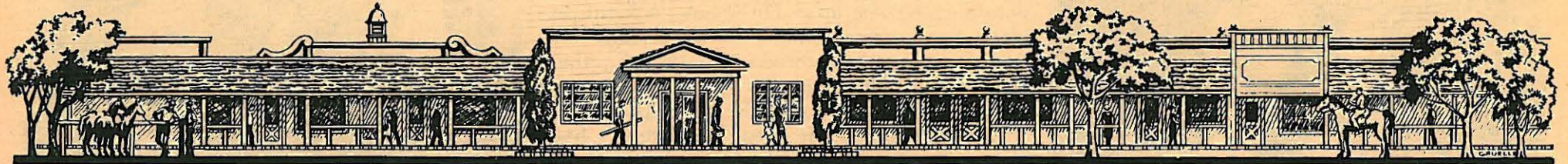

Dr. Sam Sloan, master of ceremonies, stated that funds raised by this affair will be used in the foreign exchange student program which sends American students to foreign lands and brings foreign students to the United States.

The preliminary budget totals \$30,811.00 as against \$45,767.56, the budget for the 1965-66 year. This budget, like the previous one, is designed to support the District's needs and at the same time hold taxes at the current level.

Candidates Speak At Fuller Hall

ALPINE — Speaking before approximately 50 people here Saturday, John Stull, candidate for the 80th Assembly District and Hale Ashcraft, candidate for the 38th Senatorial District brought their viewpoints to this area.

Sponsored by Mr. and Mrs. Louis Landt, the group listened to both candidates speak and were able to ask them questions upon the conclusion of their talks.

John Stull is a retired Naval officer who has served for the last year as GOP Precinct chairman for the 80th District.

In commenting on the gubernatorial contest in the Republican party, Ashcraft gave his endorsement to Ronald Reagan. He said that he had yet to meet a woman who would not vote for Reagan because of his "sex appeal."

Following a comment that he did not intend to "sling mud" he brought up a 1939 fine paid by former Mayor George Christopher of San Francisco. The fine was alleged to be \$5,000, and according to the Christopher forces was paid because of a law concerning milk that had already been declared unconstitutional in Los Angeles.

Ashcraft also came out strongly against unification of the school districts. He cited how officials had gone to the California School Board and had not been even allowed to talk. He said that that was reason alone for him to be against the unification. Stull also came out against unification.

The group was receptive to the talks and enjoyed a social hour following the more formal part of the program.

Contributions Needed

SAN DIEGO — Five 50-ton United States Marine Corps tanks will be at strategic locations in San Diego County on Friday, April 29th as a grand finale of "Marines Care Days" in San Diego.

Manned by uniformed U. S. Marines and San Diego State College girls, the tanks will serve as contribution points for the U. S. Marine Reserve Civic Action Fund for Vietnam campaign which ends Friday night.

The Marines and college girls will be on duty from 9:30 A.M. until 9:30 P.M. to accept contributions to the fund to provide fighting Marines with medicines, food and tools for use in the Corps' important civic action program among the Vietnamese people.

Tanks will be located at the San Diego Plaza and the College Grove, Grossmont, Mission Valley and Loma Square shopping centers.

CRIME WAVE IN ALPINE?

ALPINE — A series of five burglaries have residents and merchants on guard in recent weeks.

First of the victims was the First Southern Baptist Church which lost a fire extinguisher on April sixth.

Next to be hit was the Fiberglass Menagerie where the thieves took a Hereford steer. Fiberglass was hit once again but nothing was taken on the second attempt.

On April 22, Lewis Pick of 2445 Hwy. 80 was robbed of several men's wristwatches and a number of women's wrist bands. The same evening, Bill's TV was also hit twice and transistor radios were the main objective at that business. He is also located on Hwy. 80.

Ethel Little of 1475 Olive-wood Lane was robbed on April 23 of gasoline, strawberries, ice cream, walnuts and eggs. The same evening P. W. Dugan of 1466 Olive-wood Lane lost a propane torch, motorcycle trailer and a canvas overnight bag.

McGuffie's Sundries was apparently on the list as there appeared to be an attempt to rob that establishment.

According to authorities contacted Tuesday, there has been no physical evidence. However, there are various individuals being investigated.

The sheriff's department claims that Alpine has good protection and that men are on patrol here 24 hours a day.

Freedom Short Lived

ALPINE — About 6 p.m. Tuesday evening, two truck loads of cattle passed through town and headed west. The first truck developed tire trouble on the new detour and both trucks stopped to fix the tire.

While they were stopped, they looked up to see the back truck heading back to Alpine — driverless.

The driver caught up with the truck but not in time to prevent the trailer from jack-knifing and flipping over.

A helpful cowboy unloaded

his horse and managed to herd the loose cattle down into the canyon. About this time, this reporter came through the canyon taking a short cut to Highway 80, and was confronted with about 30 head of cattle.

The cattle detoured to the stream below and were later returned to their transportation.

As far as is known at press time, no person or animal was hurt.

REPORT BY THE COMMITTEE TO ELECT JOHN STULL

ALPINE — The Alpine and Mountain Empire Committees to Elect John Stull Assembly-

man sponsored the candidate at a meeting Saturday afternoon, April 23rd at Fuller Hall in Alpine. Also making an address was Hale Ashcraft, present Assemblyman from the 80th district, who is now running for election to the senate in the newly created 38th senatorial district.

John Stull, a retired naval commander, was introduced by Louie Landt, who with his wife Bertha, is co-chairman of the Alpine committee. Mrs. Fred Kerns is the Mountain Empire chairman. The candidate is a member of the policy making Republican State Central Committee, served last year as 80th Assembly district precinct chairman and as an associate member of the county central committee. He was Republican Associate precinct coordinator for the 80th district

assembly in the 1964 campaign.

"The property taxpayer must get some relief and soon," Stull said. "It is the height of discrimination to make this 32 percent segment of the population foot so much of the bill." He amplified his program for action in the field of welfare, crime control, water development, agriculture and education.

"The great 80th is one of the most challenging areas in the U. S. We truly have an abundance of nature's gifts and opportunities for man. Consequently, a constructive, consistent philosophy of government is necessary to permit creative growth and development of our potentialities." He said, "I think I can relate traditional Republican philosophy to action."

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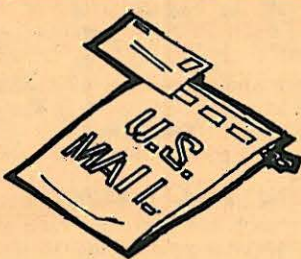

Those wily multi-party lines know the service is entirely unsatisfactory, for invariably when one needs the line most, someone else also needs it first. I for one would be glad to help circulate a petition. Any helpers???

Local first place awards went to Crawford, Hoover, Mission Bay and Cathedral Girls' High Schools in San Diego.

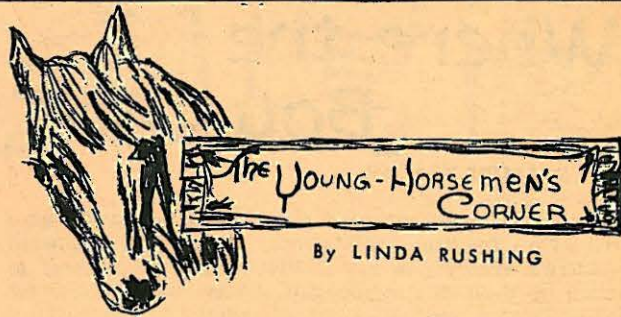
Junior high schools taking first awards were Washington in Vista and Castle Park and Chula Vista in Chula Vista.

ALPINE — Attending the Recognition Day at the Tops Club convention at Long Beach were several from this area.

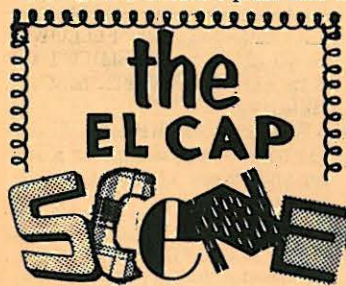

Here's a great hint if your horses are poor at crossing logs and have possibly lost you a few trail horse classes; work the horse in the dark, and use logs painted a light color so the horse can easily see them. Because of horses being more cautious at night or in the dark, the horse will soon learn to cross the logs slowly and carefully.

Here's a great idea for straightening out a knock-kneed foal. Take 12 toe sacks, roll them up and place them between the foal's legs — using straps around the foal's neck to hold the sacks in place. In most cases the legs begin to straighten in two to three weeks and become completely straight within three months.

So the boys on the line wouldn't miss

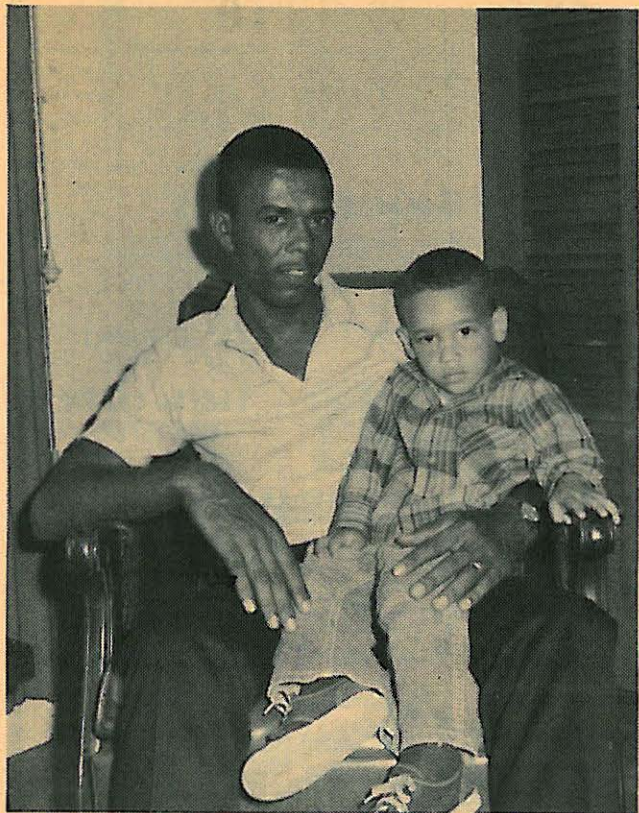
The scent of a flower, a sunrise fair

I HAD OCCASION to use my favorite covered candy-dish, a lovely crystal thing which has been in the family for years and I couldn't find it anywhere. It is easy for me to lose things, but even I would have trouble permanently misplacing such a large dish. Finally, in despair, I asked Robert if he had seen it. He and Cavanaugh exchanged sheepish looks and Robert said, "I might as well confess, we broke it."

"WHAT WERE YOU doing with my crystal candy dish?"

"WELL, YOU SEE when we took that Yellow-bellied Sapsucker to the zoo, we had to have something to carry it in and we grabbed the first convenient thing we saw. It was after we turned over the bird that we dropped it. We only used it because it was handy," said Robert — and of course we had to have something with a cover on it."

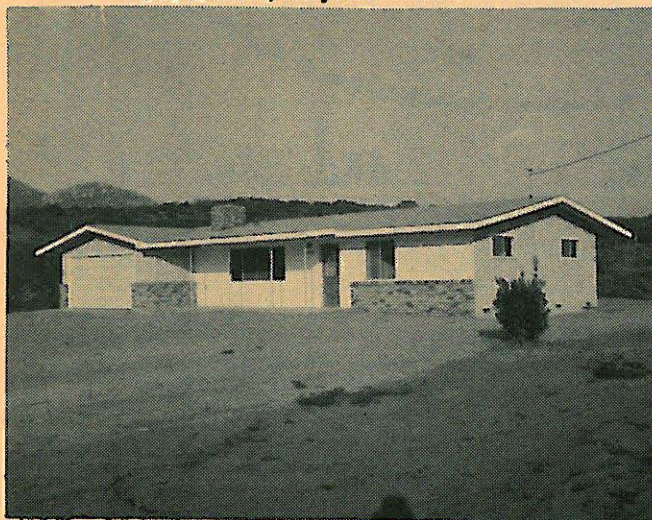

The estimated local payroll of the El Cajon exchange is \$872,000.

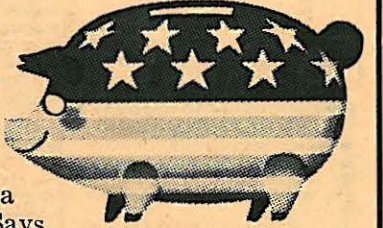
Total taxes paid by the Pacific Company within the major incorporated city were, \$284,801. This compares to \$264,021,979 paid throughout the state of California.
