EDITORIAL

CALIFORNIA MUST END TERRIBLE FIRE THREAT.

The most disastrous SD & LA County fires disclosed one sure thing: the state must take drastic steps to end the menace of another holocaust.

Even the homeowner on half an acre, should use every known means of preventing the potential loss when a brush fire rages toward him. Of course this county's fire was sped by east winds, but an ordinary one could take many homes again.

Alan House of Victoria Drive, who raises Christmas trees on his acreage, handed the Sun a booklet from the US Extension Service, "Landscape for



Fire Protection", which gives instructions for this, with illustrations and full data.

It tells how to reduce fire hazards as using a high pressure sprinkling system, keeping landscape clean, remove dead brush and limbs, using a succulent ground cover which does not ignite like grass, and leave space between trees to prevent spread of flames.

"It is costly to live safely in the fire-prone hills of California", the book warns, as "Control of chaparral is a major expense, and a hillside, whether landscaped with native shrubs or other ornamentals, requires maintenance that includes water, since few ornamentals can survive on our normal rainfall".

It also points out that "there is no such thing as a plant that will not burn. All will burn if enough heat and other conditions are right". It finally advises to landscape burned areas to prevent erosion with jute matting or straw mulch and quick-growing ground covers. Control regrowth of undesirable brush and plant trees and shrubs.

With winter rains due soon, it behooves everyone, large rancher or householder on an acre, to get busy and help prevent erosion of the most valuable part of his land, the topsoil. -CI

When the Sun was getting the news and ad about the change of owners in walked a couple from Campo who used to live at 2221 Tavern Road. They are, at right in photo, Mr. and Mrs. Paul H. Weber, who came here back in 1937, left in 1941. She was born in Lakeside. They came off the freeway

to buy vitamins in the little shop. In photo at left are the Garlands and daughter Lunette.

Weber tells why he eats mostly health foods and organically grown produce. "I had bad ulcers but the doctor could not cure them with drugs, so I went to a lecture by Martin Pretorius who taught me how to eat, and my ulcers just disappeared! So we've been on this ever since and we're both doing fine".

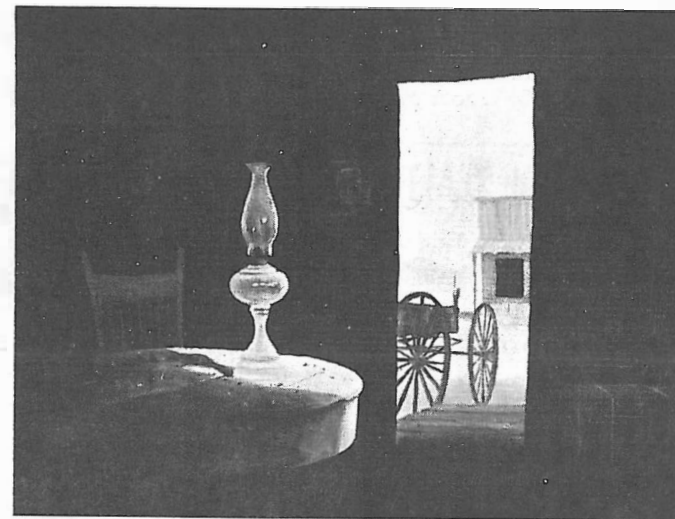

By The Double C's

Maureen Carrell, their leader, says "you can come and watch this big show free if you like but you must be a member to participate. The charge of 50¢ a class for equitation and gymkahan goes toward buying ribbons and trophies. It promises to be an exciting show with lots of participants from all over the county, so if you haven't anything to do Sunday, go on down for a fun day.

the champion will never show again, will be used for stud service. His trainers, Jim and Dolly Day, said the break was just an unfortunate accident as the animal, a Park Horse Champion, was 4-years old and showed wonderful prospects.

We had an interesting bulletin from Bill Virden who is executive director of the Humane Society and it has some good advice for all horse owners and prospective ones.

He said that horse rustling is on the increase with more and more reports of stolen horses coming through his office. Because there are between 35 and 40 thousand pleasure horses in this county, it is easy to see how something like this could happen. Being a horse thief can be profitable and as the desire to own horses increases, so does the thievery.

Virden says "don't buy a horse from just anyone and don't fail to get a "bill of sale". And buying off of a truck, while it is not uncommon, is one of the worst ways to get a horse as you don't know who it really belongs to. During the fire he said that most of the people who had lost horses couldn't even identify them and offers suggestions to protect your horse.

1. Take color pictures of your horse, from the head, the rear and both sides, then put them in a safe place.
2. Know the color of your horse.
3. Know the sex.
4. If your horse is in an outdoor paddock, keep the gate chained shut with a lock but don't padlock the animal in a box stall, in case of fire.
5. If you have close neighbors, ask them to be alert to any trailer pulling into your yard and loading an animal when you are not at home.
6. Know the person you are buying the horse from. Ask for identification.

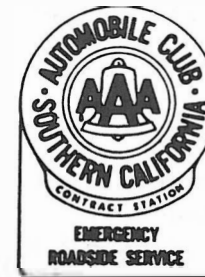

FEEDING A PONY

Since a pony is much smaller than a horse he will require less feed. Also, it seems that ponies get quite nervous and sometimes bad tempered when fed much grain. Actually one doesn't need grain, except a young foal or a nursing mare. It isn't a good idea to feed a pony from your hand. They are small and get spoiled easily and will walk all over you looking for that little goodie.

If you want to give him a carrot or something, give it to him in his feed box or in a bucket. This will help pre-

vent him from getting spoiled and biting.

Give him about as much hay as he will clean up in an hour and the same amount in the evening. You may give him a little more in the evening if he isn't on pasture during the day.

You can provide him with a salt block and the same amount of water as a horse.

If your pony is on pasture he probably won't need hay but once a day if it is good pasture. You can judge this by his appearance. If he is too fat, cut down until he looks like he should.

If you feed him pellets there is usually a chart telling the amount depending upon his weight. Be sure to measure these as it is easy to overfeed. You might think that he isn't getting enough but they have added vitamins and minerals and are tested. If you are not feeding pellets, but hay, you may want to give him some type of vitamin supplement. Be sure to follow directions for the amounts.

Everything else would be the same as for feeding the large animal. If you have ponies and horses together, it would be a good idea to have them separated because the large ones will eat much faster and your pony may not get his share.

Last Sunday traffic around the town seemed to be at least 50% more than usual, no doubt due to sightseers.

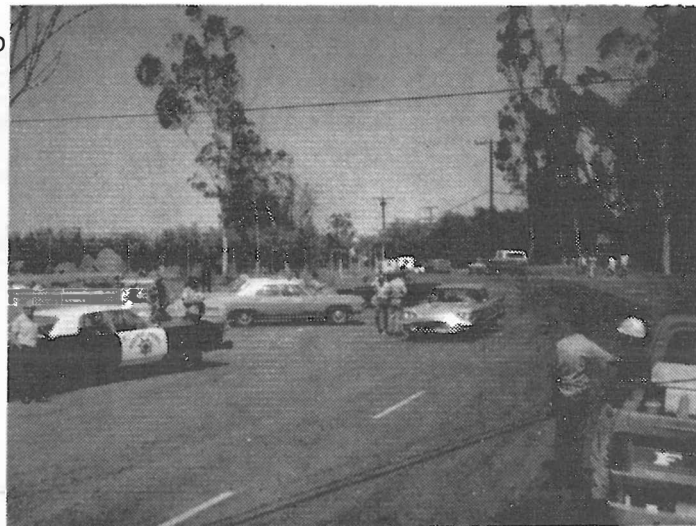
OTTO MILLER PASSES

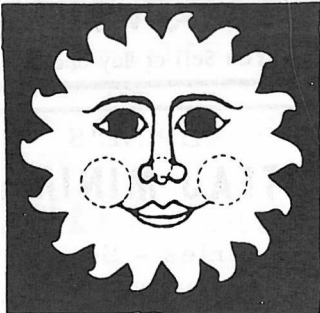

He said each homeowner should keep a wide firebreak around his property all all times.

Charles West, local agent for Travelers & US Fidelity, also gave a talk on insurance, said it would be "a good idea to make a list of insured items and keep them in a safe place with a duplicate in another location so it would make it easier to file claims for burned items."

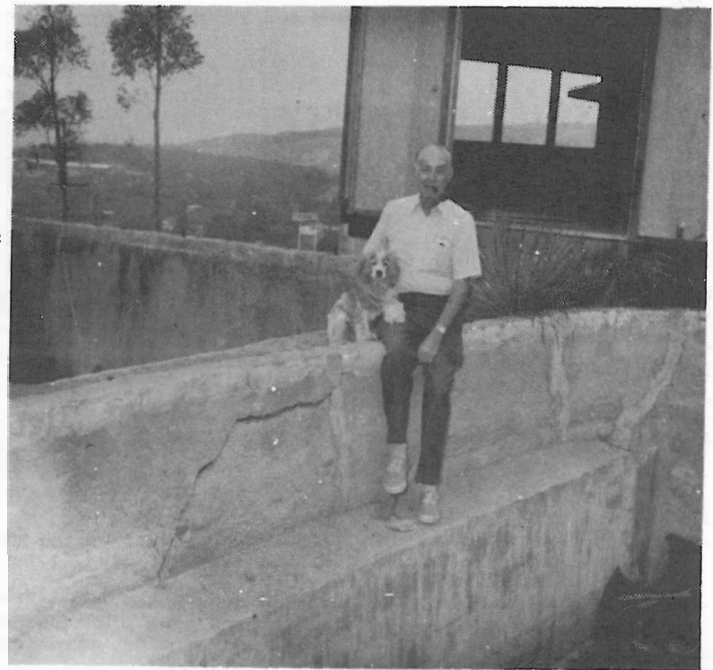
OLD RESERVOIR TO BE SAUNA
