Egg Processing Plant Starts

ALPINE — Charles C. Campbell, president of Westco Egg Farm, disclosed today that the new egg processing plant on Highway 80, now under construction, will be ready for occupancy July 1st.

The Triple C Egg Ranch, Star Route Egg Farm, La Posta Egg Ranch and Hatfield Creek Egg Ranch have combined to form the Westco Corporation for processing eggs.

M. W. Killian will be the general manager of the new plant. The plant capacity for handling and processing eggs will be 12,000 cases a week. The plant is set up for cleaning, candling, grading and packing. At the present time the four ranches have 450,000 hens. They market eggs throughout the western states with customers in Denver and Washington.

Here's Your Chance

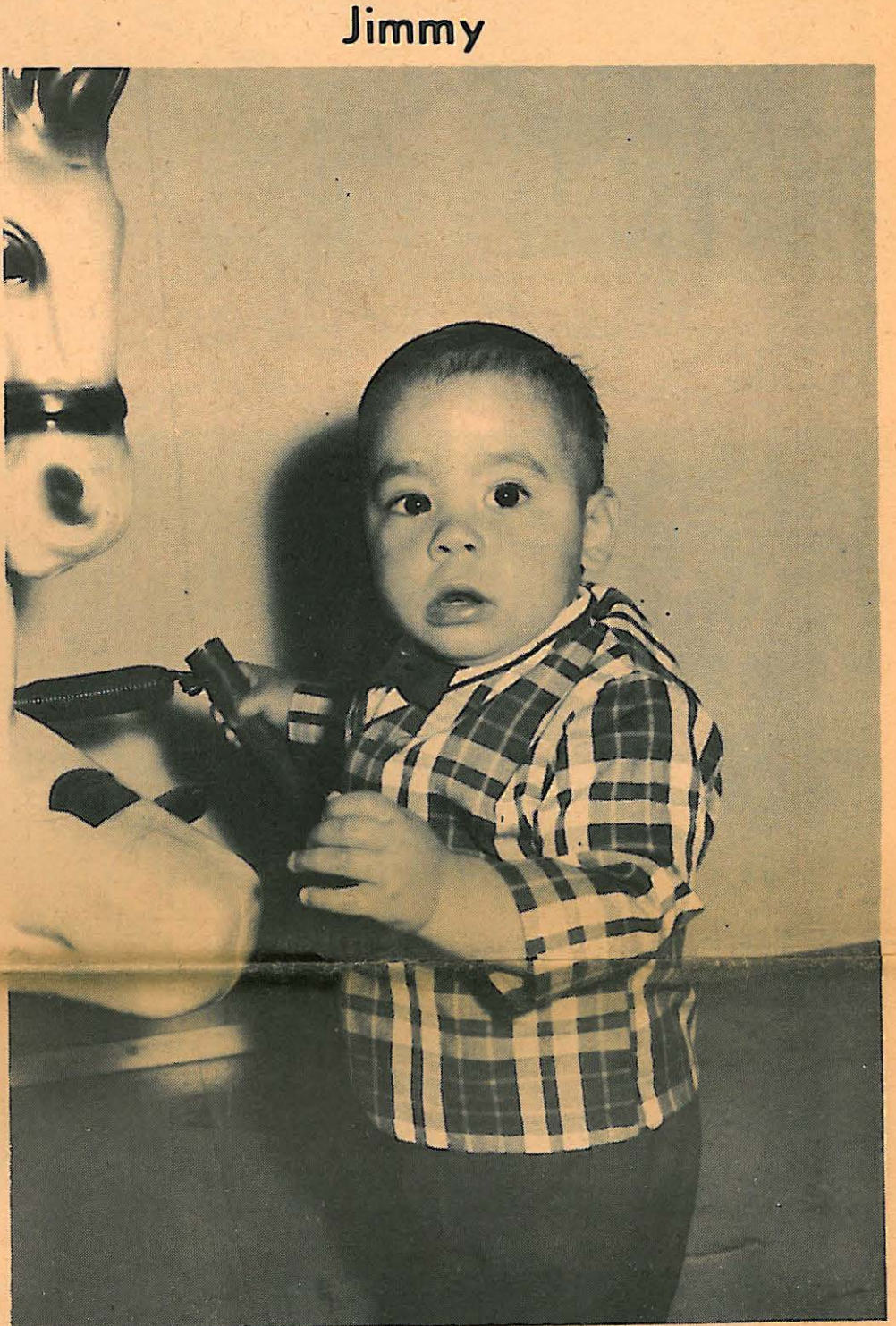

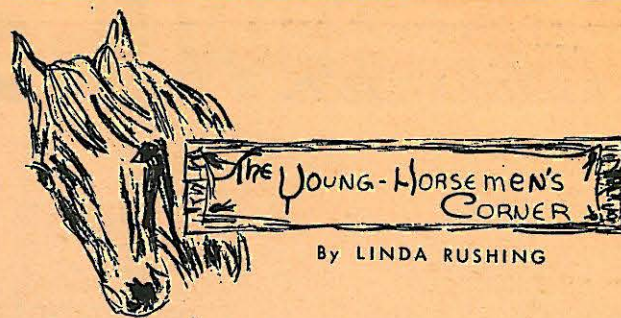

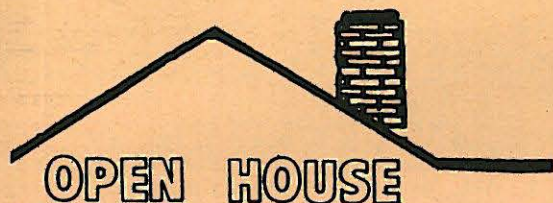

Editorial

SINGLE DISTRICT UNIFICATION

BRIBERY, BLACKMAIL and PROPAGANDA

First the state says this is the only plan you may vote on. Four times, elected representatives sent split recommendations to the state board and four times they refused to let the people vote on these plans. Then they try to bribe the voters with their own tax dollars saying "We will give you \$15 per child if you vote yes." There is no assurance that this money will continue after all districts are bribed into unification votes. This \$15 is strictly at the whim of legislature.

Second both El Cajon and Grossmont High School Districts have stated that if unification is not passed they will need more tax money to balance their budgets. In other words a form of blackmail (vote yes or we tax you). If these two large districts are in financial trouble now how will unification solve their money problems? It can't, and in spite of the \$15 bribe the entire district under unification will need more money.

Third, as of this date there have been no facts based on actual study to prove the contention that education will improve. All that has been offered so far is opinion and propaganda. By contrast studies show that districts of this size when unified tend to level the educational program to the median thus depriving some children of outstanding programs.

Our choice is to vote "no" and stay as we are now until A/B 145 can be changed. Twenty three of twenty six elections since January 1, 1966 have failed in the date. All five unification elections held in San Diego County during this school year have failed; thus proving, bribes, blackmail and propaganda have not been swallowed.

It's In The Library

Yes, the new complete five volume set of books on the history of San Diego is permanently in the Alpine Branch of the San Diego County Library, thanks to the generosity of Major Reuben Fleet. A telephone inquiry to the library headquarters presented this interesting information: Major Fleet was the first president of Consolidated Convair; that he is now retired and that he has presented similar sets of books to the other 35 branches in the County Library system. A truly magnificent gift!

The titles of these lavishly illustrated volumes, commissioned by James S. Copley and written by Richard F. Pourade, are intriguing: The Explorers, Time of the Bells, The Silver Dons, The Glory Years, and Gold in the Sun. These books have attracted attention of all historians and lovers of fine books. Each volume stands alone as a separate book on a separate period of history. Each can be borrowed for a period of two weeks with the privilege of renewal to those persons registered at the Alpine Library. So visit the library soon—Tuesday, 1 to 5; Thursday, 1 to 5; and Saturday, 10 to 2.

The memorial poppies are fashioned from crepe paper and wire stems and their production provides an interesting diversion for many hospitalized veterans. The work is considered valuable as occupational therapy, in addition to giving the disabled men the encouraging experience of earning money once again. All materials are supplied without cost by the Auxiliary which pays the hospitalized veteran for his work.

An estimated 150,000 volunteers from the Auxiliary will distribute some 20 million Memorial flowers on Poppy Day.

All contributions received from the patriotic Americans are used solely for the rehabilitation and child welfare programs conducted by the American Legion Auxiliary.

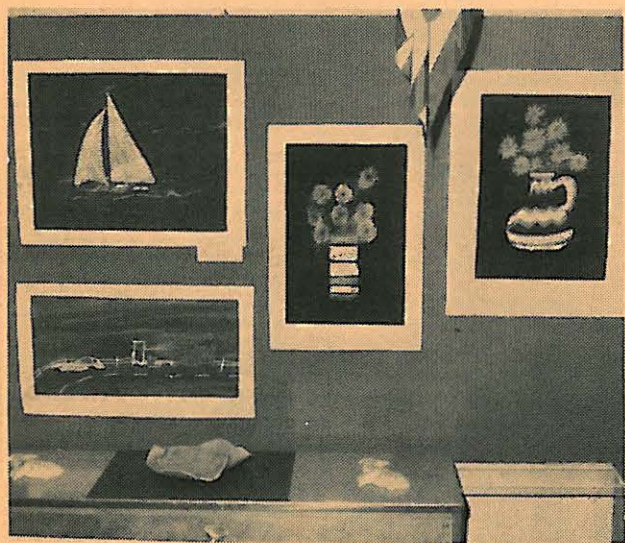

The beautiful back country of Southern California is indeed a fascinating area with its many opportunities for adventure. The engineering of outside plant facilities offers one of these opportunities.

Many people in today's mode of living desire a sprawling spread at the foot or on top of a mountain far remote from the congestion of the city. Though some distance from their nearest neighbor, they realize the need for communications - a telephone within their reach.

How we build the facility into these areas is the responsibility of the outside plant engineer. This is when his adventure begins.

He falls back on the old geometric postulate - the shortest distance between two points is a straight line - so he determines the shortest reasonable route possible. To be reasonable, he must design his route to the satisfaction of those whose property the route crosses. Many times the terrain is rugged to a point where it is hazardous to either walk or drive, and the possibility of injury from falls or being bitten by rattlesnakes, spiders, or tics is increased. He must determine the economy of the route to protect his company's stockholders - how does he measure the costs of the route - simply by the labor and material it takes to build it. He may weigh several plans to determine the most economical job and the plan used will encompass several essential factors; to provide good service at a reasonable cost to the customer and a profit to the Company.

As our new highway 80 crawls eastward, our remote customer will be brought closer to us as a community and a Company; however, the engineering of outside plant into our mountainous backdrop will remain interesting, fascinating, exciting - full of adventure.

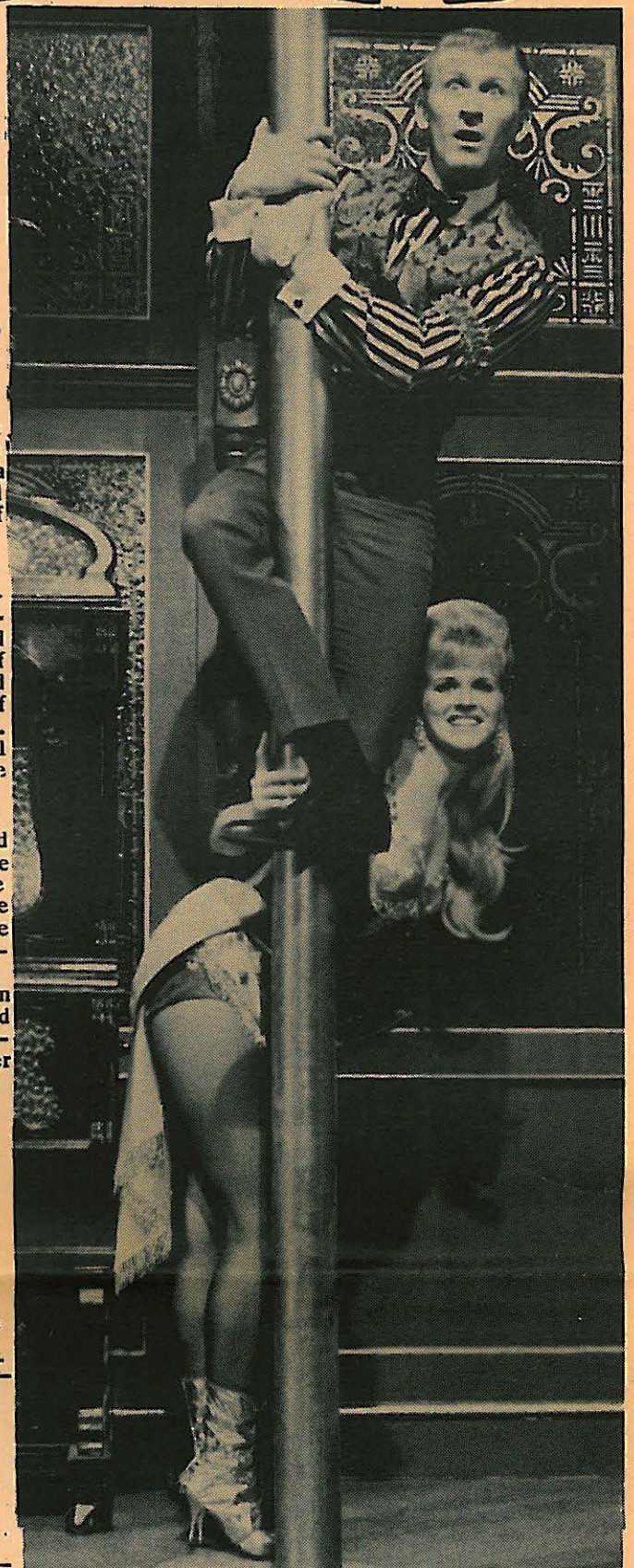

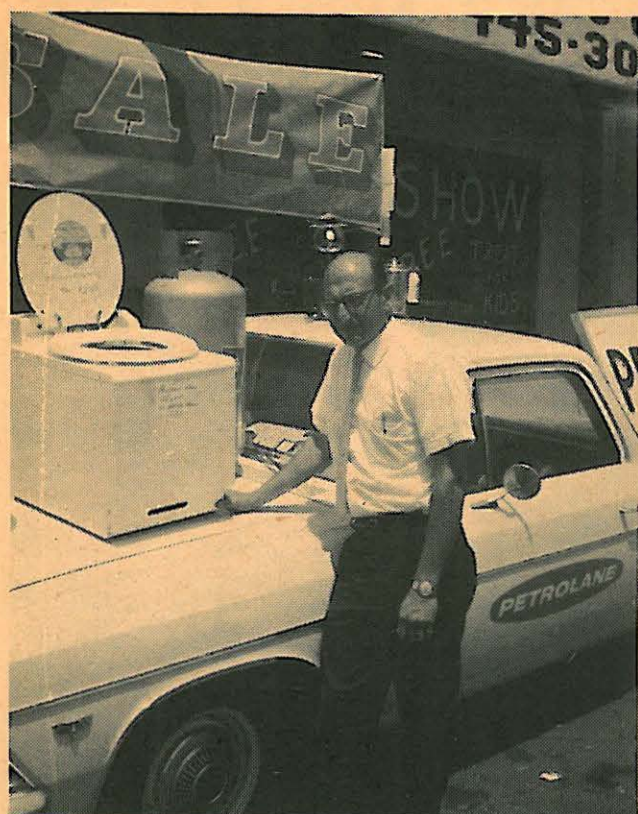

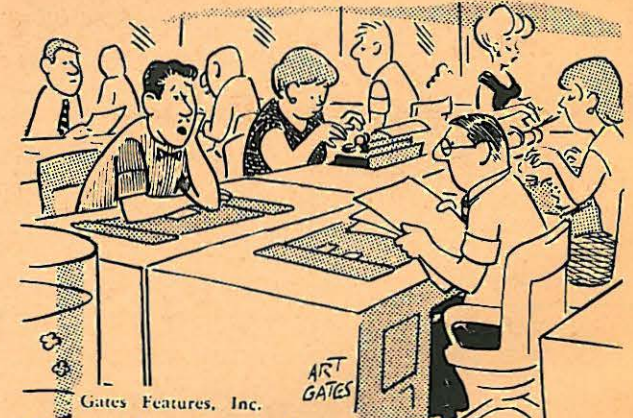
