preventing them.

If you see small white eggs stuck to shafts of the hairs you should clip the horse and burn the hair. You can buy a disinfectant and bathe your pet with this. You will probably have to do this several times before you get rid of them but don't worry about getting them on you, they are only interested in your horse.

If you buy a horse that has lice, be sure to segregate him and get rid of the pests fast. Your pet will appreciate the relief and you will keep others in the corral from being made miserable by scratching.

### LETTERS TO THE EDITOR

Your Editorial concerning the unfairness of some of the zoning laws, and citing as an example the Naud Trucking Co. on the corner of Arnold and Petra opens the door for a presentation of some views of the majority of Oak Glen homeowners, as evidenced at the recent hearing before the Planning Commission, at which time the Naud rezoning request was denied.

This area was zoned 1-A more than two years before the Nauds purchased their property here. Several new families have either bought homes or property to build upon with the understanding that the Zoning was 1-A.

We do not understand why anyone would move into a community and expect to have one particular plot rezoned just for their own selfish wishes, and especially to ask for an industrial zoning (M-2) in this agricultural area, and thus becoming an annoyance to everyone else. These trucks are a definite traffic hazard as they are parked on both sides of Arnold Way at night and on weekends; the entire neighborhood is awakened at 5:30 each morning when these truck engines are warmed up before leaving; Saturdays and Sundays are filled with constant noise of mechanical work in servicing these trucks; and then, also, there is the extreme fire hazard caused by the storage of large quantities of fuel and tires, as well as the welding operations in the maintenance of these large earth-moving trucks.

For obvious reasons, I must ask that my name be withheld.

Note- We talked to Mrs. Naud who said they bought the place as the realtor said it was unzoned, which they believed. They store no fuel but keep it on a rented lot in EC. Welding is electric, noiseless. And parking on the road is legal. Furthermore none has complained to Nauds who had a petition signed by 51 in favor of their operation. - Ed
