Purchase of furniture will be made from the Brunswick Corporation.

A 5% salary increase for certificated personnel was included in the proposed salary schedule. As presented, the preliminary budget would

cause no increase in taxes.

A letter of resignation from trustee Pike Meade was accepted with regrets. Larry Wilcox and Fred Rushing are to present a list of suitable candidates for the vacancy on the board from which a successor will be appointed within the next 60 days.

The board voted as a whole to support the movement to oppose mandated unification.

## 4-H Take Field Trip

The 4-H members who participated in the Farm Business Activity took seven field trips this year. This activity is a study of farm cooperatives and other forms of business.

Our first trip was to Calavo Growers of California in Escondido. This marketing cooperative provides for the selling, packing, picking, and transporting of avocados and citrus fruits. The manager felt that the biggest advantage of this type of business was the stable market.

February ninth we were the guests of the San Diego Production Credit Association's Annual Stockholders meeting and banquet at the Community Concourse. This service cooperative offers short term agricultural loans. Mr. Ramstead, our 4-H leader, is manager of this co-op.

Dean Copp, the manager of the San Diego Cooperative Poultry Association was our host during a visit to this cooperative corporation. We learned that they manufacture and deliver feed, process and market eggs and have a wholesale hardware and supply department.

Our fourth field trip was to Weary River Ranch of Escondido. It is an individually

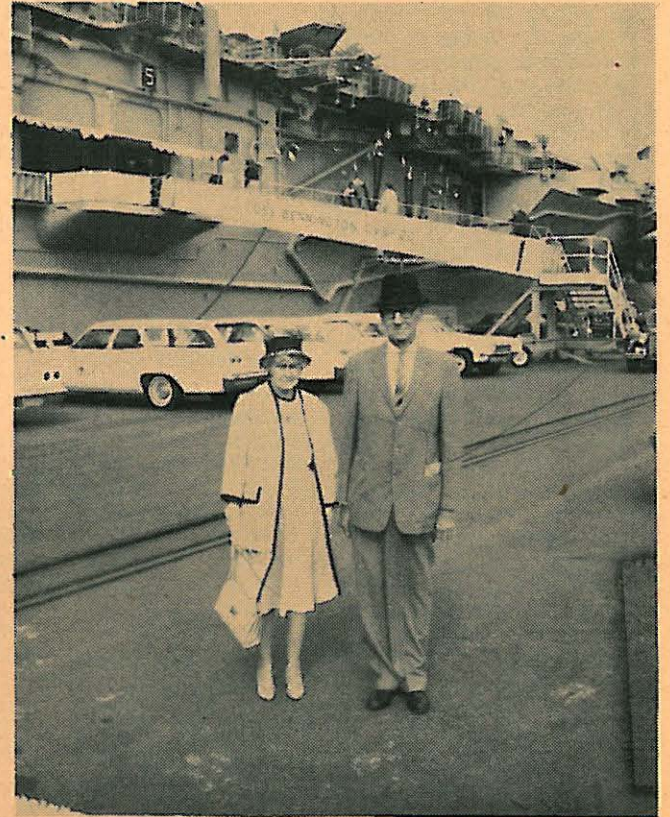
owned dairy. At this ranch we observed the artificial insemination of cows. This dairy has recently adapted new pie-shaped pens for more efficient feeding and milking of animals.

The field trip that I enjoyed most was to Prohoroff Poultry Farm in San Marcos. It is a partnership business having over one million chickens.

They sell chiefly to Mayfair Markets. This chicken ranch is the largest in the world. The owners provide on-the-ranch housing for their employees.

Our last field trip was to the Elks Lodge of El Cajon for dinner. We were the guests of San Diego Cooperative Poultry Association at their Annual Stockholders' Meeting. This year is their golden anniversary.

I have enjoyed being an active member of this year's 4-H Farm Business Activity, experiencing many new adventures. I have learned that the motive of each person doing business is to make a profit but a business, when conducted properly, benefits all the people. The organization of American business has provided us with the highest standard of living in the world.

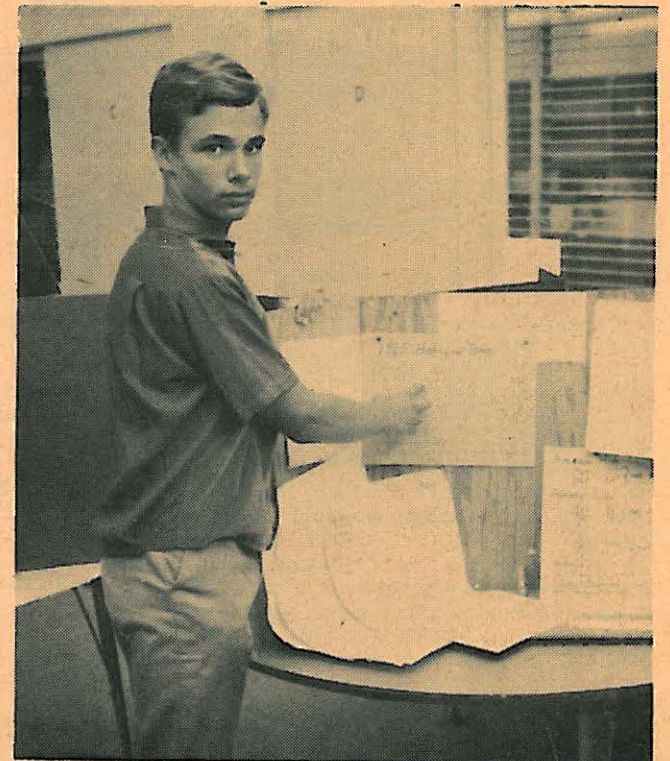
From Area 2 those running

Area 3 candidates are Willard L. Ericson and H. Warren Buckner.

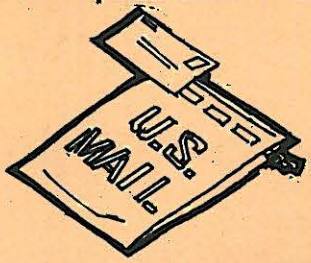
From Area 4 Margaret Ness and Vern Odmark have filed.

We would like to thank you and also to congratulate you on having the courage to publish the names of the juvenile delinquents in the recent issue of your newspaper.

By keeping these boys anonymous it would also make suspect every other Alpine boy of age 13 or 14 who is currently attending the Junior High. In publishing the statistics you have cleared the rest of our youthful Alpiners from unwarranted suspicion.

Having, long ago, also been engaged in rearing a family we understand the difficulties that are involved in this effort, and can appreciate somewhat the trials these parents are going through at the present time which is much tougher than forty or fifty years ago.

We believe with J. Edgar Hoover that the danger from coddling youthful offenders by the courts can not be overemphasized.

This is a very real and urgent National problem.

Obviously these local boys are not hardened criminals and it is to be hoped that this experience will cause them to vow a fervent "never again."

If we could get across to all our young people the eternal truth that — "As a man soweth that shall he also reap" — This is not just a pious affirmation but is a statement of a universal law of nature. This law is completely impersonal in its action. No amount of "passing the buck" or "cover up" can stay its effects.

To attempt to write and edit a weekly newspaper for any small community is not an easy assignment. We think of the many difficulties that must come up in the process. To speak with candor when it seems necessary, to take a stand on any controversial subject, yet to write with understanding and compassion is indeed a challenge.

**WARNING ISSUED**

SAN DIEGO — Mussels along the entire California coast will be under State quarantine as unfit for human consumption from May 1 to October 31.

Dr. J.B. Askew, director of the San Diego Department of Public Health has said the State Department of Public Health imposes the quarantine at this time each year.

He explained that during warm weather a tiny marine organism called Gonyaulax cantenella is very plentiful in coastal waters. Mussels feeding on it become highly poisonous to man and could kill anyone who eats them.

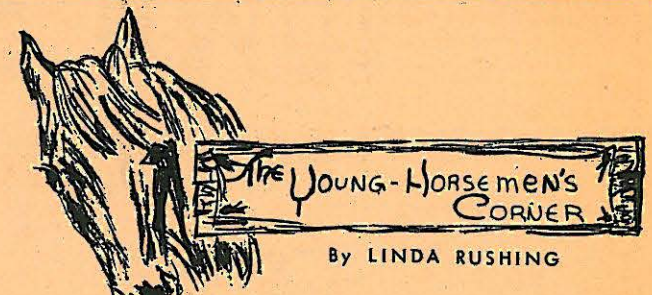

After the leather wrapped bit is used once, the leather will shrink and become very tightly bound and will last for several years.

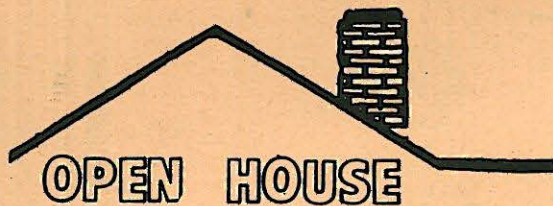

There was also a hood designed to cover the whole head and it had a long tail attached to it. It made me think of Daniel Boone. Something called an "Imp Cap" in black straw was somehow reminiscent of a motorcycle policeman's headgear. There was one fairly attractive blue number designed to stick, by some magic means, to the side of the head. On me it just kept falling off. Not really what I had in mind, anyway.

Father gazed at me absently over his glasses, said "M-hm-m-m" non-committally and went back to his paper. Mother didn't say anything and just as she opened her mouth, my brother came in. Now my brother was never the soul of tact, but he was a charter member of the more knowledgeable set in high school and we all respected his judgment. He looked at me long and considerably.

"IS THAT," HE asked, "a new hat?"

"YES," I SAID, feeling for once very sure of myself. "What do you think of it?"

"TURN AROUND," COMMANDED my brother. And I complied. This was a smart hat, a becoming hat, and this time I couldn't possibly fail.

THERE WAS A long silence. "Well," said my brother, finally. "I'll tell you, Ruth — you just go ahead and wear that hat, no matter what ANYBODY says!"

I WAS CRUSHED. I retreated to my room in tears. I put that hat away in a box and I never wore it. Someday I shall ask a psychiatrist if this thing I have about hats is in anyway related to this traumatic experience!

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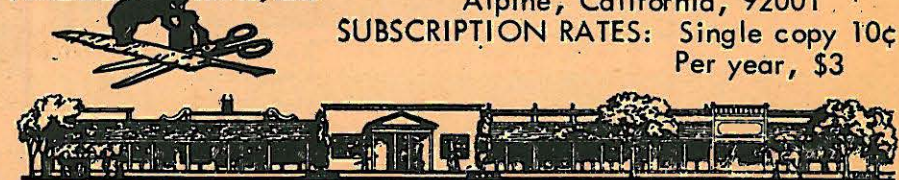

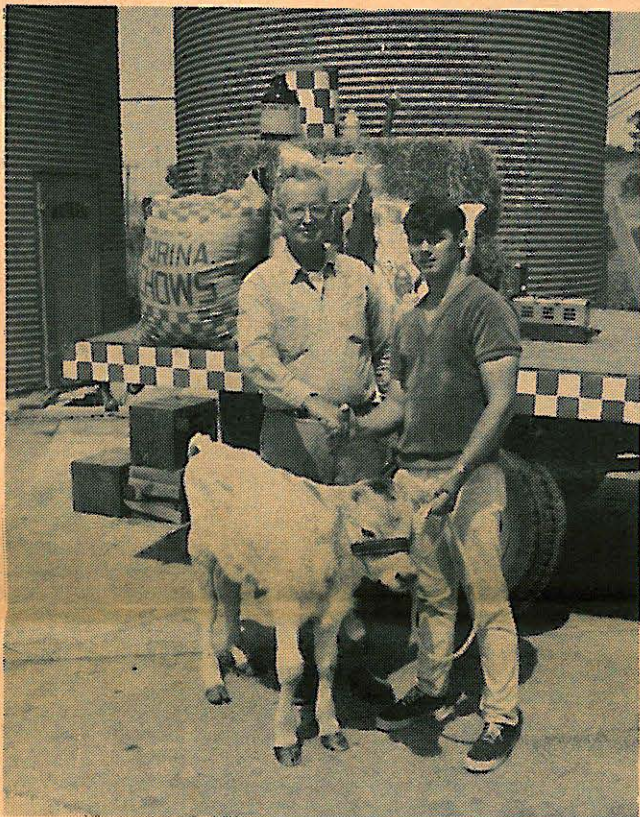
