

Retirement Community to Locate in Alpine

LARGE DEVELOPMENT FOR ALPINE IN PLANNING STAGES

ALPINE — In an interview with Christopher D. Sickles of the Capital Services Co. of San Diego, the Town and Country News has learned that this company is purchasing the Dinosaur Park property, east of town on Highway 80, to build a retirement community of 100 to 150 apartments for retired citizens, but only a small group is planned to begin the development. Construction will commence in five or six months, dependent upon the availability of funds for the project. The company is in the process of searching for these funds at the present time.

"We intend to build a retirement community of the finest type available," asserted Sickles Monday. In connection with the Senior Citizen development, there will be a boarding home for the aged.

When asked about the surrounding grounds, Sickles said that they will be left intact, with the exception of only one or two trees. There will be running streams and natural pools, along with swimming pools and all kinds of recreation for the residents of the Center.

The property will include some 30 acres, which will run from the present Highway 80 to the area where the new freeway will be located.

It is hoped that eventually there will be from two to three

The initial development should reach the one million mark, with a five million dollar development foreseen for the future.

Dr. John Robuck, who is connected with Sickles in his other projects, will also be a part of this particular venture.

Commenting upon the future of Alpine, Sickles said that with the wonderful climate Alpine has to offer, a natural here. It could be the beginning of a continuing growth that can foster the economy of Alpine without undesirable over-development.

For the present, the Dinosaur Park will continue with its recreation facilities.

Throughout the United States, Western's purchases came to over \$1.2 billion from some 43,000 suppliers.

ALPINE — Southern California's business activity advanced to an all-time high during the month of May after encountering moderate fluctuations earlier in the year, M. Ross Mallette, manager of Security First National Bank's branch, reported recently.

The local economy, as measured by the bank's business index, set a record high of 145.1 (estimated) to surpass the previous high of 144 (preliminary) set in April, 1965, Mallette said.

On a year-to-year comparison, the economy in the 14-county area currently is operating at a two percent level above a year ago, Mallette stated.

According to the bank officer, department store sales and bank clearings paced the index's components available for the month of May.

JUNE IS DAIRY MONTH

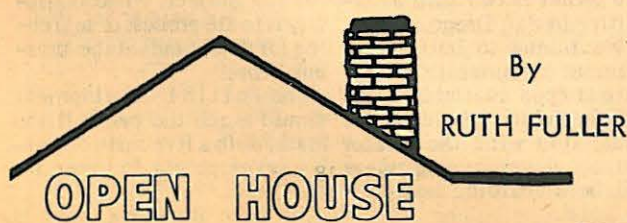
Milk's whole is greater than the sum of all its parts, reminds Alex Moore of Dairy Valley, June Dairy Month state chairman. It stands out as a source of calcium, protein, vitamin A and riboflavin, and also gives us some of all other known nutrients.

Calcium helps to build bones, teeth and tissues in children. Adults need it to maintain bones, to help muscles contract and relax, to help nerves transmit messages and for blood to clot.

Protein is valued for its ability to build, repair and maintain the body. Amino acids are the building materials in proteins. The body can manufacture some of these amino acids but not all.

Vitamin A helps keep skin clear and smooth, mucous membranes firm and resistant to infection. It protects against night blindness and helps control bone growth.

Riboflavin helps cells to use oxygen; helps to keep skin, tongue and lips normal; and aids in preventing scaly, greasy skin around the mouth and nose.

NOW IS THE time to get your horses vaccinated for equine influenza and encephalitis (sleeping sickness). Two years ago there was quite an outbreak of influenza in San

Diego County, quite possibly aggravated by large numbers of horses getting together in the same area, like the fair at Del Mar. Last year influenza again took its toll on many good horses, many were unable to be used for the whole summer. Last summer in the Campo area encephalitis occurred and, can occur more frequently any place where mosquitos are numerous. Why take a chance? See your veterinarian and give your horses the protection they need against these two serious diseases. Of course, you haven't forgotten Tetanus Toxoid and/or boosters.

POST OFFICE INVITATION EXTENDED

ALPINE — Postmaster Phil Hall today invited residents of Alpine to visit the special post office and exhibit at the New York World's Fair.

Highlight of the display is the nation's most famous postal error, the 1918 twenty-four cent airmail stamp with the up-side-down mail plane, the postmaster said.

In addition to original die proofs of the "mistake" and other philatelic rarities connected with the airmail invert, the post office features an exhibit on the development of the John F. Kennedy Memorial Stamp and a special branch of the Post Office Department's Philatelic Sales Agency, offering a complete stock of all commemorative issues now available.

Visitors to the modern postal installation will receive a free commemorative cachet envelope picturing the post office.

The most up-to-date postal equipment in use, and several experimental models, are installed in the World's Fair Post Office. One mechanism mechanically places letters on their long end, spots the stamp and, if necessary, flips the envelopes so that they are in the proper position and then cancels them. Another device over 70 feet long, contains 12 stations from which postal clerks direct letters into nearly 300 bins as they separate the mail for speedy delivery.

The World's Fair Post Office processes approximately 250,000 pieces of mail each day. Visitors are able to see all operations from a ramp which circles the work area. A tape recorded commentary explains the action.

Twenty-one mail boxes from every area of the world line the entrance walk.

UNUSUAL BIRTH IS ANNOUNCED

JAMUL — Mrs. Claudia Bess has reported the birth of five baby goats. The unusual amount is unique, particularly since all of them lived. The mother goat usually has one or two, and rarely more than three at one time.

Each one of the small animals is with the mother and all are feeding. They have been de-horned.

Mrs. Bess shows her fine goats at various fairs. She won ten firsts at Imperial and has also won awards at other fairs. She will be showing at Del Mar and Pomona.

The La Honda Springs Ranch where Mrs. Bess raises her goats is located in Jamul and Mrs. Bess has raised fine goats since 1947. They are pure bred and shipped to all parts of the United States and to foreign countries.

BIDS ARE SOUGHT FOR FREEWAY

SAN DIEGO — The California Division of Highways is currently seeking bids for the construction of an additional 1 1/2 miles of Interstate 8 freeway in San Diego County, announced Jacob Dekema, District Engineer.

Dekema said the construction project would call for the grading and paving of a four-lane freeway between 4.5 miles and 2.8 miles west of Alpine ending near the Harbison Canyon turn off.

Also included in the project will be the construction of an interchange at Dunbar Lane as well as frontage roads connecting to existing Highway 80.

Bids will be opened in Los Angeles, July 29, and if found to be satisfactory work could be under way in August.
