

Combine and sift flour, soda and salt. Cream butter or margarine. Add sugar, egg and vanilla; mix until smooth and creamy. Stir in dry ingredients; blend in chopped candy bars and pecans. Drop tablespoonfuls 2 inches apart onto greased baking sheets. Bake in moderate oven (350 deg.) until done, 12 to 15 minutes. Remove from baking sheets; cool. Yield: About 3 dozen cookies.



Here are some good tips on how to care for as well as train

As your foal reaches six months of age, he becomes a weanling. At this age it is wise to separate the foal from its dam and put it out to pasture in a separate paddock, where there may be other weanlings.

After the weanling gets used to being separated from the dam, in about a month, he should be shod. This experience makes him rather nervous, but he will relax after discovering it doesn't hurt.

Before becoming a yearling the weanling should receive lessons in how to stand. This may be done with a halter and rope or a bridle and long reins. The rope or reins are held in one hand, and in the other is held a rattle. By making a rattling sound the colt raises his head high, which usually puts his head in a good, proud, position, and he soon learns to hold it in this manner.



- 12 sprigs fresh parsley
- 4 sprigs celery leaves

Burgundy 1 cup chicken stock Tie crown of lamb in circle. Rub surface of roast with salt and

insert slivers of garlic into meaty portion in center of crown. The center may be filled with ground lamb trimmings when purchased. Cover each rib bone with a piece of aluminum foil during roasting. Place crown in pan with parsley, celery leaves, onions and carrots.

Sear over flame about 15 minutes, basting frequently with vegetables. Pour wine and chicken stock over roast and transfer to oven. Roast, basting frequently, in 350°F. oven until well done, approximately 2 hours. Test with meat thermometer; internal temperature should be 180°F. Remove roast from oven and let stand 15 minutes. Remove aluminum foil covering on each rib; replace with frilled papers. Slice roast by running knife close to bone of each rib down to platter. When serving roast, fill center with hot Brussel Sprouts. Garnish platter with parsley and crab apples. Serves: 6-8.





How Much Do You Know About Eye Habits When Driving?

Harold L. Smith, a professional driving teacher, John J. Cummings, a highway transportation expert, and Dr. Reuel A. Sherman, specialist in occupational vision, have made the teaching of safe driving their life work. Together, the three men have isolated eye habits while at the wheel as one factor toward safety and have come to interesting conclusions. Are the following statements TRUE or FALSE?

TRUE FALSE 1. The best drivers steer by watching the curb close by or the white line on their 2. When passing another car or truck, one should watch the fender of his car to see that it is not coming too close. 3. ANSWERS: 1 and 2: FALSE. Both statements are characteristic of lowaim steering. To steer correctly, your eyes should focus 150 or more feet ahead at the center of your driving path. In this way, you are utilizing a greater portion of your fringe vision as well as central eyesight.




