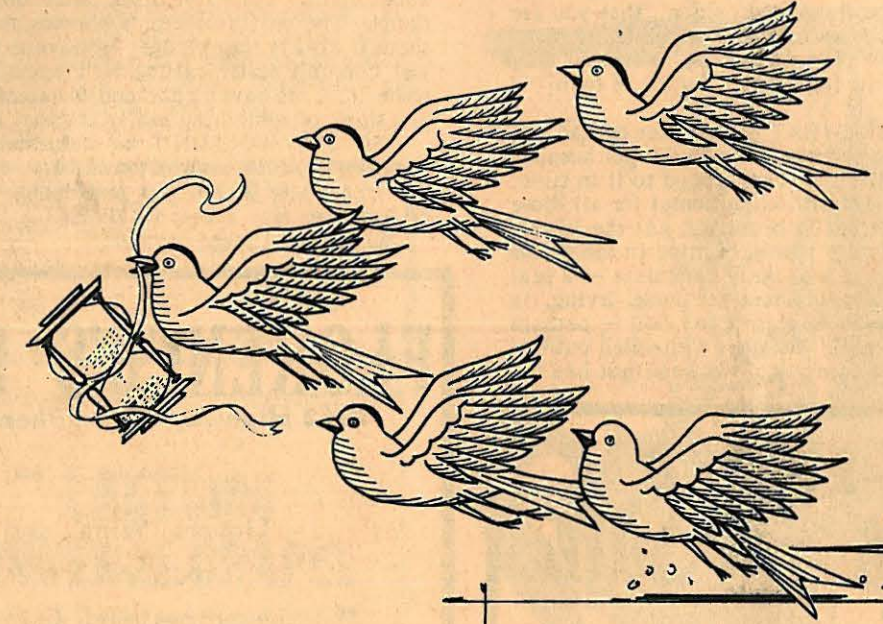

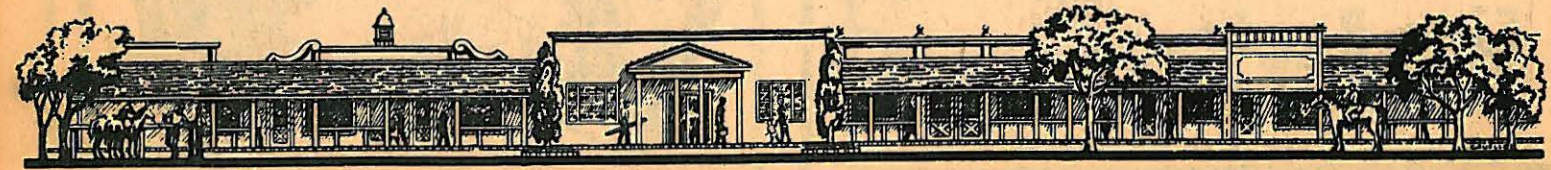

BEEN LEGALLY REGISTERED?

The requirements of Section 2466 of the Civil Code, says "Every person and every partnership transacting business—under a fictitious firm name—must file a certificate stating the names in full and the place of residence of such person and the member or members of such partnership—such certificate must be published, once a week for four consecutive weeks."

If you have neglected this procedure, do you realize that the name of your firm is not protected and that you are not entitled to maintain suits for collection, or for other purposes, in the courts of the State of California?

In other matters, Mrs. Elizabeth West gave her report on the Beautification Committee. The group has decided to have five litter cans which will be painted green and marked, "Travel Trash." 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COMMISSIONERS MEET

At the recent regularly scheduled meeting of the Board of Fire Commissioners of the Alpine Local Fire District, a report was given to the Board by Asst. Fire Chief and District Fire Marshall. The area is again closed to burning. No burning permits are being issued because of an increase in fire hazard, in spite of the heavy rains, due to the Santa Ana wind condition.

In other matters: The Board approved the appointment of three new Volunteer Firemen, bringing the total to 21 and 10 Junior Volunteer Firemen.

The duties and responsibilities of the Volunteer Firemen were explained. Alpine's firemen are not paid firemen. They give of their time freely to answer any and all fire and resuscitator calls but should not be expected to rescue pets, correct faulty wiring or repair broken water line. It was pointed out that this is not to discourage in any way individuals within the district from calling the fire department when a genuine emergency arises. The firemen can determine whether or not the problem comes within their responsibility.

Clinics Scheduled

It's time to get that rabies shot for your dog.

The annual rabies clinic will be held on Wednesday, January 11, at the Alpine Elementary School from 7 until 9 p.m.

All veterinarians working with the clinics donate their time as a community service and receive no compensation.

The rabies vaccine is administered for a non-profit fee of \$1.50 per dog at no expense to the taxpayer.

To date this year, there have been 49 known cases of rabies found in the wildlife of San Diego County, the latest one reported in Julian by the County Veterinarians office.

The Veterinary Medical Association urges all dog owners to keep their pets rabies vaccinations up to date for their own protection.

All dogs to be vaccinated at the clinics must be four months of age and for the safety of other dogs and people, should be on a leash when taken to the clinics.

The clinics will also be held across from the Shell Station in Jacumba, from 9 a.m. to 10 p.m.; Camp Forest Fire Station, Cameron Corners, Campo from 10:30 a.m. until noon; Pine Valley Fire Department, Pine Valley, from 2 until 3 p.m.; and the Descanso Elementary School, Descanso from 3:30 to 4:30 p.m. on Thursday, January 12, 1967.

Classic Welsh Rarebit



There are few dishes which have survived the centuries more gracefully than classic Welsh rarebit. Served in the ancient manner over hefty slices of fresh hot bread, it becomes a marvelous meal for family or company.

Like most truly great recipes, Welsh rarebit is easy to make. Its basic ingredients are two: sharp aged cheese and beer or ale. Seasoning is usually limited to mustard and Worcestershire sauce. It can be cooked over low direct heat, in a chafing dish or a double boiler. In any case, it must be stirred constantly with a wooden spoon.

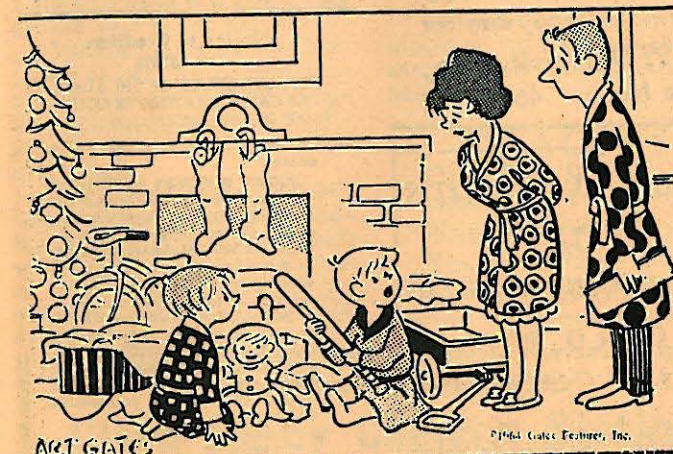
The technique is important because cheese is a natural food and varies in moisture content. A well-aged natural cheddar (not a processed cheese) is required to produce a thick rarebit and the beer or ale should be at room temperature (and measured without foam). Generally the proportion of 1 cup of beer to 1 pound of cheese is about right, but consistency is controlled by using more or less liquid. A little butter melted in the pan beforehand prevents the cheese from sticking.

Serve Welsh rarebit hot! Warm the plates; heat the bread; spoon on the rarebit while scalding hot. And of course, the traditional beverage with classic Welsh rarebit is beer or ale.

CLASSIC WELSH RAREBIT

- 1 pound aged natural Cheddar
- 2 teaspoons dry mustard
- 1 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce
- 1 teaspoon butter
- 1 cup beer or ale (about)
- 1 teaspoon paprika
- Large round loaf fresh white bread

Remove rind and grate cheese coarsely or cut in small pieces. Melt butter in large pan and tip pan to coat bottom well. Over very low heat, add cheese and as it begins to melt, gradually add warm beer or ale. Stir constantly with wooden spoon. Add seasonings and continue stirring until the cheese "follows the spoon around the pan." If too thick, carefully add more beer or ale. Have bread ready for serving: Cut loaf into serving pieces and butter well between slices. Reassemble, wrap in aluminum foil; heat at 350°F. Serves 6-8.

Highlights Noted

SAN DIEGO — The San Diego Gas & Electric Company will spend a record \$44.3 million for construction during 1967 to meet the growing requirements of its service area, J. F. Sinnott, president, reported.

The company will have approximately 395,600 electric customers by the end of 1966 — and increase of some 14,400 for the year. It also will have approximately 320,700 gas customers — an increase of some 11,900. Similar gains are expected for 1967.

Among activities highlighting 1966, the company:

— Completed the first full year of operation of its Liquefield National Gas Plant at Chula Vista.

— Completed a switchyard at the San Onofre Nuclear Generating Station and a 138,000-kilovolt transmission line from there to the San Luis Rey substation.

— Cleared the way for construction of a sea water conversion test facility at the South Bay Power Plant by licensing the Office of Saline Water to use 20 acres of company land for the project.

— Installed a quick-response gas turbine generator at the South Bay Power Plant.

— Built a new Orange County District Office in San Clemente to meet long-range growth requirements of that fast-developing area.

— Together with Southern California Edison, the Los Angeles Department of Water & Power and Pacific Gas & Electric Company, signed a joint contract with the State of California to supply low-cost power to bring Northern California water to the southern part of the state.

— Started construction on a 21-story office building in downtown San Diego. The building is scheduled for completion in March of 1968.
