The celebrated star has appeared rarely in San Diego, Van Deerlin, who is making arrangements for Williams' appearance, said "the great ex-San Diegan will have a homecoming among the people he likes most to be with — the kids."

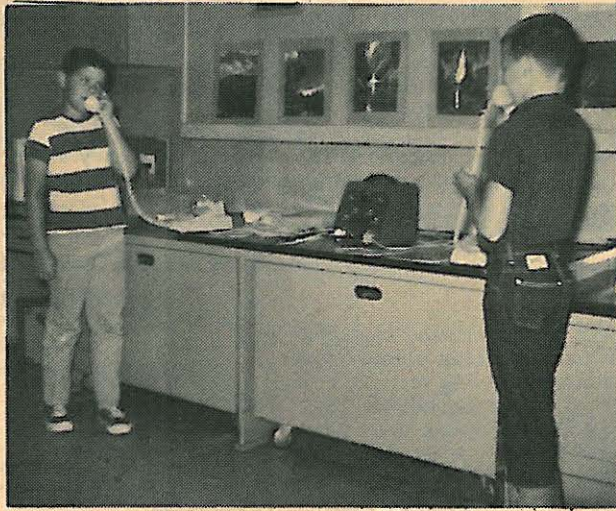

CAMPO — The annual Campo Indian Fiesta will begin Friday, July 16th with Mass at 10 a. m. at the Campo Mission Church on the Campo Indian Reservation.

Friday evening and Saturday and Sunday, the 17th and 18th of July, there will be old traditional Diegueno songs and dances, including the seldom-seen fire dance. The traditional peon game will be played. No admission will be charged for the event.

Indian music will be performed. The Campo Indians have not performed for almost five years.

Games will be included for children and there will be prizes also.

The festivities on Saturday will begin with a flag raising ceremony at 11 a. m. Indian and Mexican food will be served for lunch and dinner and will be served from the old stype willow ramadas or booths.

Cristobal Pinto, spokesman for the Reservation, is in charge of the fiesta.

Some of the people who are responsible for the event are: Mrs. Rosa Largo, Helen Hyde, Rosalie Robertson, Gene Carzosa, Jack Dyche, Chris Pinto, Jack Dyke, Mabel Mesa and Ward Cushing.

The Cocopas are planning to send a singing and dancing group to the affair to compete with the best of the old Diegueno singers.

Several booths are planning to donate the money they earn to the Flying Samaritans. It is hoped that they can raise enough to build a small clinic in the hills outside of Tecate which will serve the Mexican branch of the Diegueno Indians.

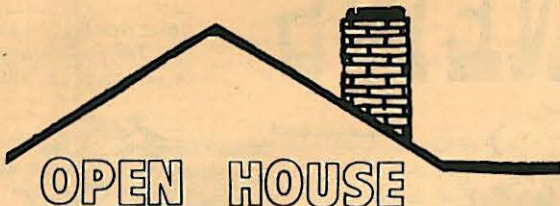

If . . . grassy weeds are making gravelled areas unsightly, control them the easy way with a combination weed killer and soil sterilant available at your nursery.

You can get a . . . tropical effect in your July garden by planting Rice Paper Plant, bamboo, small palms, New Zealand Flax and other exotic plants on display now.

For something different . . . in late summer and fall, plant the lovely Scarborough Lily (Vallota) from containers now. It will produce brilliant orange-vermillion flowers this year in clusters of four or five on short, heavy stalks. It likes to be grown in pots and don't be afraid to use a small one as crowding produces better blooms.

A mulch around . . . shrubby plantings and on flower beds will help to hold moisture in the soil and keep the surface looking neat and clean. Best of all, it keeps down weeds. Check with your nurseryman on the difference mulches available.

All trees and shrubs can . . . be planted in containers, now. Keep them well watered through hot weather.

1W. Authorized the District Attorney to take appropriate action to obtain completed Statement of Responsible Relative form (AG225) from the responsible relative of a recipient of Old Age Security.

3. Accepted, with thanks \$50.00 donated by Frank W. Burr; and authorized the expenditure by the Department of Public Welfare, through Welfare Agency Trust Fund No. 5114, of said gift for the purpose indicated by the donor.

4. Authorized the continued granting of General Relief to two needy cases.

5. Authorized the granting of General Relief to one needy case.

6. Authorized the expenditure of \$240.00 per month, including clothing, for a 17-year-old boy placed by the Probation Department at the Boys Republic in Chino, California, on April 1, 1964.

7.
