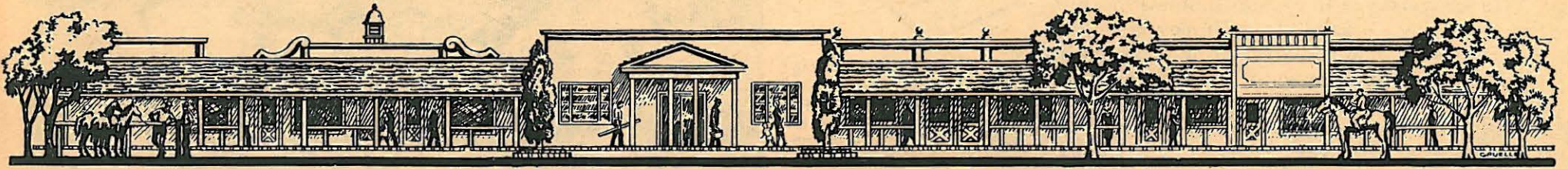

La Cresta Road Dedicated

CREST — A dedication ceremony held in connection with the completion of improvement on the fourth and final section of La Cresta Road was held at 10 a. m., August 12, 1966. Mr. James (Jimmie) Doonan acted as master of ceremonies. The dedication site was alongside La Cresta Road near its junction with Mountain View Road in the Crest area.

Following welcoming remarks by the master of ceremonies, the Reverend Gerald Woodhouse, Pastor of Crest Community Church, gave the Invocation. After introduc-

tion of special guests, Doonan remarked on the efforts of the Crest Civic Group in behalf of this road improvement on behalf of the citizens benefited and thanked Mr. Henry A. Boney, the Second District Supervisor, for his support of this project.

Upon introduction, Boney called attention to the increased safety and riding qualities of the improved road which will benefit Crest and Harbison Canyon residents.

In thanking residents for their patience with this project, Boney pointed out that

projects of this magnitude, competing with other county road requirements for a share of the limited funds available, must be scheduled over a period of years. Funds for this road improvement were from the San Diego County apportionment of the Highway Users Tax.

A Benediction was given by the Reverend Father Charles Dollen of St. Louise de Marillac Catholic Church.

The ribbon-cutting ceremony by Supervisor Boney and the official party closed the ceremony.

Prizes from \$5 to \$25 will be given away.

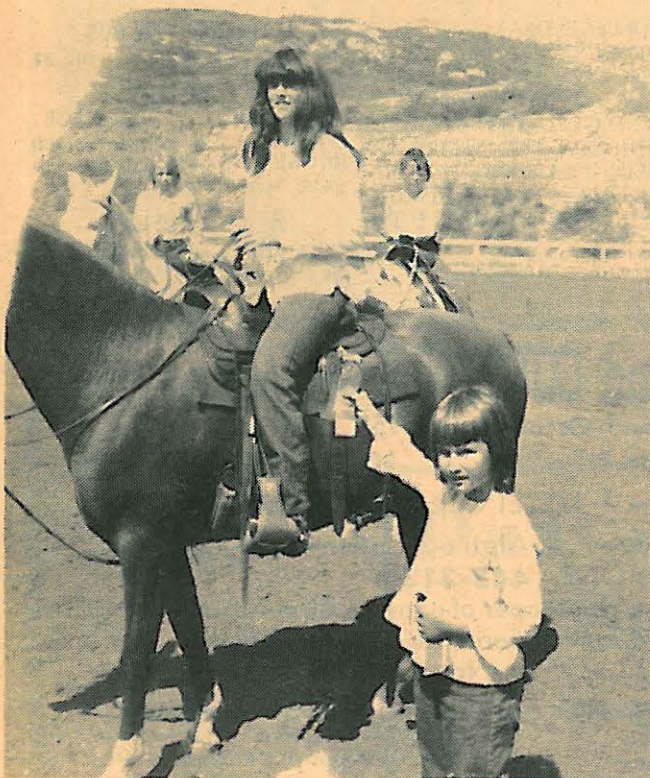
Uniforms for these boys will do much for their morale and do much to help advertise the area from which they come, Alpine.

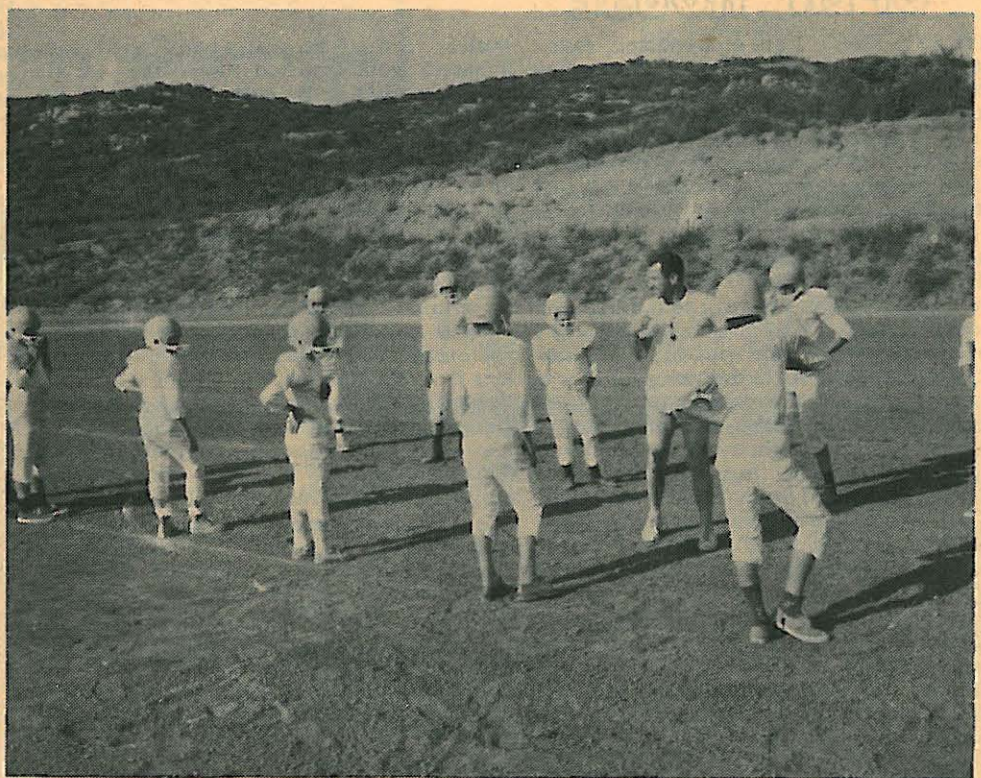
Supervisors Sought

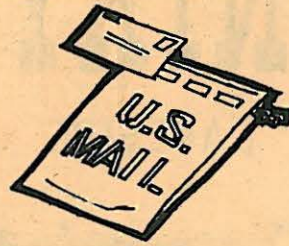

August 3, 1966

Dear Dr. Sloan,

I must begin with not knowing how to thank you for making possible my present experience. I only have about three and a half weeks left, weeks which are very busy and I want to describe my appreciation for your efforts.

In a few days I'm going to Machu Picha, something which I've dreamed and read about for years.

After I return from a three or four day visit of the Lost City and Cuzco, I'll leave for the ranch of my Peruvian family. They own a ranch of 12,000,000 square meters! It is about 9,000 feet but to get there we'll travel over the highest road in the world, 18,000 feet!

I've looked forward to this trip for weeks and with good reason. We will meet and talk with President Belanude at his palace in two weeks.

After the presidential meeting I'm afraid that we wrap up our visit and prepare to leave and go home.

I love Peru, but I'll be very glad to come home. Lakeside is very important to me — now more than ever.

I'll be home soon to describe what you have made possible.

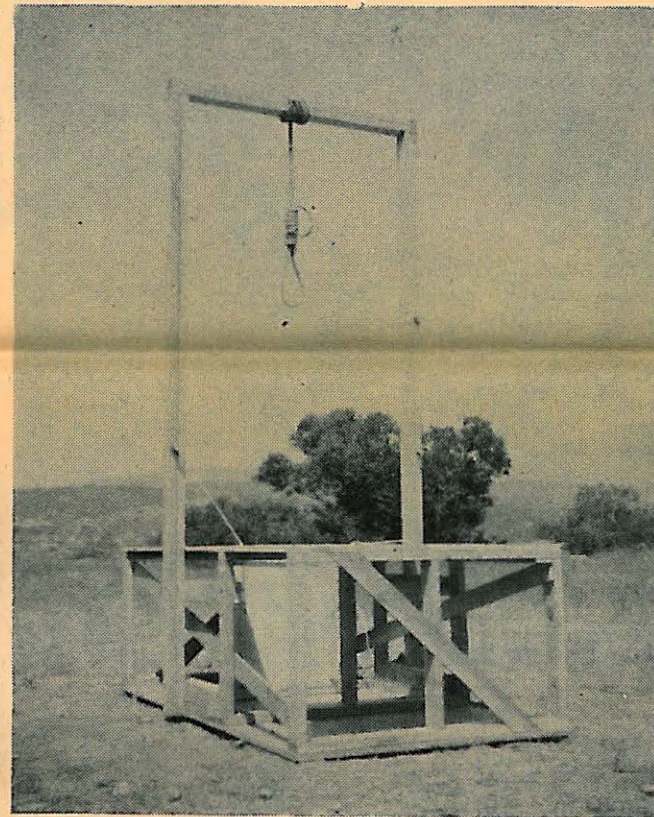
"WHAT ARE YOU talking about?" I asked, abandoning the circulation count in mid-air.

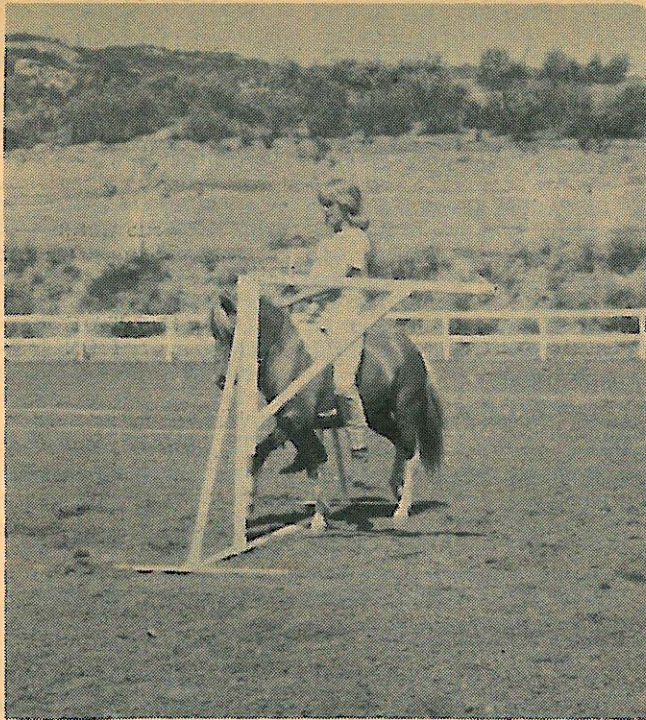

Mr. Sutton had been an employee of General Dynamics for 26 years and a county resident for 30 years. He had lived in Alpine for approximately five years.

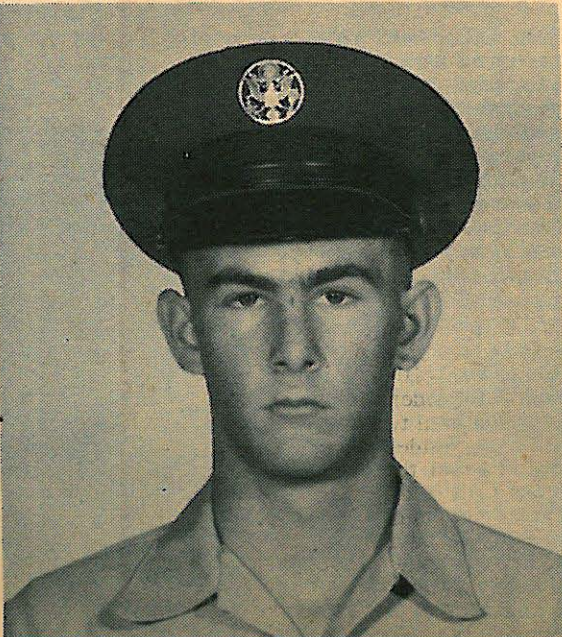
Survivors are, Bertha, his wife, and daughters, Jody 15, Shirley 10, and Betty 8.

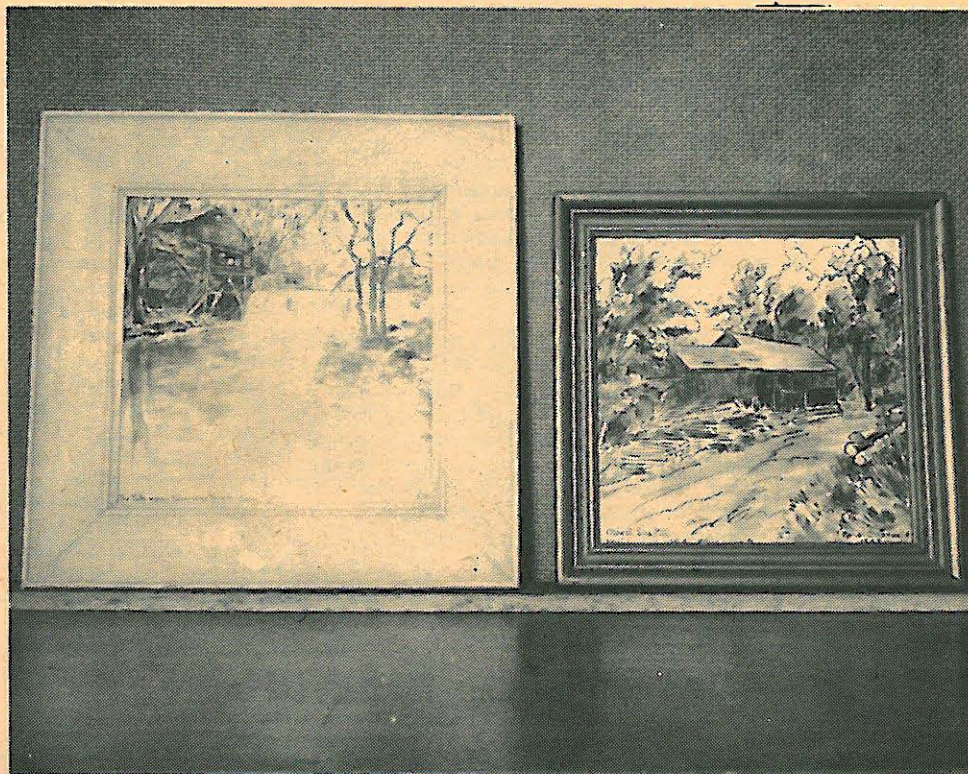
Mrs. Mansfield has been teaching at Southwestern Beauty College and her husband worked for University Motors.

According to friends, the plane stopped to refuel and when it took off, it didn't gain enough altitude.

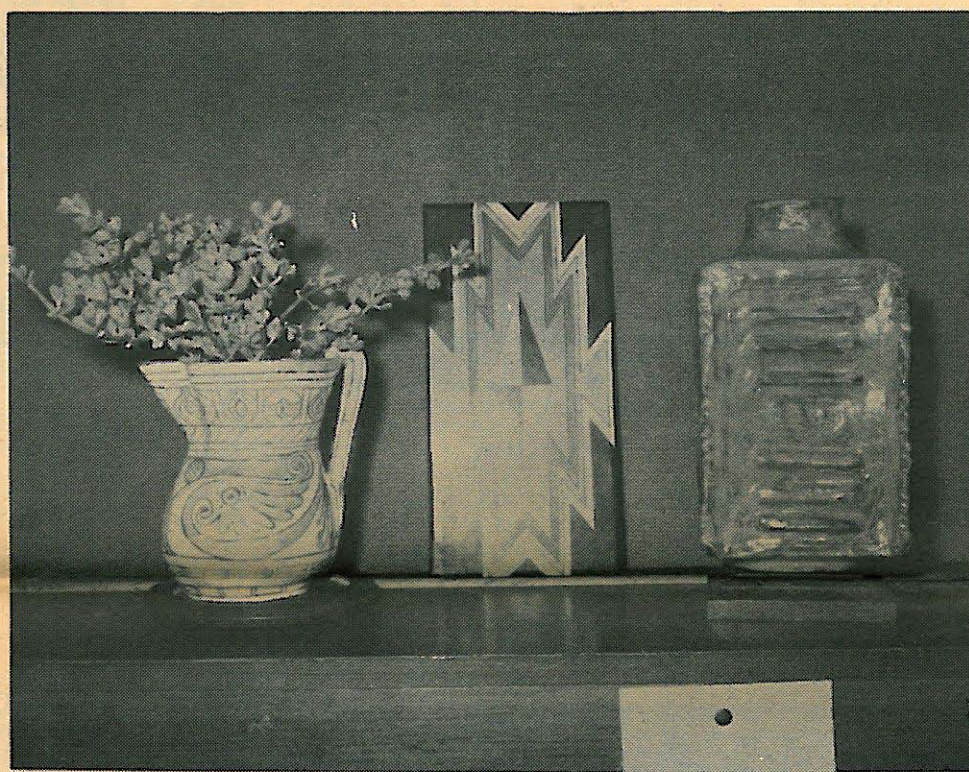
Services were held at Christ Lutheran Church and burial was at Fort Rosecrans.

We are glad to hear that Dickie Sullivan of Alpine Heights Rd. is recuperating nicely from her recent surgery.

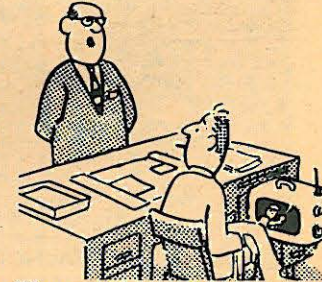

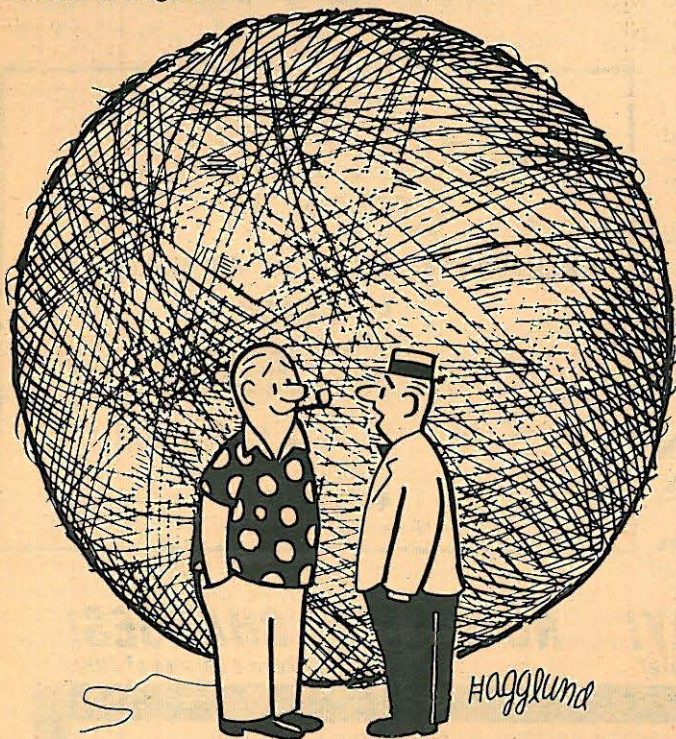

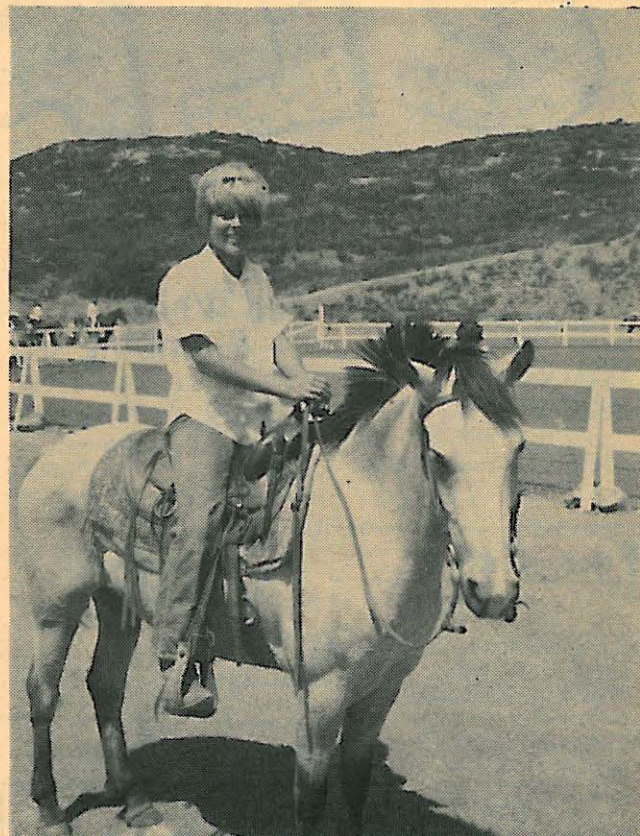

Our best wishes for continued happiness to Mr. and Mrs. R. Wilcox, Sr. in their big beautiful new mobile home.



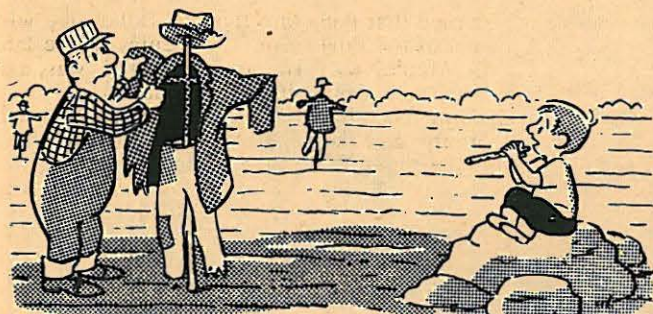

The monthly family dinner will be held Friday evening at 6:30 p.m.

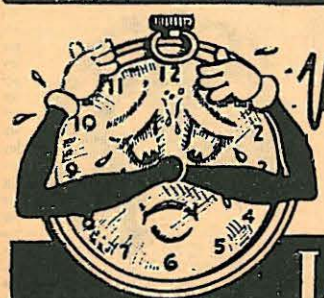

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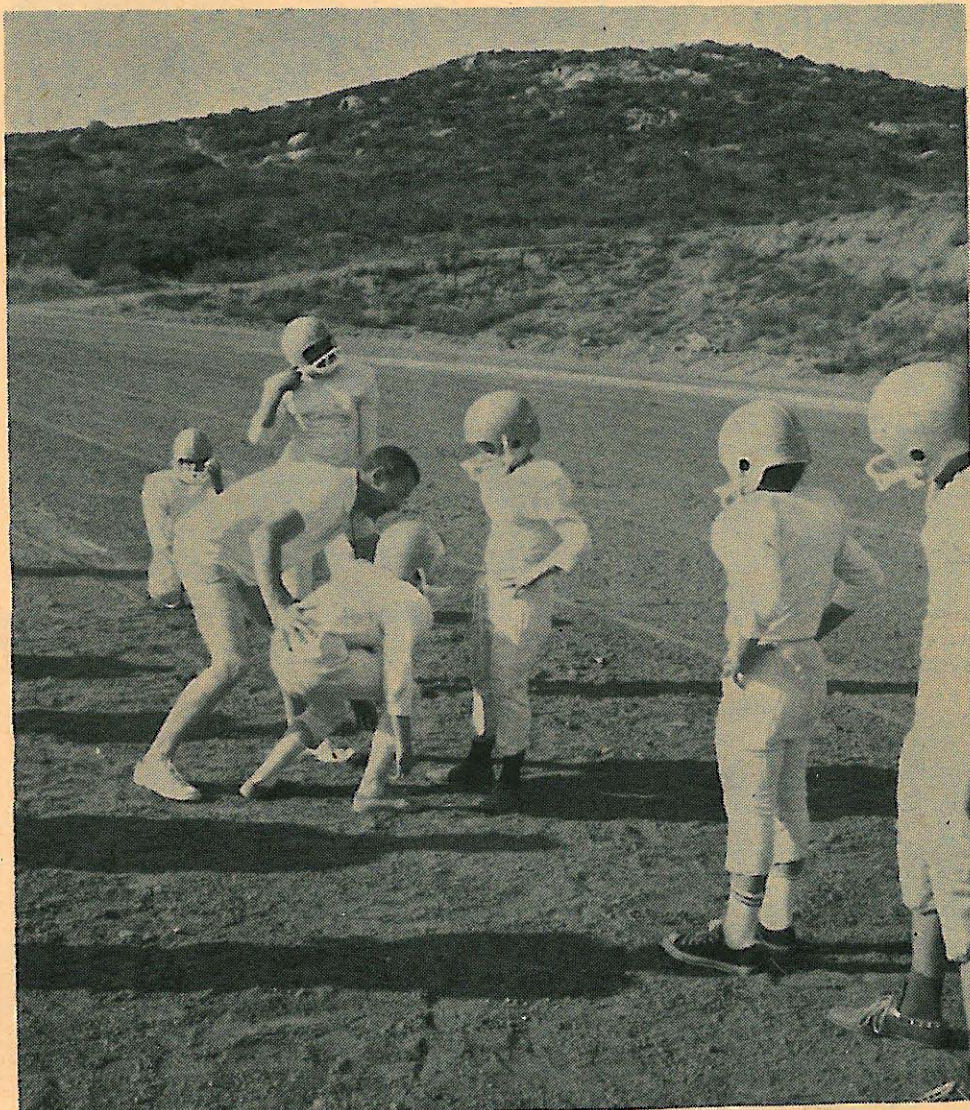

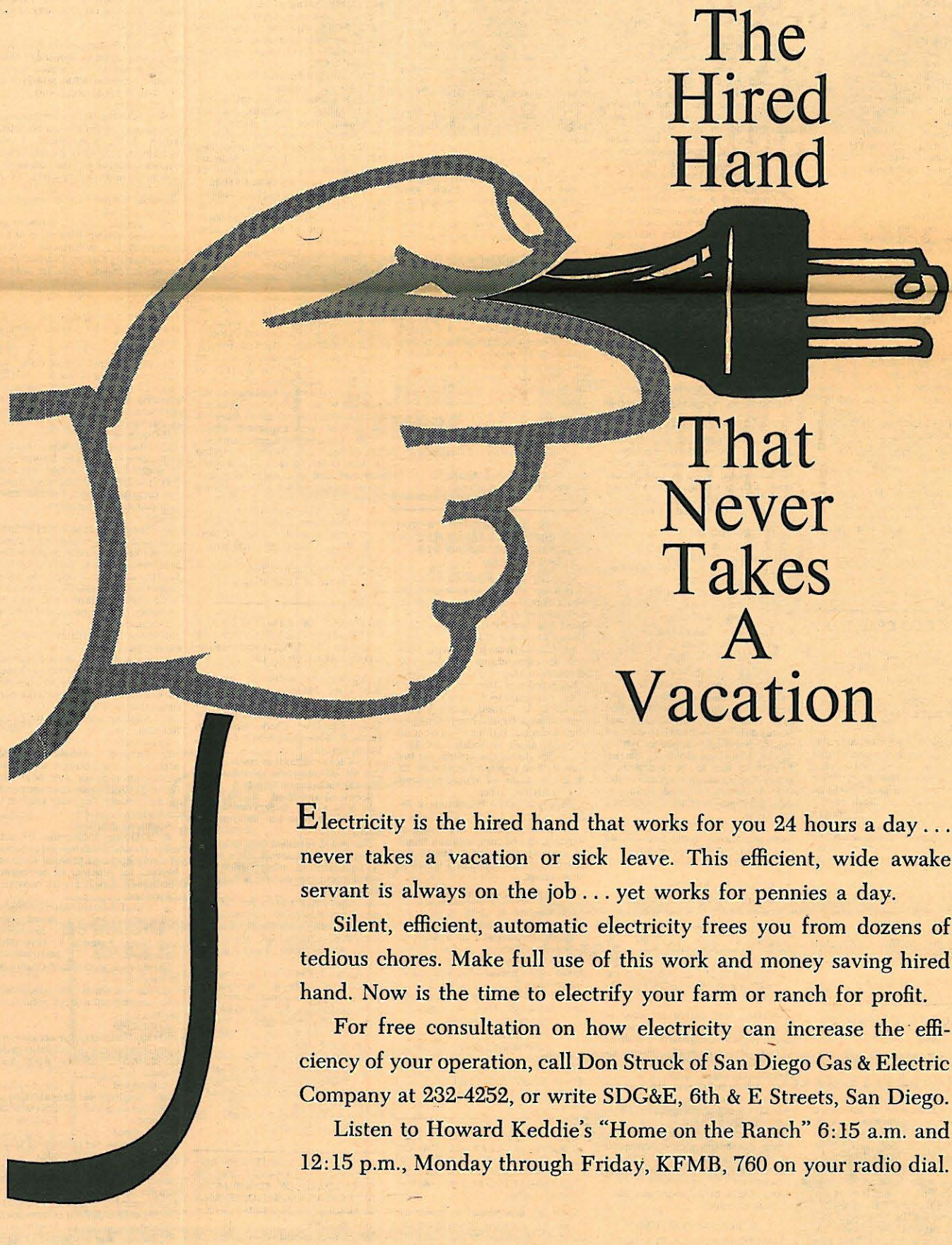
