



Alpine Man Charged

ALPINE — Don Collard, of Shady Rock Ranch, Alpine, was arraigned with three other men on charges of conspiring to make pornographic movies and making pornographic movies.

Among the three others involved in the charge were two sheriff's deputies.

The investigation of the case has been taking place for several months, according to Joe O'Connor, San Diego County Sheriff.

There have been no new developments in the case up to press time, when Capt. J. R. Stables was contacted.

Preliminary hearing has been set for 9 a. m. on Sept. 2 for the group.

Alpine Chosen for Charger Photos

ALPINE — Thursday afternoon, residents of this area were startled to see a rather unique airplane flying over the western section of Alpine. The plane flew directly at the hills across Highway 80 and would seem almost to disappear.

After some inquiry, Ray Blair, assistant to the president at General Dynamics Convair, San Diego, called the Town and Country News to tell them that the "Charger" was in the area.

Alpine had been chosen for photographs because of resemblance to the kind of area in which the "Charger" was designed to perform.

The "Charger" was designed built, and is now being flight tested by Convair. It utilizes what is known as deflected slipstream to achieve remarkably short take offs and landings in less than 500 feet.

It is powered by 650 horsepower turbo prop engines, driving two nine-foot propellers. Extra large flaps, extending the entire length of the wing trailing edge, are bathed in the slipstream to provide maximum lift for take off and landing.

The "Charger" is the first airplane developed specifically to perform a tactical role in direct support of combat troops in the forward battle area. It will bridge the gap between the helicopter and the high-performance jet.

The photo mission on last Thursday, was conducted with photographers on the ground. According to Ray Blair, Alpine conceivably could have another visit from the "Charger" with a helicopter accompanying the plane for aerial photos.

The plane has the versatility needed for a Viet Nam situation.

Headquarters Constructed

Henry A. Boney, Second District Supervisor, announced the approaching completion, (September) of the new Surveyors-Road Department Division I Headquarters at Jamacha Junction.

The 60' x 200' modern, steel structure will contain an equipment repair shop, supply room, administrative offices, and several specialized storage and repair areas. Construction of the building is by the Dunphy Construction Company, at a cost of \$160,000. Mr. Boney pointed out that this replaces the old "stable and smithy" type headquarters buildings currently located at 7410 Waite Dr. in Lemon Grove.

With the move into the new headquarters, which is the last of the three divisional headquarters to be completed, the last vestige of the era of mule-power disappears from the scene.

Sup. Boney added that Road Division I maintains approximately 600 miles of roads and streets, most of which are in his district. The Division Superintendent, Edward A. Singer, has eighty men in his division — forty working out of the Division Headquarters, and another forty divided among five road stations, Jamacha, Bonita, Alpine, Campo and Lemon Grove. About forty pieces of heavy or specialized road equipment are normally assigned to this division.

The new headquarters location will be more central in relation to the division as a whole. The retention of the Lemon Grove Rd. Station at its present site for road maintenance purpose under Road Foreman E. Smith will permit continued adequate service to the area.

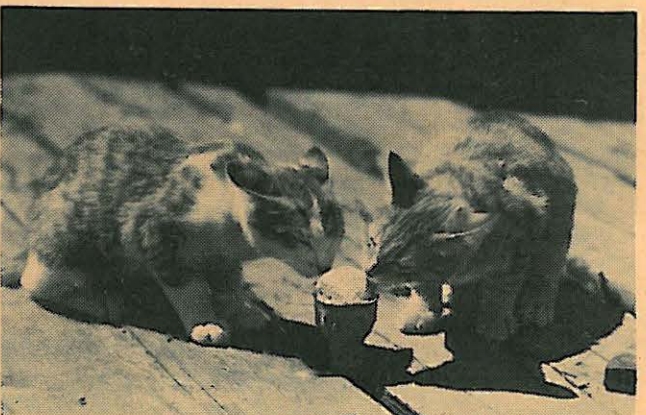
Fire Calls

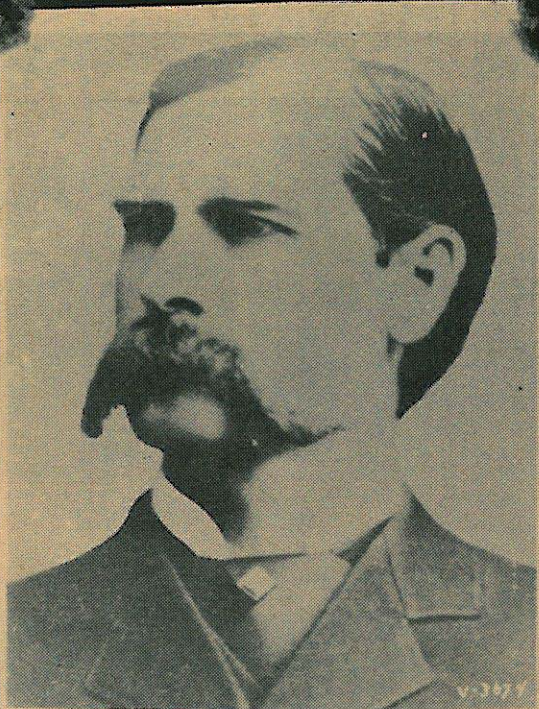
Therefore, it is with regret, that we announce the following:
