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
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"LET'S TRY IT again," he said, shaking his head, and so we returned to Perry Mason. Perry Mason is everywhere this fall. Still no interruption.

Mrs. H. W. Johnson, president of the Alpine Woman's Club, opened the 1966-67 season last Tuesday at the club house.


This meeting was the annual "ingathering" meeting. Each member brought two new garments for the Needlework Guild for distribution to organizations caring for the needy in San Diego County.

The hostess for the day was Mrs. Paul Clay, assisted by Mrs. Wallace Coppack and Mrs. H. Latham.

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
