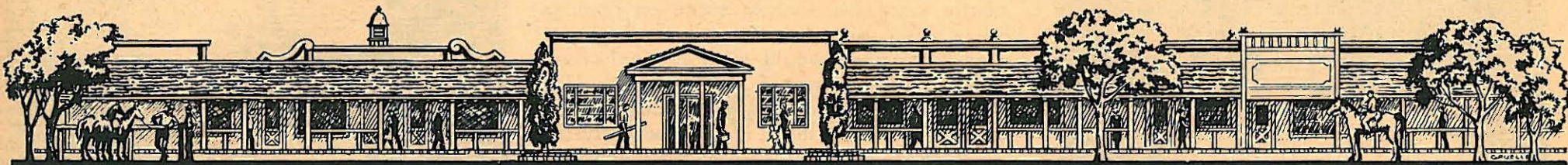

Burglaries Solved

ALPINE — The recent rash of burglaries in Alpine was apparently solved Friday April 29 when five juveniles were picked up and questioned. Each reportedly admitted to his share in one or more of the eleven thefts.

After questioning, the juveniles were released to their parents. They will appear before a juvenile judge in three weeks. The ages of the boys range from 13 to 14.

The estimated value of the merchandise taken is \$907.-42.

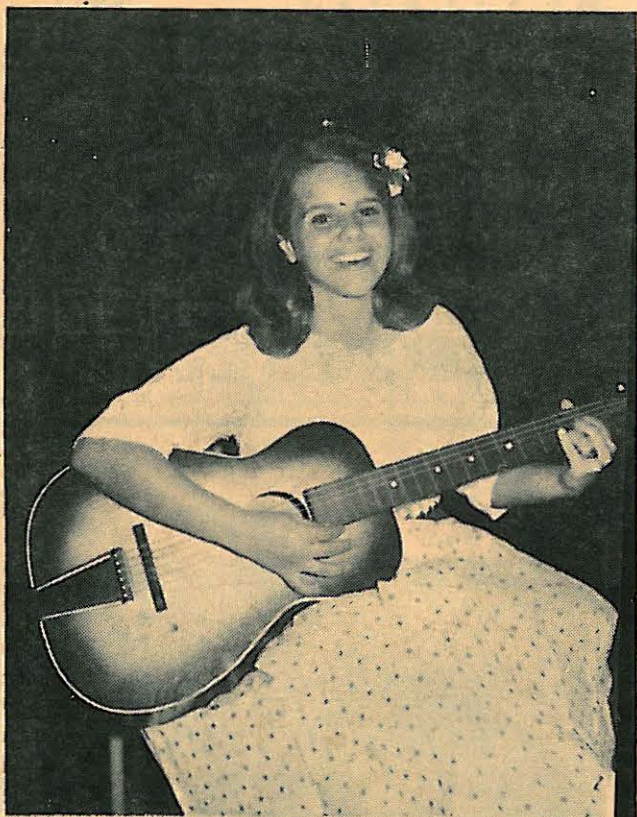

Last weekend Lakeside's Tumbleweed Riders put on a wonderful horse show.

Saturday, April 30, was an all-day quarter horse show and Sunday there was a nice open horse show.

This two-day show brought participants from all over San Diego County. Let's hope that their next show may be just as successful in bringing San Diego County another outstanding horse show.

At 6 Saturday morning the Rash's mare, Scarlet, foaled bringing to them a good looking colt.

The colt has a real good background, the mare being a thoroughbred and the sire, Pinky Bill, a well known quarter horse.

They expect the colt to color either a buckskin or a dun. They're not sure because it's a little too soon to tell.

Since there are quite a few new foals throughout Alpine here are some good hints for the early training of the foal:

First comes training the foal to lead and stand properly. At 10 to 14 days of age, place a well-fitted halter on the foal. After one or two days the foal will become accustomed to the halter and the next lesson will begin. This is to tie him securely in the stall alongside the mare for thirty minutes to an hour's time each day for two or three days. Be sure the foal is never allowed to break loose as it will try to repeat this if it once accomplishes breaking loose.

While the colt is securely tied, begin careful grooming using a cloth and small soft brush. Also handle the foot frequently after each leg is rubbed.

While training your foal always remember these two things:

1 - Early training of the foal will bring easier handling and easier training in the future.

2 - Give only one lesson at a time, making sure that each lesson is mastered.

Editorial

We have written the story this week that we had hoped would never have to be written.

As many of you may remember, several months ago, we took a stand on teenage crime. We said that when teenagers were apprehended we would print not only their names but the names of their parents. Unfortunately, eleven burglaries occurred last week. These burglaries were apparently the result of the action of five of our teenagers.

We are aware that many newspapers across the land have taken this same stand. And in the areas where the newspapers do print the names of juveniles, the rate of crime by juveniles has dropped considerably. We would hope that this would have the same effect in Alpine.

Some may say this is a first offense. However - count them. One, two, three, four, five, six, seven, eight, nine, ten, eleven. Had the youngsters stopped with the first burglary we might have withheld the names. But they did not. These can scarcely be called first offenses.

Listen to J. Edgar Hoover: "Most difficulty with youthful offenders stems from the home where a sound sense of values is diminishing. Parents need to stress discipline, guidance, and morality, and to play down indulgence, pleasure, and money. Protective coddling by some courts of 'tender-age' repeaters is an appeasement of justice. It infringes on the rights of the people. I say let the flagrant violators be exposed. Let the public know their identities so it may be alert to their law-breaking habits."

Once more, hear J. Edgar Hoover: "Over the years I have strongly emphasized the vital necessity for law enforcement and the public to know the identities of those persons regardless of age, who threaten the welfare of our communities. Fear of social censure has long been one of the basic deterrents to wrongdoing. In this respect, the growing trend of public opinion in favor of unmasking the flagrant juvenile violator is indeed encouraging."

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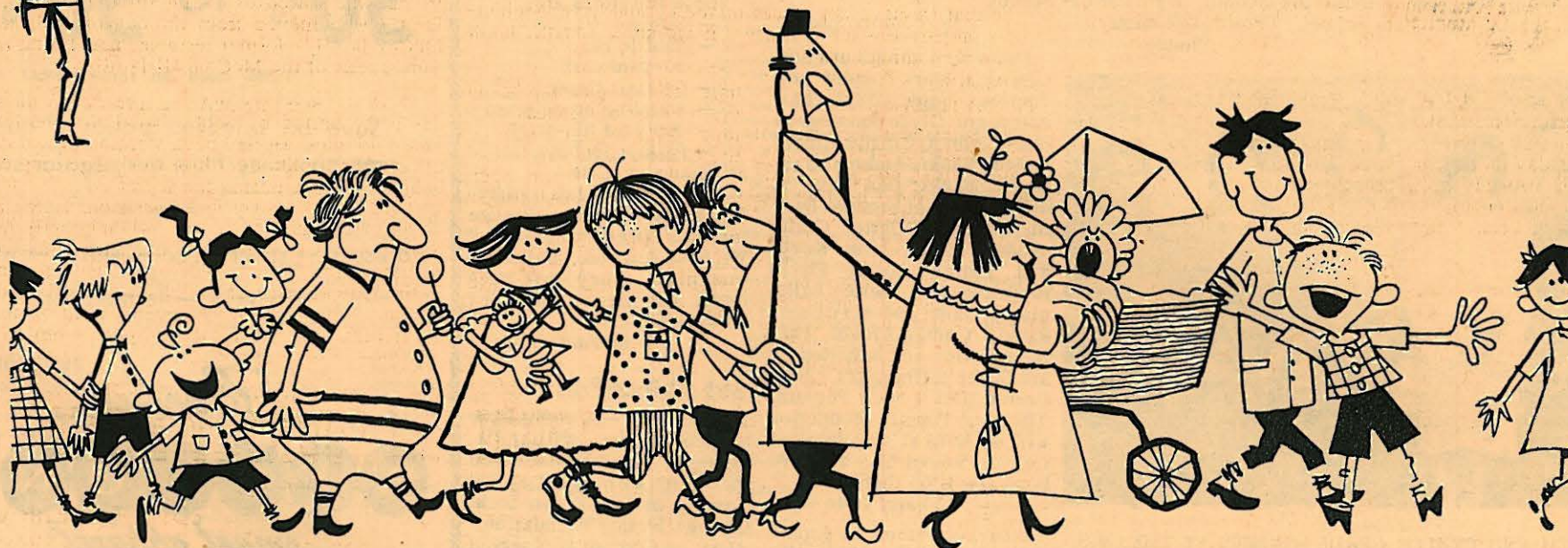
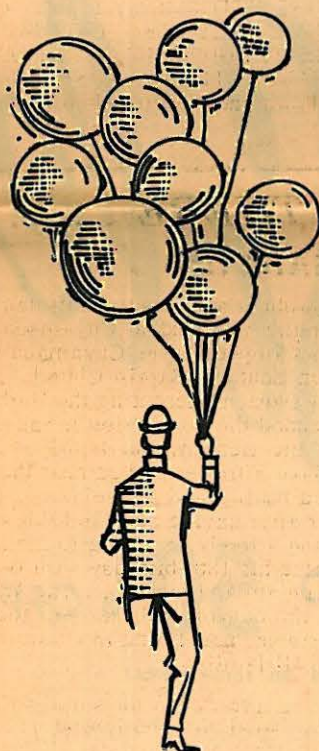

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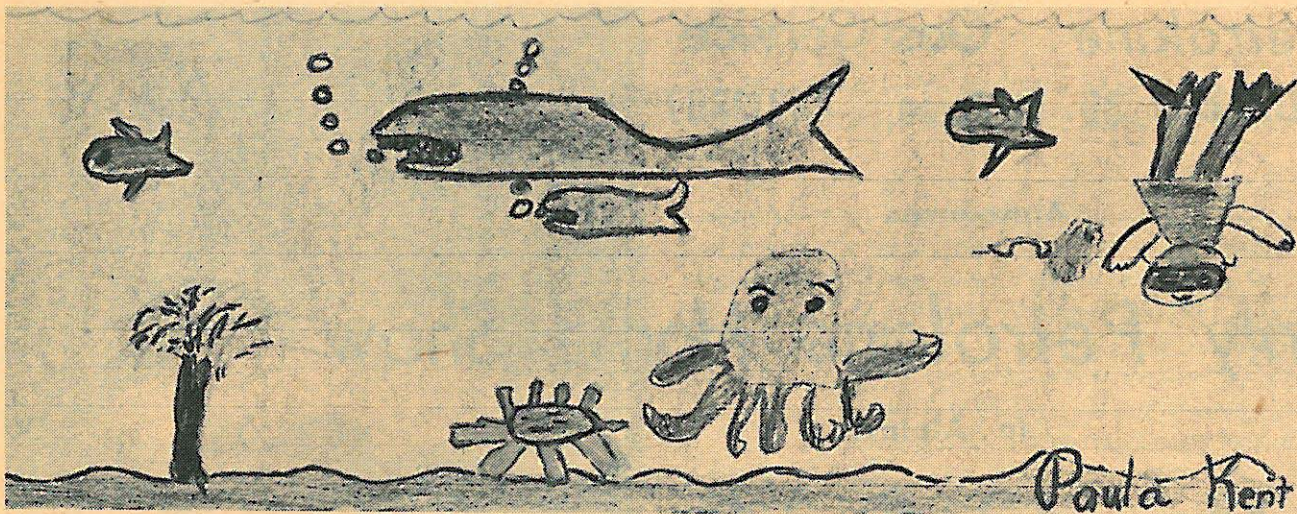

Mrs. Prince was chairman of the day.

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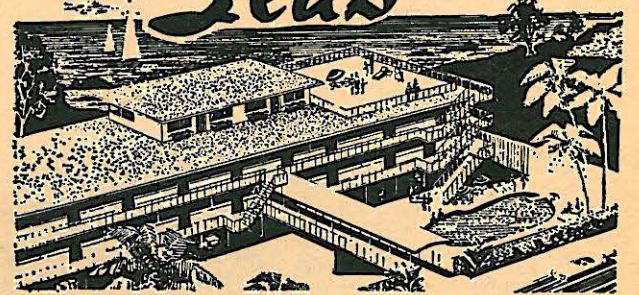
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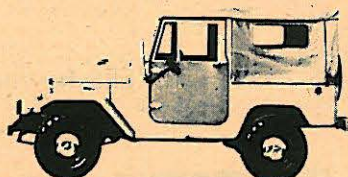
