



Alpine Speedway Determined Illegal

SAN DIEGO — At the regularly scheduled Board of Supervisors meeting Tuesday, the board unanimously voted to direct the Building Inspection Department to file a criminal action against Harold Lutz if he holds another motorcycle race in the Alpine area in violation of the zoning ordinance Section 508.

The Lutz property is zoned A-1(1), and a non-conforming use permit is in existence for a small oval micro car race track. The violation allegedly concerns the expansion of the small race track to the larger facility which is needed for the use of the motorcycles.

To comply with the zoning ordinances, Lutz will have to request an application for a

variance to change his non-conforming use permit to enlarge the small oval track, the expansion of which has already taken place.

According to County Officials, Lutz was notified by a letter from the Building Inspection Department, in the second week of August, that he was in violation of the zoning ordinance and that he should not hold more races until he had complied with the zoning laws. However, the races were held on August 21, as scheduled.

When called by this newspaper for a statement concerning the situation, Lutz stated that he did not need a zoning variance; he is running a legal race track; and he is not in violation of any

law.

Lutz also claimed to have the backing of 93 per cent of the Alpine people. He also stated that he is holding the races for the children and young people of the area. He also made the statement, that should he be wrong, he will automatically close the track down.

Concerning the complaints about undue noise, Lutz stated that the complainers can "go to a movie," "take a ride," or "move."

If Lutz wishes to continue to operate the track, a request for a variance application will necessitate a public hearing before the Planning Commission. At this time, the pros and cons of the situation will be heard.

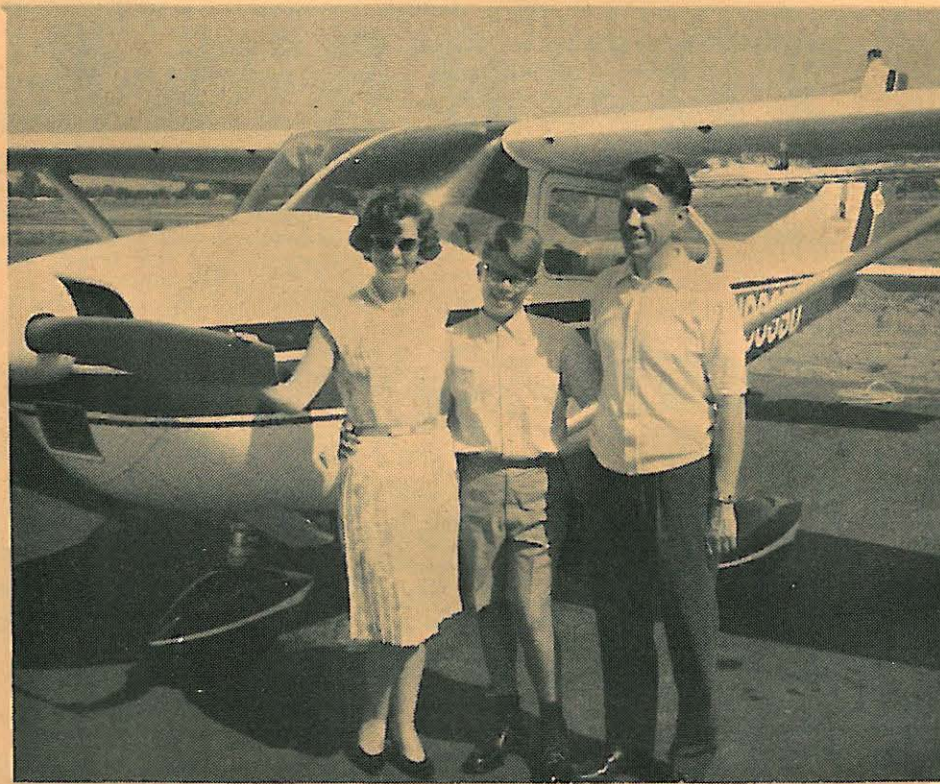



Editorial

Law, according to Webster is "all of the rules of conduct established and enforced by the authority, legislation or custom of a given community."

When a law is broken, should the authority of a community enforce the law? This is a question that has arisen in this area several times recently, both on the County level and on the State level.

Does it matter if the law is a big one — or a little one? Does it matter if the law breaker is a big law breaker — or a little law breaker? We think it does matter. Does not the respect for small laws lead to respect for big laws? Is it not possible that such things as the recent riots would not have occurred if there was respect for small laws as well as big laws? Is it not as wrong to steal a package of chewing gum as it is to walk off from a store with a large piece of furniture?

And how does this affect Alpine? Is it not as wrong to break the law "until the freeway comes through" as it is to break the law continually? And on the state level, why are not some of the laws enforced there? Is the person who runs a profit making business under a "non-profit" organization, breaking the law? And because he does not make a very large profit, is there really a difference? Is he not just as guilty as the man who makes a very large profit?

If these things are not so, then why cannot all of us break the county law for a week, or for a month, a year; why cannot all of us apply for a "non-profit" corporation so that we may avoid payment of taxes or collect other monies that we perhaps could not collect otherwise?

And what of the influence of our teenagers at whom we are so prone to point a finger? What kind of influence do we have when we break the law — large or small? Can we really blame these young people when they see law disobeyed every day of their young lives — and not only around their own community — in their own homes?

We are proud of the county officials who are determined that the law shall not be violated — be it big or small. These are honorable men who are not concerned about the votes they might lose, and these are men who deserve our support — our admiration.

Can we, as a community back the man who dares to speak — or print — the truth, no matter what the cost?

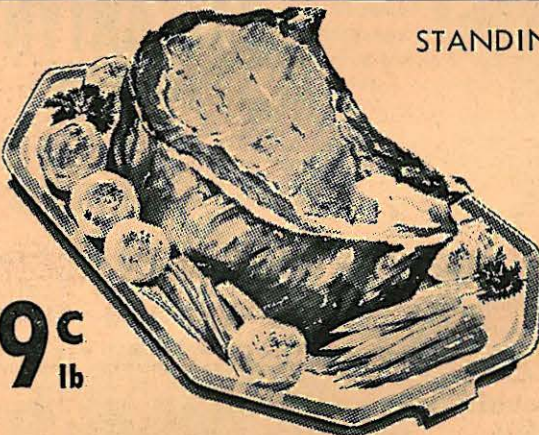

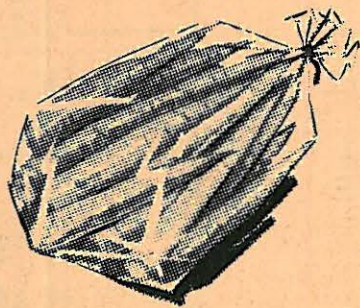
