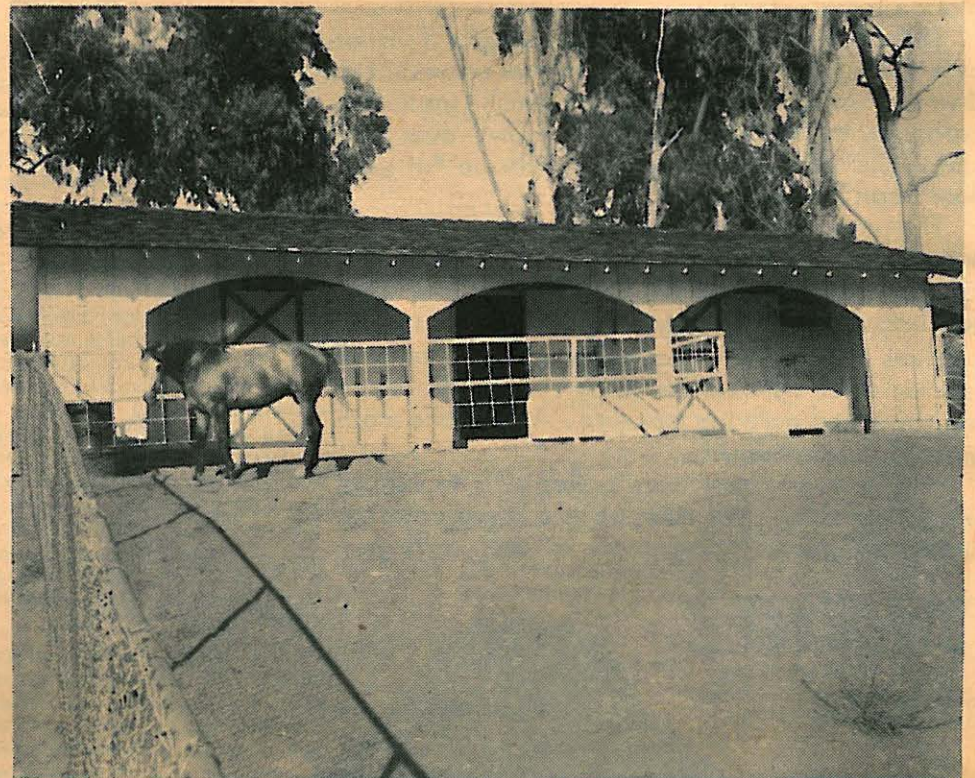

BULLETS STILL FLY IN ALPINE

ALPINE — Recent reports of careless shooting near homes prompted a call to the Sheriff's Office by the Town and Country News.

County ordinance 33.101, prohibits the discharge of firearms within the reasonable distance of homes, livestock and other inhabited areas, according to Capt. J. R. Stables of the Sheriff's Office.

Anyone noting such an act should notify the sheriff's office immediately, at 232-3811 and a patrol car will be dispatched immediately. The offenders will receive a warning, citation, or will be taken into custody.

Freeway in Sight

SAN DIEGO — C. W. McGrath, Inc., of El Cajon submitted the low of six bids received for the construction of an additional one and one-half miles of Interstate 8 freeway east of the city of El Cajon, announced Jacob Dekema, District Engineer for the State Division of Highways. The low bid quoted was \$1,425,421.20.

Dekema said the project calls for the grading and paving of a four-lane freeway between 4.5 miles and 2.8 miles west of Alpine, ending near the Harbison Canyon turn-off. Also included in the project will be the construction of an interchange at Dunbar Lane, as well as frontage roads connecting to existing U. S. 80.

Second and third low bids were submitted by Norman I. Fadel, Inc. and E. C. Young quoting bids of \$1,619,411.30 and \$1,631,568.50 respectively.

The bids have been taken under consideration by the Director of Public Works and if found satisfactory, work could begin in August with completion expected in the fall of 1966.

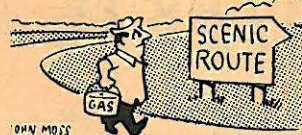
Joining this attempt to keep our streets clean was the Alpine Chamber of Commerce who also placed trash barrels.

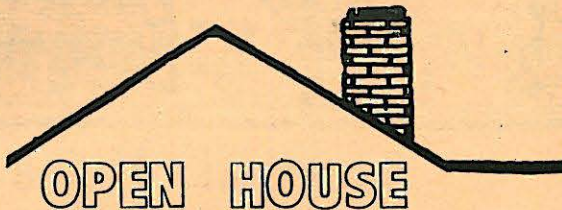

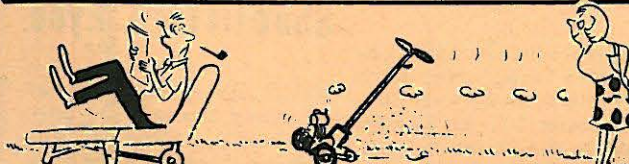

However, because of our location, there has been a great deal of confusion concerning how to find us — particularly among the business people in Alpine.

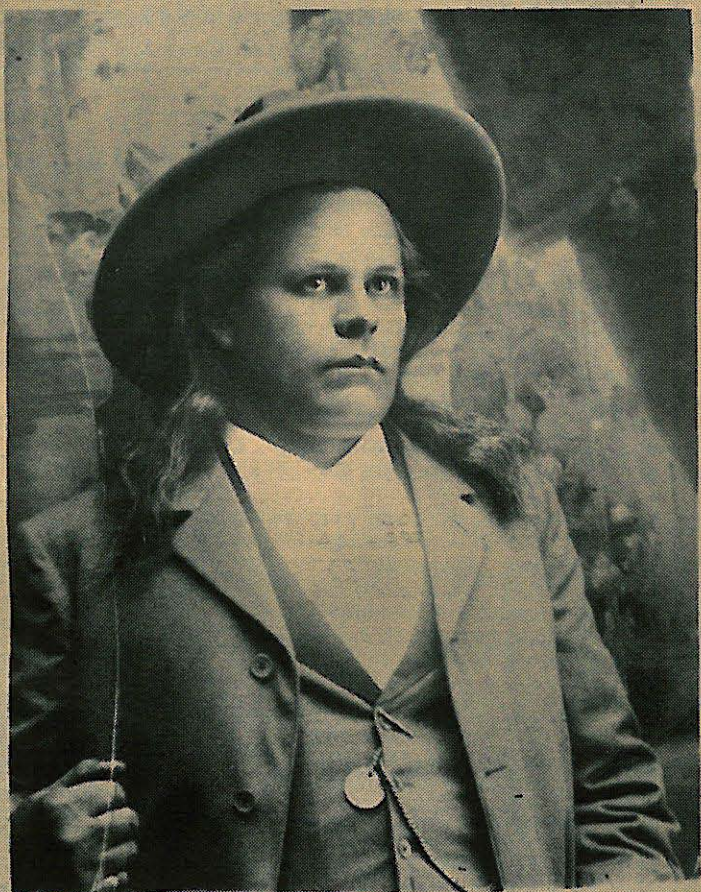

Business Recovers From Moderate Decline in June

ALPINE — Business activity here in Southern California, bounced back to near-record form during July to recover from the moderate decline encountered in June. M. Ross Mallette, manager of Security First National Bank's Alpine branch, reported today.

The economic advance, as measured by the bank's business index, was reported at an estimated 143.9 for July, Mallette said. This compares with June's reading of 141.8 and is only .2 off the record high set in May. In July, 1964, the business index stood at 142.8.

Bank clearing and department store sales, two major business components which declined in the previous month, recorded substantial gain in July after adjustment for seasonal influences, Mallette continued.

July's real estate transfers also were up, while construction activity, based on the number of permits authorized, registered a slight decline. Overall business activity in the 14-county Southland area is presently operating about one per cent above a year ago, Security Bank's researchers pointed out.

Employment in Southern California metropolitan areas continued on the upside, topping the 4.2 million mark in June, the latest month for which figures are available.

Civilian job holders increased by 122,000 over the same month a year earlier. This increase of three per cent compares with the nation-wide gain of 2.5 per cent for the same period, Mallette concluded.

SAN DIEGO — The San Diego Symphony Orchestra will play its remaining 1965 summer concerts at the Community Concourse it was announced today. The move from Balboa Bowl was dictated by the noise from jet aircraft in the approach pattern to Lindberg Field.

"One of the prices of the growth that San Diego is enjoying is the elimination of our traditional concerts, Balboa Bowl," said Philip M. Klauber, president of the Orchestra Association.

The remaining summer concerts are August 10 and August 24. Arthur Fiedler, conductor of the Boston Pops will be guest conductor on August 10. That performance will be in the Convention Hall at the Community Concourse. Frederick Fennell, conductor of the Miami Symphony Orchestra will be the guest conductor on August 24 in the Civic Theatre.

POVERTY TO BE ATTACKED

SACRAMENTO — Gov. Edmund G. Brown's office has announced approval of a \$51,870 program development grant to the Economic Opportunity Commission of San Diego County.

The governor said that the grant will provide San Diego County the resources to initiate a comprehensive program of community action to attack causes of poverty.

The governor said, "This grant will give San Diego a chance to do a thorough job of planning for the War on Poverty. The commission will survey the needs and develop specific programs to meet those needs."

The six-month grant will enable the commission to hire a director and two assistants who will work with neighborhood groups to plan anti-poverty programs.

ALPINE — Mr. and Mrs. Emil Sachse of 2751 Hwy. 80 East, have returned from a five week's holiday traveling 9, - 500 miles via the Dakotas, Canadian Hwy. and the Alaskan Hwy. to Whitehorse in the Yukon Territory.

They visited Mr. Sachse's sister Mrs. Alex Donason in Mills, Nebraska and another sister, Mrs. Emma Casavant in Norfolk, Nebraska.

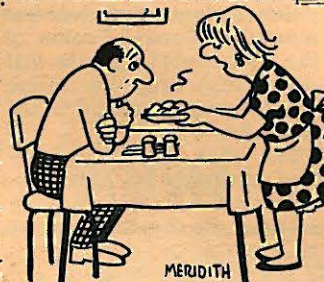
They stopped for a three-day fishing at Red Iron Lake, North Dakota, catching 100 fish in a day — croppies, blue gills and two bass. The lakes were full of fish and children caught them as readily as the grownups.

Mr. Sachse looked up his old home at Detroit Lakes, Minnesota, only to find the landscape completely altered and the forests cut down with a highway, where the farm stood.

They entered Canada at Boissevant, Alberta, traveling the Canadian Highway via Moose Jaw, Saskatoon and Edmonton. The Alaskan Highway was entered at Dawson Creek. From this point for 950 miles was rough going. The windshield sustained three breaks from flying rocks; the front and back lights were broken and wires in the generator loosened, showing "red" on the dashboard.

Certainly the Alaskan Highway was no place to be stranded. Small garages do appear about every 50 miles as do cabins with limited accommodations. Gasoline is obtainable at 70¢ to 72¢ a gal-

lon. It is referred to as a "big gallon."

The road is rough and stony and hazardous when cars pass and blinding dust follows each car. However, the traveler is rewarded by the natural beauty of the country. The road is lined with dense forest of pine and fir and a pretty wild flower in pink and lavender called "fire weeds." Whenever a section of the forest has burned, the weeds grow in profusion. Lakes, rivers, snow-capped mountains are all along the way.

Arriving at Whitehouse, capital of the Yukon Territory and land of the midnight sun, the Sachse's found it strange to be preparing for bed with the light streaming into the room. Their car was put on board the White Pass and Yukon Railroad which followed the route of the gold seekers in 1897-88 in their rush to the Kondike.

Here too, the scenery was varied and awe-inspiring. Arriving at Skagway the car was placed on the ferry and there was a 35-hour smooth trip. There were towering snow-capped mountains on both sides with an occasional iceberg and three glaciers. The boat stopped for brief periods at the small towns of Hanies, Juneau, the capital, Petersburg, Wrangell, Ketchikan and disembarked at Prince Rupert. The trip home included Vancouver and Seattle and the majestic Red Woods of Northern California. At Coos Bay, Oregon, the ships were being loaded with lumber for all parts of the world. This is reported to be the largest lumber shipping center in the world.

The Sachse's slept in 22 different beds — had good and indifferent meals — kept well throughout the trip and as always, the nicest part was getting home. "We have maps and literature covering the trip and will be happy to lend them to anyone interested," said Mrs. Sachse.

Need for More Facilities Urgent

GROSSMONT COLLEGE — The need for a bond election this fall to complete the Grossmont College campus was the subject of a recent meeting. Nearly fifty interested citizens attended this meeting and heard details of the construction needs to be included in the 3.5 million dollar issue.

A feature of the evening was a pictorial and graphic showing of proposed campaign materials purported to "Tell the story of the present Grossmont College program and indicate the urgency for providing facilities to accommodate the additional hundreds of students who, as early as September, 1966, might be denied a local college education simply because of lack of facilities," according to John A. Burdick, Dean of Student Affairs.

The election will be held on October 19, 1965. On the occasion of the initial 7.5 million dollar election to build the present 2,500 capacity campus, a three to one margin vote in favor was recorded.

Representatives of many organizations active in the very large Grossmont Junior College District were present at the meeting and were asked to consider the college needs and to do what they could to bring these needs to the attention of the organizations they represent.

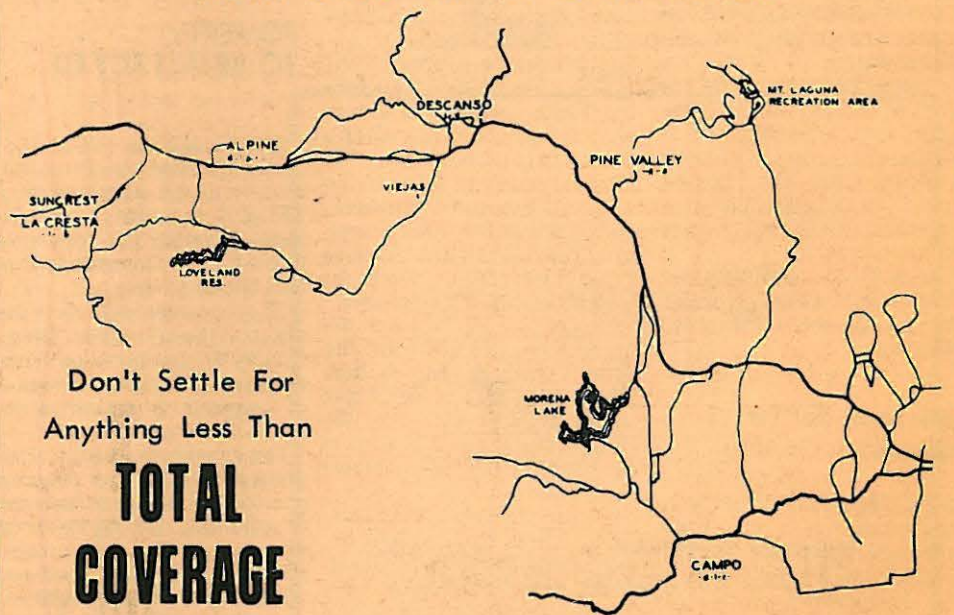

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Medical Checkup Advised for Children

ALPINE — Good health is as important to learning as adequate schools and competent teachers, Leo F. Ryan, Alpine chairman of the Tuberculosis & Health Assn. of San Diego County advised parents.

A complete medical check-up, including a tuberculin skin test or chest x-ray, was suggested for each child returning to school next month.

"Now, not after classes begin, is the time to find out whether the youngster's sight, hearing and teeth are in good shape," he said. "Warning the teacher ahead of time about any disorders of the heart, lungs, nose and throat will help her to understand and instruct the child.

"Even those problems to which parents are accustomed and which seem unimportant, may affect learning ability," Ryan said.

Parents were also urged to be certain that vaccinations and booster shots for diphtheria, tetanus, smallpox, polio and measles are up-to-date before school begins.

Stressing the importance of tuberculin skin tests, he said they will tell whether the TB germ has ever entered the body.

"Evidence of the germ does not necessarily mean the child has active tuberculosis, but it is an important clue for the physician," Ryan said. "Making sure your children are TB free will help protect them and their classmates from this dangerous, communicable disease.

"Because children reflect their parents' concern, your health is important to their well-being," Ryan said.

He urged scheduling of appointments for the entire family when arranging for back-to-school checkups.

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Haven for Motorist Planned

SACRAMENTO — Although there was no formal ceremony the State Division of Highways has dedicated its first complete safety roadside rest to a familiar American figure — the weary motorist.

This first full-developed haven for the leg-stretcher and scenic admirer is located on Interstate 5, about five miles north of Red Bluff.

Led to the site by a blue sign which hints of a peaceful place in which to shake off the strains of driving, the motorist can actually encounter two similar areas, depending on whether he is northbound, southbound, or making a round trip. This will be the general plan for all rest stops located on heavily-traveled divided highways.

Although not intended for over-night stops, the roadside rest provides all the facilities of a well-developed park. There are comfort facilities, a drinking fountain, picnic tables, and stretches of black-topped sidewalk for a pleasant meander through the area to remove those driving kinks.

The buildings are designed to complement the natural setting. Cost of this particular pair of roadside rests was \$80,000. Others will range from as little as \$5,000 to as high as \$100,000 depending on their size, the facilities provided, the terrain and other factors.

Eventually, California expects to have approximately 250 sites developed into safety roadside rests, and they will supplement other facilities to provide a stopping opportunity at about half-hour intervals of driving time.

Among those under construction in San Diego County is one near Leucadia on Highway 101.

seats. At 9 p.m. the calls were complete and Mrs. Fletcher said goodbye, both in Spanish and English.

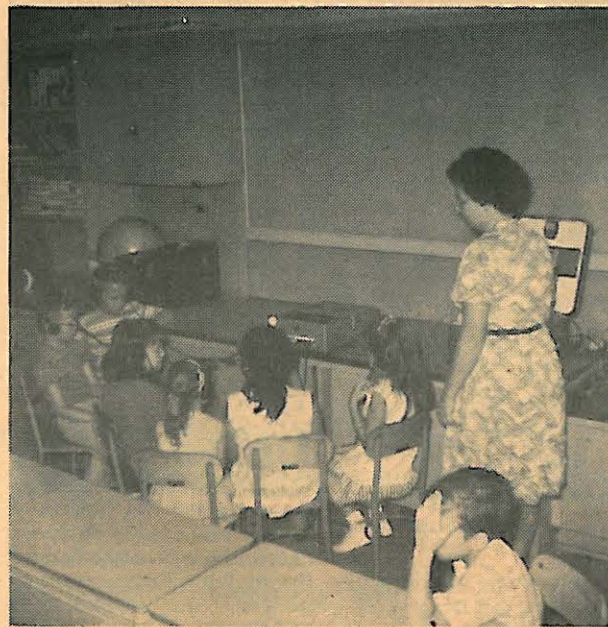
The children were all seen on Channel 8 on the 6 o'clock news Thursday, July 29.

96. Approved and authorized the Chairman to execute, subject to approval by County Counsel, an Agreement with the State of California, Department of California Highway Patrol, for the County to share the use of a Telapak Circuit System, to reflect a decrease in line charges, commencing July 1, 1965, and terminating June 30, 1970.

97. Adopted resolution increasing, effective August 1, 1965, the rates paid to institutions for the care of County wards in institutions and boarding homes, to a maximum of \$240.00 per month plus a \$10.00 clothing and incidentals allowance per month; setting a special higher rate for the Lakeside Lodge Home for Boys; and restating existing rates for other types of care.

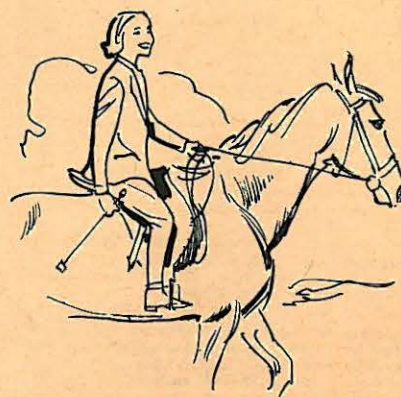

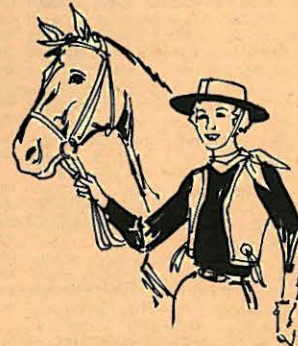
