He has traveled far and wide to take in the famous natural wonders of the west and gives glowing descriptions of the caverns, badlands, lava beds and other natural scenic places which are off the path for many vacationers.

The list of occupations of Mr. Smith reads like that of ten men and includes everything from salesman to cowboy to artist. His vast experience has made Mr. Smith somewhat of a "character" himself by today's standards and he weaves many a tale of the old west as though he had actually been around over a century ago. Mr. Smith was an inventor among other things and is credited with inventing the first cotton bollie puller, a 10 to 1 concrete blocking machine, a 12 in 1 leather worker's machine and originated chemical processing concrete.

Mr. Smith has located in Alpine, enjoys the climate, and plans to stay and make his home here.

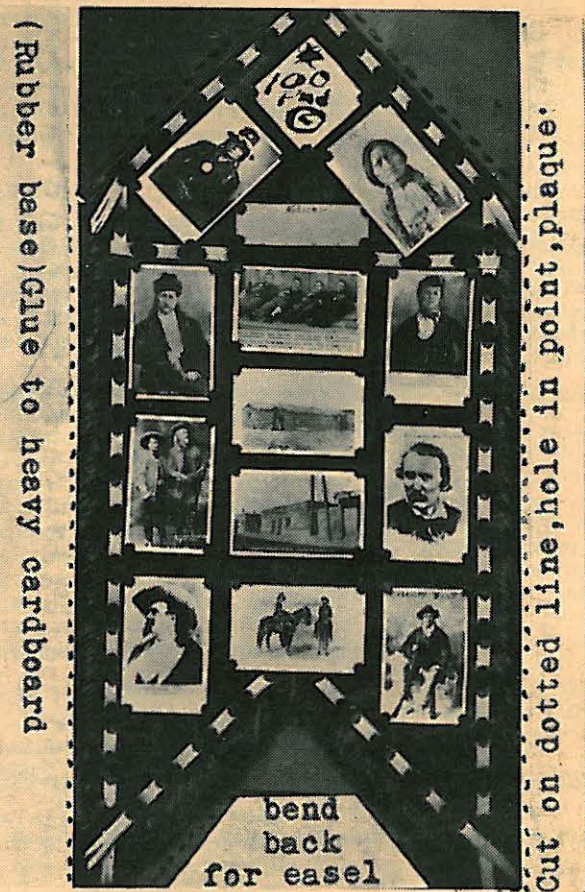
Demonstrations of the new fire truck will be held at 2 and 4 p.m. and the new fire fighting equipment will be on display for public inspection.

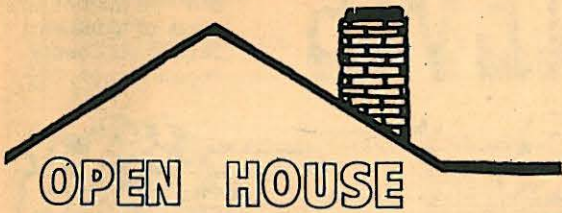

ROBERT HAS BEEN viewing the drapes in our home with disfavor, and hinting broadly that something should be done about them. I think he has in mind that I should make some new ones. I've been looking at ready-made window decorations, and find that the ones I like are way out of line as far as our current budget is concerned. This is because our current budget is in a miserable state. I know a lot of people who can successfully make not only drapes and slipcovers but manufacture all their own clothes as well, and I envy these people. Every time I drag out the sewing machine and spend money for materials I am reminded of the class in sewing I took in high school which wound up in a nervous breakdown for the instructor. At least, she didn't return the following semester and I think it was my fault.

THINGS BEGAN WELL enough when I managed to turn out a simple apron, but success went to my head and my next project was a dress for my sister. I got a fairly simple pattern and some bright orange material and set happily to work. But there were two patch pockets on the dress and they were my downfall. I cut out all the pieces, assembled them more or less accurately and then the day came when I had to put the pockets on. I basted them in place and the teacher came around to inspect my work. She said, "I am sorry, but these pockets are not on straight." And she held my master-

piece up to ridicule and scorn; the class giggled at the way they slanted this way and that.

AND SO I ripped them off, and next day measured and basted them on again. This time they were even more erratic and the teacher said they were worse than ever. I tried again. Next day, and the day after that. It got so that the whole class waited with bated breath before taking up its own collective chores, to see if my pockets would make it. All through the rest of the semester I struggled until both the teacher and I were making excuses to stay home and skip class. I lost weight; sewing class was right after lunch, and I worried so much I couldn't eat lunch. I had nightmares about mis-matched pockets.

BUT FINALLY, ONE glorious day, the gaunt and haggard teacher held up my dress in trembling hands -- and an unrehearsed cheer went up from the class; the pockets matched at last! The material was worn and full of holes -- the whole dress seemed a bit battered, but I happily sewed those pockets firmly into place. I proudly took the dress home and presented it to my sister, who viewed it with loathing and said she didn't like it; she hated orange and the pockets were too big.

AFTER DUE CONSIDERATION, I think one of my charge accounts just might cover the cost of new drapes -- really, sewing just isn't my forte!
