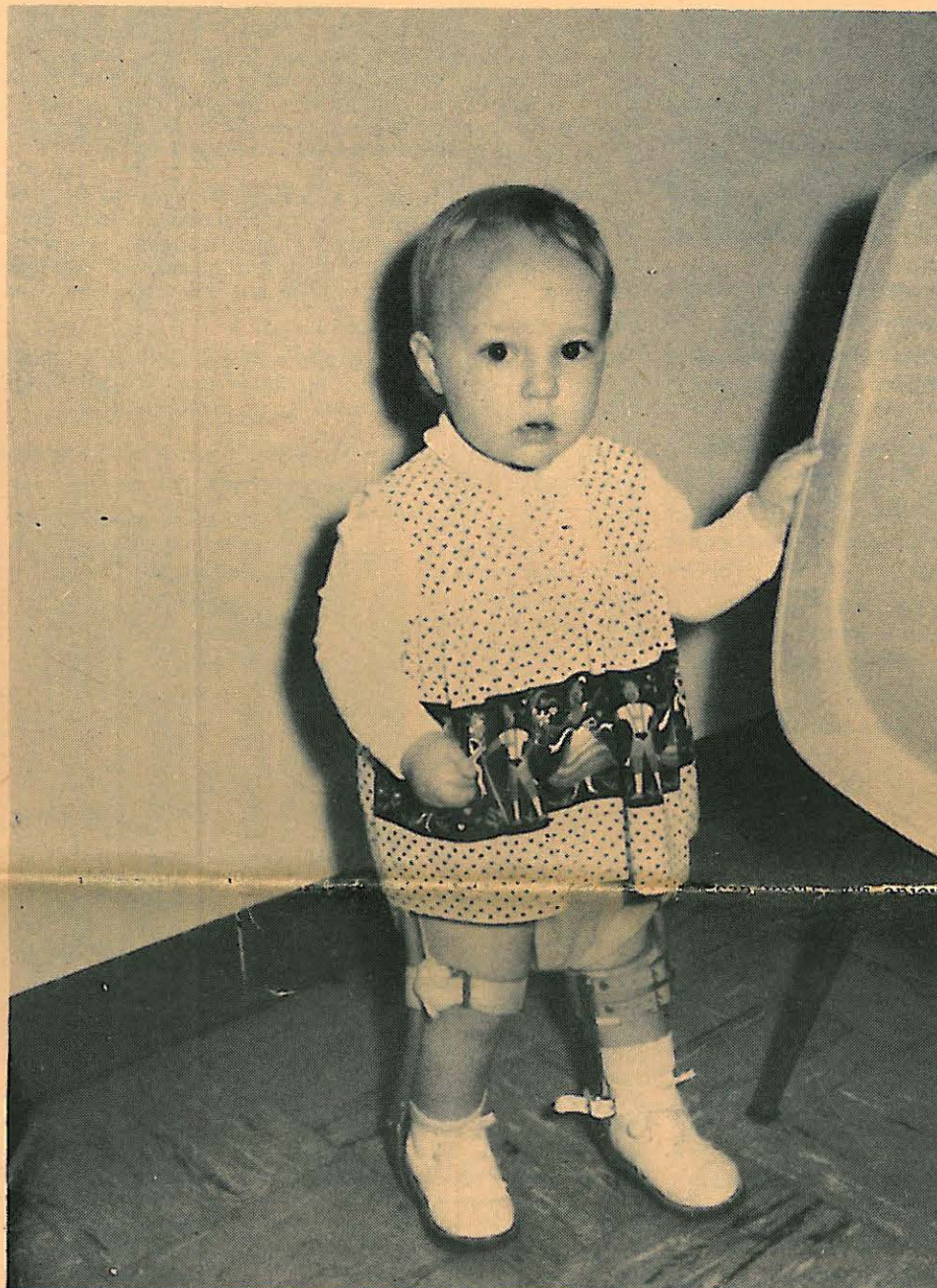
"The Memorial contribution is a lasting tribute to friends or relatives because it supports research and community services to improve the heart health of everyone," according to Oberg.

Physically and emotionally Susie has developed well—she rolled over at one month, was crawling and pulling up at seven months and at eleven months she walked.

At first glance, one wonders why Susie doesn't have parents of her own. Susie was

born with club feet and a deformed hand. Susie still wears a brace and special shoes to help keep her feet straight, but these do not hinder her getting around. Periodic examinations will be needed for the next seven or eight years. Even though her hand is deformed, she uses it in many ways.

Among Susie's favorite pastimes are babies, dummies, the merry-go-round and other rides. She likes to patty cake and is learning to whistle.

Editorial

Some weeks ago as we were discussing the proposed Town Council with one of its proponents, we were reminded that eventually, we as the local newspaper, would have to take a stand — for or against a Town Council.

Apparently, that time has come, since several members have made the decision to go ahead with a Town Council, even after receiving an invitation from the Chamber of Commerce to join, as individuals.

We have made our decisions as to the advisability of a Town Council. We feel strongly that there is no need — yet — for such a body.

To go back a few months into the history of the Alpine Town Council, we find that it was started by two individuals, one of whom has moved to another community. The other is not able to attend meetings because of a job commitment.

We think of the basic reasons the Town Council was formed. And we find that the real reasons behind the formation, reasons known to most people in the community, are not valid reasons, in our opinion.

The interim officers elected for the Town Council are officers of whom any organization might well be proud. We have the highest regard for president, Ben Polak, whom we know to be a leader of real ability. And it is fortunate that the reins of power were passed to able and responsible citizens. We regret that because of this, these conscientious people may be lost to community service if the general apathy which appears to be a part of this community, continues.

It appears that the Town Council would have each citizen (who is interested) take a part in every decision concerning Alpine. They claim this is "democracy." First of all it isn't. For men to remember that "the people" do not have an individual vote in everything their government does — whether it be national or local. Representatives are selected, by the people, to represent them in these matters. Thus does the Chamber of Commerce of a small town such as Alpine work. Here, the Chamber is open to all — businessman and resident alike. Then representatives are elected, by the members, to represent them each time a decision is made. There are four membership meetings each year. At these meetings, general membership expresses its desires. (The general membership is always welcome at every board meeting.)

It would seem that the proponents of the Town Council feel that each month, Alpine has some earth-shaking problem that needs to be openly aired in a Town Council meeting. Oh yes, no doubt if we wanted to, we could scrape up many minor problems of this sort — minor problems, that if left to neighbors and residents, no doubt could be resolved without airing in a public meeting.

This is not to say that the Chamber has always met every problem in the past in the best possible way. They would be the first to admit this. But, as one of the Board members has put it, if the people do not like the way things have been going, they can join and make the changes necessary.

Alpine has approximately 3,700 people in its population. We feel that two organizations such as a Town Council and a Chamber of Commerce are not needed in a community of this size. The time may come when these two organizations are sorely needed. However, we would urge that those attempting to start a second organization, would research the problem completely. That they would make every effort to find out the exact needs of this type of

a community before making recommendations.

One strong organization, in the opinion of the Town and Country News, can do much for Alpine and its people. Two weak organizations can do little.

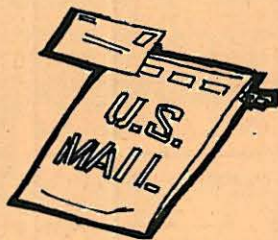

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New Studies Seen

ALPINE — Local Christmas Seal contributions are helping to support three new medical investigations into emphysema and other respiratory diseases, Leo F. Ryan, Alpine area chairman of the Tuberculosis & Health Association of San Diego County, said yesterday.

According to Ryan, research grants totaling \$19,752 have been awarded to underwrite studies in 1966 which may unveil new information about emphysema, the crippling lung disease which has increased 400 per cent in California in the past decade.

Awarding of the three new research grants brings Christmas Seal contributions allocated for research and medical education in California this year to a total of nearly \$123,000.

In addition to awarded grants and medical education fellowships, the special statewide research fund helps support chest disease teaching programs at five medical schools throughout the state, Ryan said.

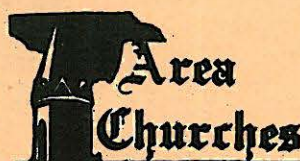
Motorists Warned

SACRAMENTO - Watch for the flashing red lights when you approach a school bus that has stopped. Motorists traveling in either direction are required to stop when they see these flashing red signals, according to the California Highway Patrol.

CHP Commissioner Bradford M. Crittenden points out that the school bus driver must activate the flashing red lights when he stops to load and unload children who must cross a highway to and from the bus.

"Bus drivers are required by law to escort boys and girls across the street before boarding or after leaving their bus. Activation of the flashing red lights is not required when the bus stops for children who do not cross the roadway," the Commissioner stated.

Motorists traveling along a divided highway need not stop for the flashing red light if they are traveling in a direction opposite to that of the bus.

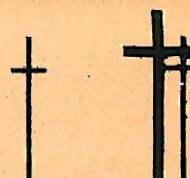

Each one attending should bring something for the potluck and their own service. Baby sitting will be provided at a nominal fee. The discussion is planned from 10 until 1 p.m.

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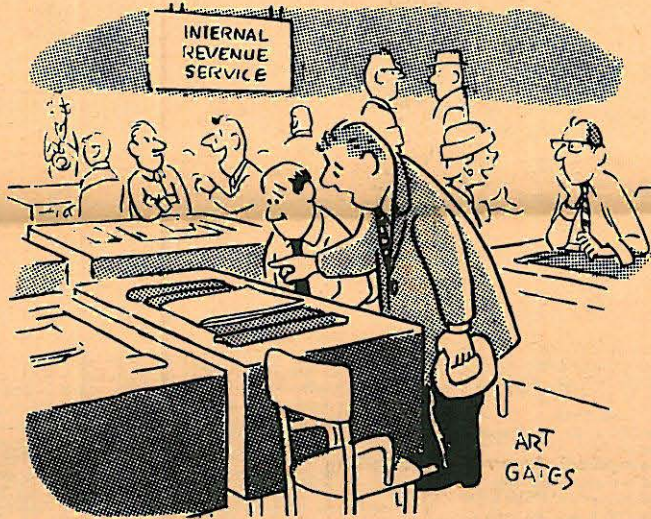
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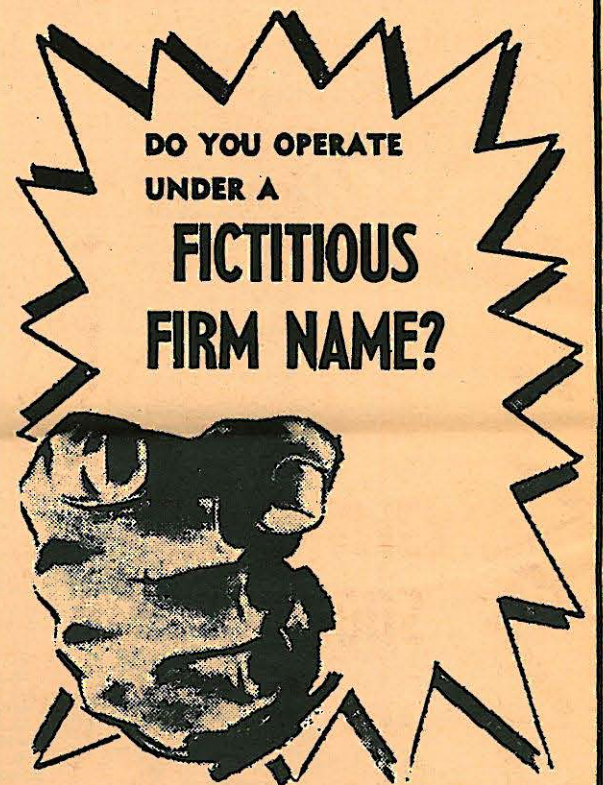
