



## Christmas Decoration Winners Selected

ALPINE — The Alpine Chamber of Commerce has selected two winners for their annual Christmas decoration contest. The judging was more difficult this year as so many more homes and businesses were in the holiday spirit.

The committee, headed by Ron Van Til, will suggest to the Chamber of Commerce that next year a committee be chosen earlier in the year and more categories be added to the list. They feel that it is essential that a committee be formed well in advance of the season so that proper time can be given to the contest.

Winning the trophy in the commercial category was the Alpine Convalescent Center. This was the second year in a row that the Center has won the award.

Mrs. Theo Jones of Hwy. 80 was the winner in the residential category. Mrs. Jones had decorated nine trees in the area of her two-story home. The effect of these decorations, was, in the opinion of the judges, superior to all other residences.

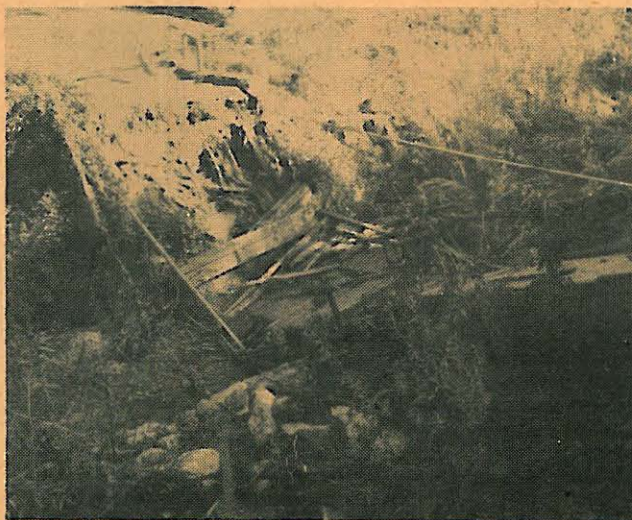

## Editorial

# 'Please don't print it' —an often heard plea

EVERY NEWSPAPER worth the name is regularly forced to say "sorry" to well-intentioned but misguided citizens who ask that legitimate news not be published because "it might hurt" someone or some institution or some project.

Recently several Imlay City school-teachers petitioned that their principal be fired. It was suggested that this unusual happening not be reported because "everybody in town knows about it anyway" so why hurt the school's image throughout the county. (This suggestion came from some "interested citizens;" it did not come from any school official.)

In the first place, everybody did not know about the petition. But that's not the point. The point is that the teachers and the principal are employees of the public. The public has a right—even a duty—to be informed as to what it is getting for its tax money. The 22 citizens who attended the school board meeting heard the facts. Other citizens shouldn't be denied these facts because they weren't to expect to read them in their newspaper.

Another example: Recently a town-sheriff official told us that "the boys on the board" would just as soon the public didn't find out what they had paid for a piece of equipment. In other words, don't tell the taxpayer what is happening to his money. Such blatant requests to suppress the news are almost too ridiculous to bother answering.

As we said, every worthwhile newspaper has the same problem. Here's what the Arenac County Independent said in an editorial recently.

"If we've heard it once we've heard it a thousand times: 'Please don't report that. It will weaken the chances for the project' . . . or weaken the city's

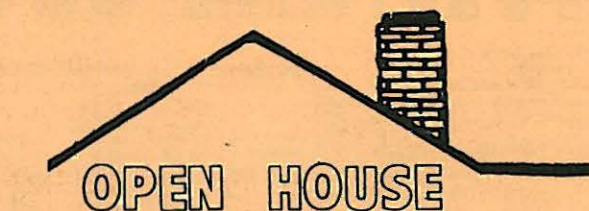

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
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# Church News

"Although there are adequate lines to most points throughout the nation, may calls are bound to be delayed when so many people call at one time," Greenwood said. A tip to local residents who plan holiday long distance is to "make it early" or wait until just after the holiday.

Another tip from the telephone company is to be sure you dial the long distance access code "1" before dialing beyond your local calling area.

After hearing, found that the Master Plan of Branch Administrative Centers has been substantially implemented, and that the unimplemented portion of said master plan is obsolete and no longer necessarily constitutes an appropriate guide for the establishment of San Diego County Branch Administrative Centers and declared that said Master Plan is of no further force and effect. 101. After hearing on application No. P65-146 of Maggie Shoemaker for a special use permit for a rest home for a maximum of 12 guests on property located at 2205 El Prado, Lemon Grove Section, closed the hearing except for the viewing of the site by the Board members and ordered action held in abeyance thereon.
