USE PERMIT APPEAL REJECTED

SAN DIEGO—At a regularly scheduled meeting of the Board of Supervisors Tuesday afternoon, the application for a special use permit for Ernest Leezy was rejected.

Henry J. Boney, Supervisor for the second district, made the motion to deny the permit and to uphold the decision of the Planning Commission. The vote was unanimous.

Rodeo grounds had been planned for the Harbison Canyon location. Although the Board of Supervisors made it clear that they considered the activity of a rodeo a fine and desirable pastime, they denied the appeal because of the location of the proposed rodeo, adjacent to school grounds.

Sheriff Joe O'Connor made an appearance at the hearing. He stated that he would have to oppose the proposal because of the law enforcement problem and the safety factor for the children in the school.

RIVERSIDE—San Diego County 4-H'ers will compete for top awards at the Southern California 4-H Club Field Day in Riverside, Saturday, May 22.

Among the speakers on the program will be the Rev. Dr. Henry Pitney Van Dusen, president emeritus of Union

Theological Seminary, New York City; the Rev. Dr. Gerhard Spiegler, professor of contemporary theology, Berkeley Baptist Divinity School; Bishop Gerald Kennedy, The Methodist Church in Los Angeles; and the Rev. O. Dean Nelson, pastor of the First Baptist Church, Park Ridge, Ill.

Special recognition will be given on Friday evening, May 21, to the founding of the United Nations, which occurred 20 years ago in San Francisco. Mr. Harold E. Stassen of Philadelphia, will be honored for his contribution as one of the original architects of the U. N. Charter.

Editorial

A few weeks ago, an incident occurred that could have ended in tragedy, except for the quick thinking of one of our fine school bus drivers, William House.

As for the incident, there would be nothing accomplished in relating all the details. However, a mail box on Highway 80 was sideswiped and we can only be thankful that it was not the school bus nor the little girl who ran to safety.

The incident occurred, apparently, because of the ignorance of a driver concerning just what to do when a school bus stops. We may say she drives a car; she should know the law. But upon questioning the Motor Vehicle Department and upon studying the California Vehicle Code summary, we can see some cause for her confusion.

First of all the law states that "When you come to a school bus equipped with a flashing red light, and the light is flashing, stop." However it does not go on to indicate what a driver should do when the bus has come to a stop and the amber lights are on. Later on, in referring to traffic lights, the code declares "A flashing yellow light is a warning to slow down and drive carefully." So we may presume, no doubt, that the yellow light on the school bus may also mean this. But where in the law is that presented to the driver?

There have been numerous changes in the law over the years and it may be presumed that there is much confusion. In conferring with the Motor Vehicle Department we found much interest in this phase of the law but they could not find in their many books of law, a specific law covering this situation. It would appear that the Motor Vehicle Code Summary (the book we all read for our driver's license test) should clarify this portion of the law so that near-tragedies, and actual tragedies, might be avoided.

ALCOHOLICS UNANIMOUS

QUESTION: Is there any cure for alcoholism?

ANSWER: No, none; once an alcoholic, always an alcoholic. The only hope for the millions of us who are afflicted with this disease is total abstinence, on an all-time basis.

It makes no difference how long you've been off the grog, if you're an alcoholic you're always as close to a drunk as the next drink; all it takes is ONE drink of ANYTHING to send us off on the kind of God-only-knows-when-it-will-end drunk we alcoholics inflict on ourselves.

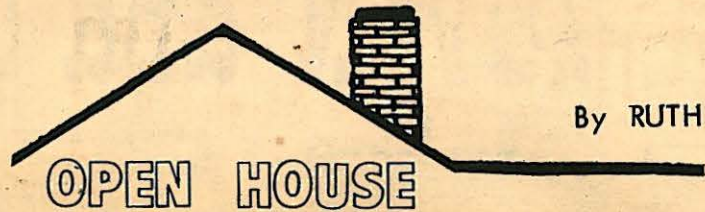
To give you an example: I was sober for over twelve years and an active member of that wonderful group of sober alcoholics known as Alcoholics Anonymous; after having been sober all this time I got too big for my britches, concluded I'd become grown up enough and well educated enough to be able to handle my liquor like a gentleman, and conducted what AA's call an "experiment." We-e-e-ell, the little drink I intended to take stretched out to over a five-year drunk; it cost me my business, my standing in the community, my wife and family (three lovely children) and all the fringe miseries which always go with any drinking done by we who are alcoholics.

QUESTION: My husband has not drawn a completely sober breath for more than ten years. When I finally reached the end of my patience I gave him the alternative of either joining Alcoholics Anonymous and getting sober and staying sober, or losing me as his wife. I meant it and I still mean it. A person can stand just so much and I've had it, I've had it, I've had it!

I realize divorce never settles anything and I truly hate the thought of breaking up our family (we have four wonderful children, one boy and three girls, but despite the fact that when he is sober he is a wonderful husband and father, I simply can't go on like this and keep my sanity. He has been putting off going to Alcoholics Anonymous meetings or phoning them for help because he has never been sober enough to consider himself eligible to do so. Does he HAVE to be sober to attend their meetings or to call them for advice or help?

ANSWER: No. For instance I have a good friend who is now a fine attorney with a successful practice in Fullerton who has been sober for nearly twenty years. He is a credit to his profession and to his community. Twenty-seven years ago, when the awful truth that he had an alcohol problem dawned on him, he attended AA meetings for seven whole years, drunk, before the message finally filtered through his rum-dumb brain and he sobered up and "made the program" as they say in AA jargon.

Naturally, it's better to go with a clear head, but it's not a condition demand. It would be best, probably, to either shake it out by himself, if he can, or to go to a professional "drying-out" sanitarium (lots

OPEN HOUSE

IF YOU HAVE A TENDENCY TO PUT OFF doing unpleasant chores, you are not at all unusual. I know that I am an expert at procrastination and so is my husband. Robert will labor long and hard—longer and harder than anyone I have ever met, to finish an intriguing and interesting job. WHEN HE FINALLY REACHES THE breakfast table, he eats slowly, savoring every bit, perusing the morning paper with deliberation and commenting at length on the sad state of affairs locally and all over the world. He does not seem to be a man in a hurry. Breakfast over, it is time to locate all the tools he will need on this particular job. "Did you notice, by any chance, that large hammer with the black handle?" or "Have you seen anything of the blow torch I brought home last night?" It is highly unlikely that I have knowledge of either item but it does make for conversation. Then—"Where did I put my tobacco pouch?" and, of course, "I can't find my other pipe."

THE HOUR GROWS LATER, AND NOW HE decides that it would be wise to "take the other car." This involves a lengthy transfer of tools from one car to another which seems to go on interminably. Finally, "Well, good-bye," he says, ostensibly departing, but I know the front door will re-open almost

immediately and he will say: "I forgot my coveralls," or "I just realized you have the trunk key," or even, if he is desperate, "Do you suppose I have time for another cup of coffee?"

OCCASIONALLY HE WILL SUDDENLY recall a vital phone call he must make and time marches on. When he runs out of excuses, legitimate or otherwise, he will be off and the job, whatever it is, will be completed in due course. The last time we went through this routine, I shall always suspect that Robert carried things to unnecessary extremes, but I will never be really sure. The alarm was set for a quarter to five. 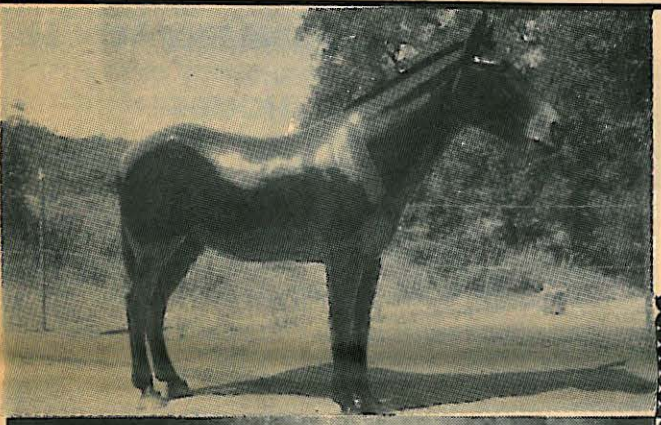

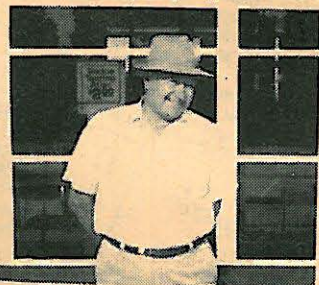
BOB WILSON, owner of the Texaco Station in Alpine:

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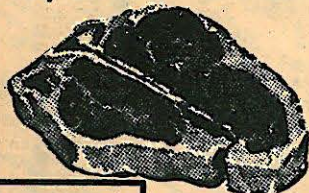

Rodeo Grounds Rejection Questioned

ALPINE — The usual trans-
quil meeting of the Alpine
School Board, on Tuesday
night was confronted with the
issue concerning the proposed
Rodeo grounds in Harbison
Canyon.

Ernest (Jack) Leazy came to
the meeting to question the
negative action of the board
at the planning commission
meeting last Friday.

Mr. Leazy was also irate
concerning certain state-
ments published in an area
daily newspaper, about the
Rodeo ground plans.

Charles Campbell, chair-
man of the School Board, as-
sured Leazy that the Board
had made their position very
clear in the letter (included
at the end of this story) which
was sent to the planning com-
mission. Any other state-
ments that had been made
should be taken up with those
persons who allegedly made
them, according to Camp-
bell.

The following is the letter
from the Alpine Union School
District Board of Trustees to
the San Diego Planning Com-
mission, dated April 8, 1965,
concerning the notice of pro-
posed special use permit, Ref.
P65-40.

At a special called meeting
of the Board of Trustees held
April 8, 1965, this board went
on record opposing the grant-
ing of this permit by a 4-0
vote.

While we feel this type of
recreation has a place in our
society for those who enjoy it

we do not feel that rodeo
grounds on property adjoining
a school is the proper location
for such an activity. Neither
do we feel that this would be
to the best interest of the area
in future development. We
are sure there are other sites
which could be used for this
proposed activity which are
located adjacent to school
property and would be less
objectional from our point
of view.

Policing the area would be
a necessity if the school and
grounds are not to be over-
run and damaged by people
who have no particular re-
sponsibility to the commu-
nity. This policing problem
will become more acute if a
beer license is granted. Said
license to be applied for
since the only police protec-
tion available in the area is
that afforded by the limited
resources of the Sheriff's office
it may well become a prob-
lem area.

We feel the granting of this
permit would not be an
asset to our school and there-
fore urge the Commission to
deny it for this particular site.

Nuclear Station Averages Over 300 Visitors A Day

SAN DIEGO — The San Ono-
fre Nuclear Generating Sta-
tion is fast becoming a major
attraction in Southern Cali-
fornia.

There is no age barrier in
curiosity and old folks, young
folks, and in-between folks
come to see how the Infor-
mation Center will be har-
nessed and put to work.

The nuclear generating sta-
tion is being constructed for
San Diego Gas & Electric and
Southern California Edison.

Companies on the ocean side
of Highway 101 about five
miles south of San Clemente.
When it starts operation in
1967 the station will generate
up to 450,000 kilowatts of
electricity — enough for a
city of more than half a mil-
lion persons.

With interest already at a
high pitch nearly 16,000 per-
sons have visited the station's
Nuclear Information Center
since it was opened seven
weeks ago on a bluff over-
looking construction. The
hours are 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.

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HORSE NEWS

SPRING IS HERE in all its glory! Our filly loses herself in the tall grass, the filaree is up to my boot tops, the skeeters are out and bitin', and the trail beckons to all of us.

ONE OF THE nicest places in San Diego County for good trail riding is Cuyamaca Rancho State Park, north of Descanso on Highway 79. There's over 20,000 acres in the park, more than 50 miles of good trail, and two campgrounds for horsemen. Los Caballos, a campground with 16 campsites, 62 corrals and a modern restroom with hot showers, is for family horse-camping. The other one, the Horsemen's Group Camp, has 20 corrals, accommodations for 120 people, and also has a modern restroom with hot showers. The group camp must be reserved in advance and is open to organized groups only. For further information on these camps, write to the Park Supervisor, Cuyamaca Rancho State Park, P.O. Box 338, Julian, or phone 714-765-0755.

FOR THE NEXT two months the wildflowers will be blooming and right now the streams are running merrily along on their long trip to the ocean. One day last winter I rode "Rocky", my gelding, up to Cuyamaca Peak. The visibility was so good I could see clear out to San Clemente Island and turning around to the east, the desert and the Salton Sea.

SOME OF THE things we should always remember when out on the trail: 1) Don't smoke in the saddle! 2) Don't be a litterbug! Matter of fact, try picking up the litter you see and putting it in your saddlebags to dump in a trash barrel when you come to one. It makes you feel good. Also makes the trail look good. 3) Remember that others use the trails, so let's conduct ourselves in a manner that brings praise, not criticism, to horsemen. 4) Stay on the trail when crossing private property and don't molest livestock. 5) Leave all gates the same as you find them.

IF WE HORSEMEN ever hope to get new trails, we had better get out and use the existing ones and apply proper manners when using them. In some parts of this state, landowners would run you off if you asked for a trail easement through their land. Why? They've had bad luck in the past with hikers and horsemen, or their friends have spread the word. Let's do all we can to change the situation.

NATION-WIDE STICKER ON SALE

CLEVELAND NATIONAL FOREST — The new Recreation-Conservation sticker, authorized under the Land and Water Conservation Fund Act of 1965, went on sale yesterday in various U. S. Forest offices here.

Forest Supervisor Stanley R. Stevenson said the new sticker will sell for \$7 and will entitle the driver of a non-commercial auto and his passengers admission to designated Federal recreation areas for the year. The sticker allows entrance to National Parks as well as National Forest campground and picnic areas. The sticker is optional, however, and single daily visit fees may be paid instead.

Under the new legislation, all proceeds will be set aside in the Land and Water Conservation Fund. State and federal agencies will share the revenues subject to Congressional Appropriation procedures. 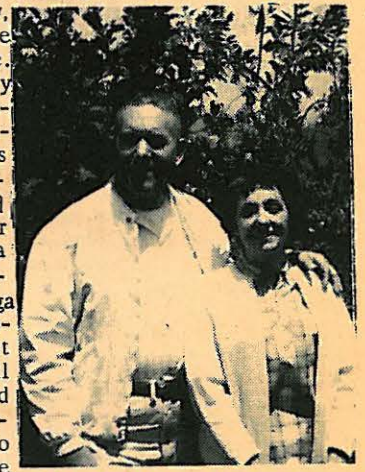

GOPHER ACTIVITY SHOULD BE UNDER STRICT CONTROL

SAN DIEGO — The importance of gopher control in avocado orchards cannot be over-emphasized. "Gopher activity has increased in the past few weeks," reports University of California Farm Advisor Don Gustafson. Activity can be expected to continue. Gophers attack both young and old trees and constant observation of the orchard for signs of gopher activity is required. Irrigated orchards have good cover-crop growth, besides the trees, which entice the gopher to greener pastures. Gophers will eat bark from roots and trunk, frequently causing a girdling of the tree below ground. Gopher activity is usually evident by the mounds of soil present in an orchard. Occasionally new tunnels will be dug without mounds being made. This is done by the filling of old runways with dirt from the newly dug tunnels.

Any tree showing sudden wilting, reduced vigor or other signs of distress may have been injured by gophers. Damage usually is unnoticed until the tree begins to show these symptoms.

Control of gophers may be done by a number of methods: Trapping, poisoning and fumigation. The success of any method depends upon the grower and his persistence in eliminating the pest from the orchard.

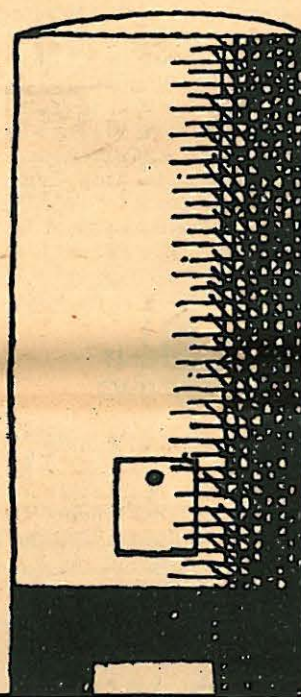
