



Clarke Irvine Loses Tax Exemption, Alpine Girl Wins Crown

'Health Defense League' Declared Taxable

SACRAMENTO — According to the records of the Franchise Tax Board, the "Health Defense League, Inc.," which has been operating as a "non-profit" organization, has been declared taxable. Until this time, this organization did not pay the usual taxes, but is now a taxable entity, according to informed sources.

The corporation, formed in 1931, has owned and operated the Alpine Sun since 1958 and has operated as a non-taxable organization with Alice and Clarke Irvine as its principal officers.

Also owned by the "Health Defense League" is 8.52 acres at 2255 Tavern Rd. in Alpine.

There was no reason given, at this time, for the revoking of the tax exemption, nor was there any information avail-

able concerning what further action will be taken.

Clarke Irvine also, reportedly, owned another non-profit organization around the year 1919 which concerned itself with "Prophetic Dreams."

The "non-profit" organization's tax exemption was revoked under the Revenue Taxation Code of the California Administrative Code, Title 18, Section 23701D.

Taxes to Increase, Says Unruh

SACRAMENTO — Assembly Speaker Jesse M. Unruh has said local governmental units are going to be playing trick or treat with local property taxpayers again this year — only this year it will be mostly tricks, not treats.

Unruh announced that this year's property tax increases will average from seven per cent to 20 per cent over last year's levies.

Unruh said that he had predicted this tax rise several months ago when he was pushing his tax reform measure which would have substantially reduced property tax rates.

Unruh noted that in Riverside County alone, four cities had tax increases of over 25 per cent.

Los Angeles County increases ranged up to 19.1 per cent with Los Angeles City increasing its levy seven per cent over that of last year.

Editorial

A 'LONG, HOT, NOISY' SUMMER

Tuesday, a hearing will be held at the meeting of the Board of Supervisors, to determine whether or not Harold Lutz of Alpine will hold motorcycle races on the enlarged track at the Alpine Speedway.

These races have been held every other week for some time even though a variance was not given. They were stopped until such a time as the operators complied with the law. The Planning Commission denied the request of the operators for a use permit and for a variance some weeks ago.

Tuesday will determine whether or not the people of Alpine will have to endure another summer of the noise that they put up with just recently. True, the freeway will take the land on which the races are held. And, incidentally, the state will have to "take another look" at the property, if Harold Lutz is able to establish that he has been conducting a business on this property. However, it is well to note that the state will not have the property clear until about September of next year. They may hope to be able to go ahead on a faster schedule, but in all probability, the motorcycle races will continue to operate for most of the summer, starting the first part of March or April, depending on the weather.

It is up to the people of Alpine who are affected by the noise of this activity, to appear next Tuesday where they may voice a protest. If they do not, they will have to live with the noise — they may well experience a drop in their property values — and the growth of Alpine could be involved, as many will not realize when they come to the area to look at property, that the races will be suspended when the freeway takes over.

The hearing is to be held at the Board of Supervisors meeting, 306 County Administration Center, located at 1600 Pacific Highway in San Diego.

The Town and Country News took a stand against these races on September 2. There has been no change in our opinion. We feel that the races are detrimental to the area. We also feel that they are not being held for the reason given, that of having something for the youth of Alpine. Therefore we would urge all who are opposed, to be at the meeting Tuesday, to voice your opinion before the Supervisors, elected officials of our County.

SERVICE RESTORED, SERVICE PLANNED

During the recent Tecate fire, one mile of telephone line was destroyed at the cost of \$20,000. Service was restored overnight and permanent poles and wires will be replaced.

The Crest fire destroyed 2,500 feet of wire at the cost of \$7,500. This service was restored by Friday morning, after the Thursday night fire.

In other news of the telephone company, there will be a change in the four party lines in the El Cajon district. This change will go into effect on Dec. 10 and the lines will be two party metered. There will still be some eight party lines, however.

Also of interest to this community is the fact that the post pay phone booths will become pre pay on Dec. 4.

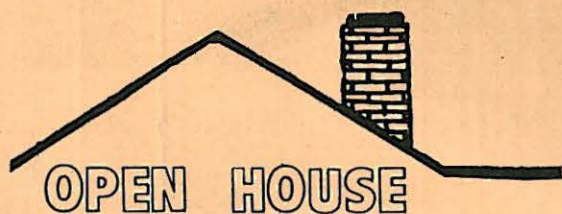

I did write a couple of checks in a hurry at the grocery store and at the pharmacy. I was sure I'd remember the amounts when I got home, but I didn't. And then another thing I did was pay several bills twice. I do wish I knew what to do with the communications I've gotten back from the telephone comp-

any and the gas company and the one from the service station credit card. One of them said cryptically, "CR \$6.90," and another "Your overpayment will be credited to your next month's bill." I haven't mentioned these to Robert, he has enough to worry about; he is already upset at having to check with the bank every day this week on the state of our balance and he didn't like having to make two extra deposits, either.

THE THING THAT upset me most was the communication from the water department. It came on Saturday and didn't get opened till Saturday night and it said if our overdue account with the water dispensers wasn't paid immediately, our supply would be cut off. I didn't even see the water bill this month and I have been afraid to tell Robert about it. The notice said threateningly: "... please call this number immediately if your bill is not paid, and nobody answered the phone at seven o'clock Saturday night. I've been turning faucets on and off every half hour to see whether I'm going to be able to wash my hair this weekend. I shall call first thing Monday to say our check is in the mail but what if it is too late? I am resigning immediately as chancellor of the exchequer and down at the bank they have promised that if I never get involved again, they will not close the account and I am grateful.

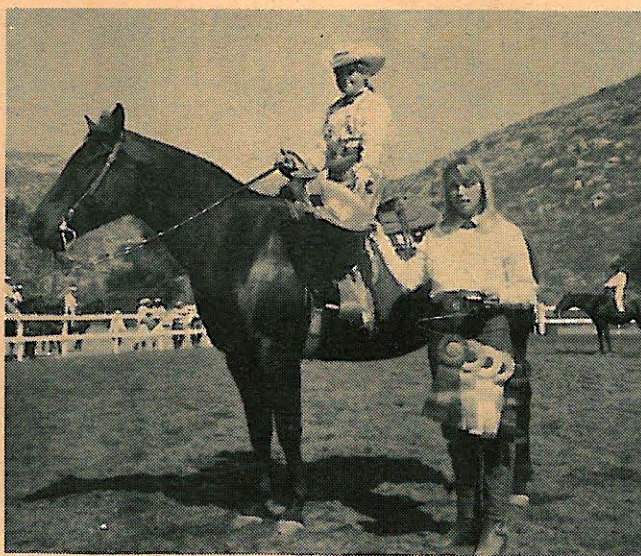

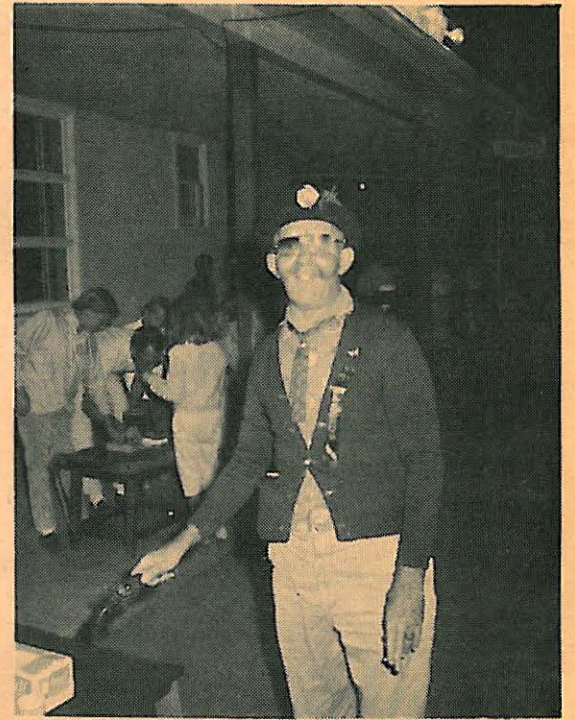

ALPINE RECEIVES MANY SERVICES

Residents of Alpine receive services from many of the 77 member agencies of United Community Services who are supported by the annual campaign now in progress.

A conservative estimate of the amount of UCS dollars spent in direct service to residents of Alpine in 1964 was \$5,475. This figure is in comparison to the approximate \$2,500 raised in Alpine last year.

Services rendered to Alpine by UCS member agencies in 1964 were as follows:

Under the heading of services for the sick or handicapped: Visiting Nurse Association of San Diego County, 144 nursing visits, Mercy-Guadalupe Clinic, two patients from Alpine. San Diego County Association for Retarded Children, two children in day care centers.

Counseling and other special services for children and adults with problems show the following: Family Counseling Service, one family and five interviews. Child Guidance Clinic, one emotionally disturbed child served, Salvation Army Door of Hope, two girls served for 29 total days of care.

In the area of character building service for boys and girls: Boy Scouts of America, two troops with 46 boys and 20 adult leaders, Girl Scouts two troops with 41 girls and 11 adult leaders. In addition to these, there is the Alpine Youth Center which is supported by contributions to the UCS campaign.

According to Alpine UCS campaign chairman the Rev. William Bray, "Alpine residents have a fine thing going with United Community Services. Last year we raised some \$2,500 and they returned \$5,475 in services to us. This is better than two to one. Community pride should encourage residents to give their fair share and level out the difference."

CHRISTMAS SEALS AVAILABLE

SAN DIEGO— Although the 59th Annual Christmas Seal Campaign will not open until Nov. 15, 1965 Christmas Seals are now available for use on gift packages and holiday cards to be sent overseas, according to Leo F. Ryan, Alpine area chairman of the Tuberculosis & Health Association of San Diego County.

Early availability of Christmas Seals stems from the post office request that ordinary overseas Christmas parcels be mailed by Nov. 10. The closing date for overseas air parcels is Dec. 10, he explained.

"Because Christmas Seals, traditional symbols of the battle against tuberculosis and other respiratory diseases, may serve as reminders of home for members of the armed services and others living abroad, we are making them available now," he said.

Christmas Seals may be obtained from the Tuberculosis and Health Assn. of San Diego County at 3861 Front St., San Diego, or by phoning.

To assure that gift parcels reach their destinations in good condition, Ryan urged following of this post office advice:

Put your gifts in boxes of wood, metal, fiberboard or double-faced corrugated cardboard. Use enough cushioning material to prevent articles from rattling or sliding around within the package. Wrap in heavy paper, address it clearly, and tie it securely with strong cord.

"And decorate it with lots of Christmas Seals," Ryan said.

Man Pleads Guilty

SAN DIEGO (CNA) — An Alpine man who turned the tables on a part-time private investigator, pleaded guilty in Superior Court Monday to a charge of possession of a firearm by a felon.

He is Edward Dee Jamison, 28, Rt. 1 Box 381, who was charged with assault with a deadly weapon, robbery and possession of a firearm. The first two counts were dismissed when Jamison pleaded guilty to the third count. Superior Court Judge Verne O. Warner set a probation hearing for Nov. 22.

The charges against Jamison arose during an investigation of him after he made a disability claim.

Santiago K. Sandoval, a Marine Sergeant, was hired by George Price, investigator, to spy on Jamison. Sandoval, hiding in shrubbery near the Jamison home, was seen by Mrs. Jamison from inside the house. She took a gun outside to her husband.

Jamison, threatening Sandoval with the gun, held him for two hours and took \$30 worth of film — allegedly showing Jamison doing carpentry work — before releasing the sergeant.

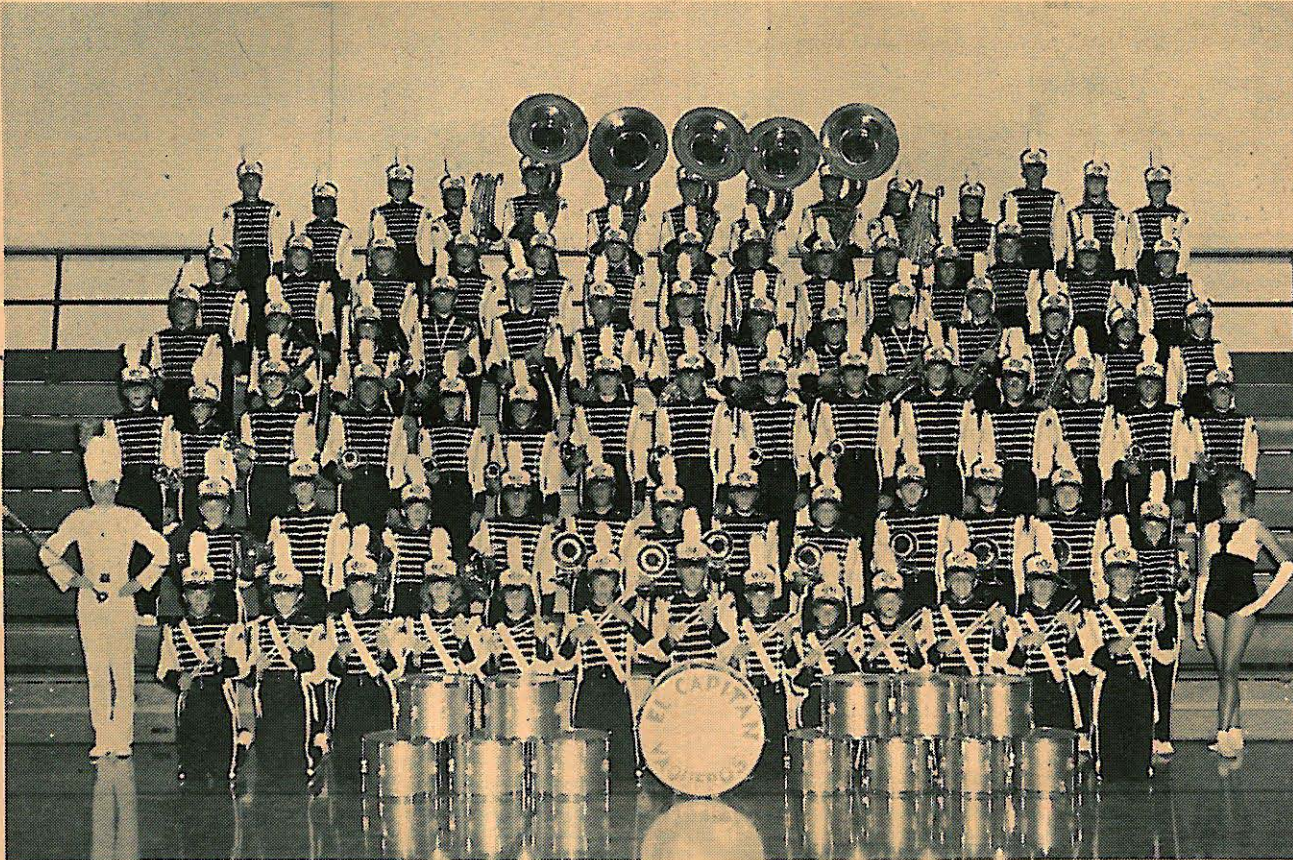

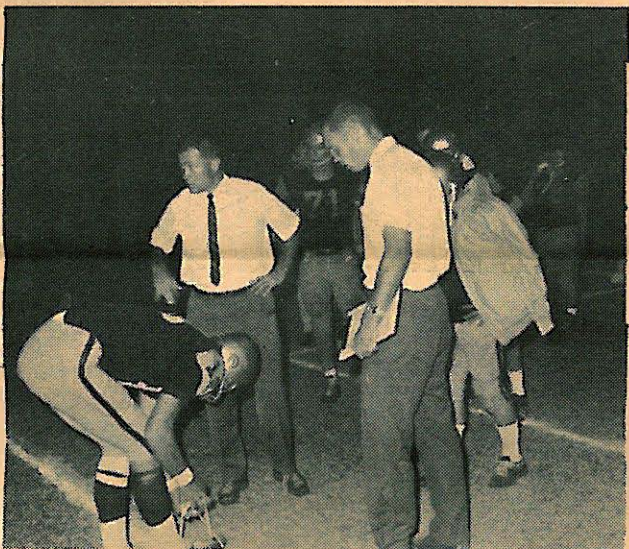
