fornia Highway Commission today took under consideration the adoption of a revised freeway routing for approximately 6.4 miles of Interstate 8 in San Diego County, between 0. 6-mile west of Japatul Valley Road and 1.1 miles

This section was included in a 27.1-mile freeway routing between Greenfield Drive, by the Commission in March,

The revised routing which had been recommended by State Highway Engineer J. C. Womack would climb easterly from Japatul Valley Road over moderately rugged hills to a mesa south of Guatay Mountain. It then would descend across rugged terrain to Pine Valley Creek, crossing it on a 400-foot high bridge, before climbing along a side canyon to rejoin the previously adopted routing on the south rim of Pine Valley. Cookies - Crisp And Coconutty



crisp cookie, delectable with flaked coconut and pecans, is spiked with cinnamon; it's a perfect accompaniment to tea for the grown-ups, milk for the youngsters, or

just for good eating any time.

For a change, chill this cookie dough until it can be handled easily; then form into small balls and place on greased baking sheets. Flatten with the bottom of a glass dipped in flour. Bake as for drop cookies.

Coconut Crisps

- 2 cups sifted all-purpose flour 1/2 cup firmly packed 1/2 teaspoon double-acting
- baking powder ½ teaspoon baking soda tablespoon cinnamon
- 1/2 cup butter or margarine 1 cup granulated sugar
- sugar brown 2 eggs
- 1 tablespoon milk
- 11/3 cups (about) flaked coconut

Cream butter, gradually add sugars, and cream until light and fluffy. Add eggs and beat well; then add flour mixture. Add milk and blend well. Add pecans and coconut. Drop from teaspoon onto greased baking sheets. Bake at 375° for 10 to 12 minutes, or until lightly browned. Makes about 5 dozen cookies.


