

"This service, available to all, is perhaps little known by most people, unless it has been used by someone close at a tim e of extreme emergency. when it's availability can mean the difference between life and death.'

FEW PROBLEMS FOR CHILDREN WHO READ BOOK

Our fine county library, of which Alpine's cozy one is a member, sends a leaflet telling of the many advantages countywide readers are entitled to through the Serra Regional Library System.

It is headed "Got a problem? Stumped for an answer? Need to Know? Want that book?" It explains the working of this system of which our fine branch is a member.

Patricia C. Wright, reference consultant, who visits Alpine frequently says that the county library becomes a full member on July 1, thus any library may issue a special Serra Library card which will enable residents to borrow without paying a fee, from any library.

"Assistance" she says, "in answering difficult questions is provided by the Serra Reference Center. Local libraries are linked via teletype which expedites reference service and interlibrary loans with the state library and others in the state."

Another feature is stronger book collections, and a film circuit, available through this new Serra membership which was established in Sept. 1965 under authority of the state Public Library Development Act. Presently they have a 2-year reference service demonstration financed by a federal grant to continue through 1971.

It has been found by many authorities as the fine World Books, which we early bought for our three daughters-- and ourselves, although I have an Encyclopedia Britannica for personal use-- that children who have access to, and are encouraged to use, the dictionary, the Bible and the encyclopedia, are seldom faced with problems like thousands that miss this enlightening phase of early life.

One of America's greatest advantages is knowledge, which really is power, success, happiness, and our libraries across this nation are one facet of what has helped make the United States the great and good country that is is today.

In passing we should not fail to re-

In passing we should not fail to remember one man who helped in this educational work, Andrew Carnegie. I shall never forget our library in Santa Monica where I was raised, with its inscription above the door: "Andrew Carnegie Free Public Library".

Biographies are far more absorbing than fiction, for Carnegie, a poor lad from Scotland, who died in 1910, was a bobbinboy in a cotton factory, became telegraph clerk and operator for the Pennsylvania R.R., rose to secretary, later became manager of the western division. He introduced sleeping cars, bought a farm, later got into oil, and steamships, later founded U.S. Steel, then retired.

He was a large benefactor of the Tuskkegee Institute under Brooker T. Washington, for Negro education. He established 2505 library buildings!

Perhaps on Saturday which is July Fourth, we should bow our heads and thank such men who helped this great country to become what it is today, and which, we fervently hope and pray, will survive the present crucible of fire, dissent, crime. I'll always say "This is My Country-- America the Beautiful"!





AGE FOR RIDING YOUR HORSE

There are a lot of things to consider before you begin to ride your horse, and age isn't always the main concern. If your colt is properly fed he should be a good size by the time he is 18 or 20 months old. If he is to be ridden by a light person, with easy work, he can safely be started at this age. The harder the work is to be the older your horse needs to be.

Alpine Representative Lee Widmer, 445-4171 else to consider. Begin easy and then slowly work up to longer periods. A horse that is out of condition tires easily and is prone to injury. One that is well conditioned has good muscle tone and when he is not used properly will lose tone quickly. This causes strain on tendons and ligaments. It is bad to work a horse that is tired, especially a young one.

You should begin by riding your colt about 15 minutes each day, or twice a day if possible, eventually work into longer periods as he gets into condition and develops strength.

Don't work your young horse in areas of soft deep sand. This can cause sprains to the tendons and ligaments. Be sure to watch for rocky surfaces and of course, pavement. A stone bruise may take quite awhile to heal.

When you are through with your first easy workouts with the young colt spend time with him afterwards. You can brush him and let him know that he is doing what you expect. When you turn him out he won't be so mad about the whole idea of being ridden. You might want to give him a little grain. This will make a lot of difference in the attitude of your colt.

A slow, easy program of training will pay you great dividents in a well-rounded riding horse.
