Mrs. Hazel Foster, Horse Show manager, will shortly announce the names of the officials secured for the show as well as the number and types of classes to be included. Tom Casey will assist her. Mrs. Myrtle Hoffelder is the Horse Show secretary and will assist in the publicity. Mrs. Katherine Black has been appointed to take charge of the entertainment.

Bob Wilson, Jack Hoistad and Al Hinkle are committee members at large, busily engaged in various timely projects.

Orville Palmer is in charge of securing advertising for the 1965 Horse Show program and securing sponsors for the 40 classes. He has been ably assisted by Paul Nichols and Corky Jones and reports good

response for this early date. However, an effort is being made to contact all the business firms for their support and if any have not been approached, Mr. Palmer will deem it a favor if such firms will contact his committee direct.

A few more sponsors can be accommodated and, as was done in previous years, a group of cooperative residents may assist by subscribing toward sponsoring one or more of these events. Inquiries may be made to either of the committee members or to the Chamber of Commerce office.

Further details will be forthcoming as plans are finalized.

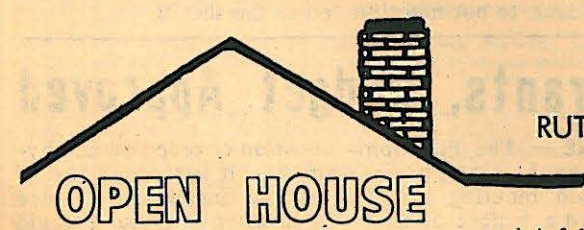
Ward gave them a tour of our lovely park.

San Diego County, between 1.0 mile west of Hatritt Road and 2.8 miles west of Alpine (11-S.D.-3-R20.9/R26.7), about 1.6 miles in net length, divided roadway to be constructed by grading and surfacing with asphalt concrete on asphalt concrete base and aggregate base and one bridge to be constructed.

Bids are required for the entire work described herein.

The Department of Public Works, in accordance with the provisions of Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964 (78 Stat. 252) and the Regulations of the Department of Commerce (15 C.F.R., Part 8), issued pursuant to such Act, hereby notifies all bidders that it will affirmatively insure that the contract entered into pursuant to this advertisement will be awarded to the lowest responsible bidder without discrimination on the ground of race, color, or national origin.

The Department of Public Works reserves the right to reject any or all bids.

This contract is subject to the Work Hours Act of 1962, PL87-581, and implementing regulations, as further set forth under "Federal Requirements" of these special provisions.

Minimum wage rates for this project have been predetermined by the Secretary of Labor and are set forth in the special provisions. In the event there is a difference between the minimum wage rates as predetermined by the Secretary of Labor and the prevailing wage rates as determined by the Department of Public Works for similar classifications of labor, the Contractor and his subcontractors shall pay not less than the wage rate which is the higher of the two.

Abbreviations used in the schedule of predetermined wage rates in conjunction with employer payments listed in the right hand columns are identified as follows:

Table with columns for abbreviations and their meanings: ph per hour, pdw per day, etc.

Employer payments other than those itemized herein, as defined in Section 1773.1 of the Labor Code, are to be paid in accordance with the terms of the collective bargaining agreement applicable to the type of classification of the workmen or mechanics employed on the project.

Overtime, Sundays and Holidays—not less than one and one-half (1 1/2) times the basic hourly rate plus applicable employer payments. The holidays upon which such rates shall be paid shall be all holidays recognized in the collective bargaining agreement applicable to the particular craft, classification or type of workman employed on the project.

Copies of all collective bargaining agreements relating to the work as set forth in the aforementioned Labor Code are on file and available for inspection in the office of the Department of Industrial Relations, Division of Labor Statistics and Research.

Attention is directed to Section 7-1.01G of the Standard Specifications providing for employment of apprentices on the work. Every such apprentice shall be paid the standard wage paid to apprentices under the regulations of the trade at which he is employed. Information relative to employment of apprentices shall be obtained from the Director of the Department of Industrial Relations, who is the Administrative Officer of the California Apprenticeship Council.

Notice is hereby given that the Alpine Union School District of San Diego County, California, acting by and through its Governing Board, hereinafter referred to as the District, will receive up to, but not later than 8 o'clock p.m. of the 12th day of July 1965, sealed bids for the award of a contract for all work in connection with:

- 1) Grading and Paving at Alpine Union School, located on Highway 80, Alpine, California; AND/OR
2) Furnishing and installing cabinets in classrooms of the Alpine Union School, located as above.

Such bids shall be received in the Auditorium of the Alpine Elementary School Building and shall be opened and publicly read aloud at the above stated time and place.

Each bid must conform and be responsive to this invitation, the Information for Bidders, the Specifications, the Plans, and all the other documents comprising the pertinent Contract Documents. Copies of the Contract Documents are now on file and may be obtained in the office of the Alpine Union School, Highway 80, Alpine, California.

Each bid shall be accompanied by a certified or cashier's check payable to the District, or a satisfactory bid bond in favor of the District executed by the bidder as principal, and a satisfactory surety company as surety, in an amount not less than 5% of the maximum amount of the bid. The check or bid bond shall be given as a guarantee that the bidder shall execute the contract if it be awarded to him in conformity with the Contract Documents, and shall provide the surety bond or bonds as specified therein within five (5) days after notification of the award of the contract to the bidder.

The District reserves the right to reject any or all bids or to waive any irregularities or informalities in any bids or in the bidding. Preference will be made in the award for California made supplies, pursuant to sections 4330 to 4334, inclusive, Government Code.

The District has determined the prevailing rate of per diem wages in the locality in which this work is to be performed for each craft or type of workman needed to execute the contract, which will be awarded to the successful bidder, to be as follows:
