Services are scheduled for Monday morning at 11 at the Greenwood Memorial Park.

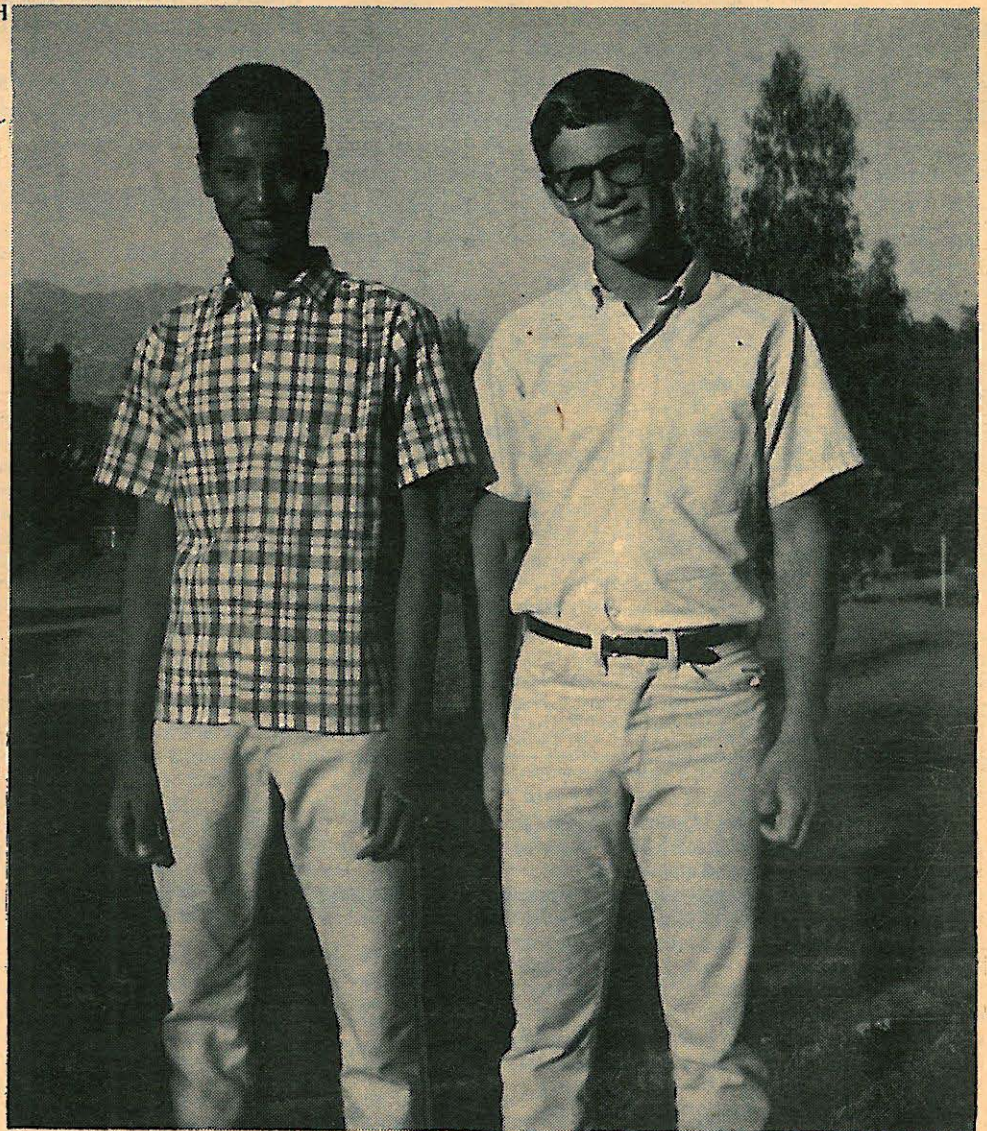
CARL HYDE KILLED

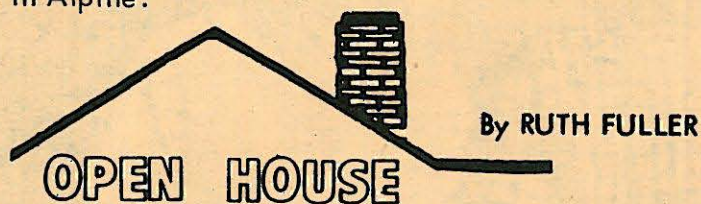

MY MOTHER-IN-LAW CAME by for a cup of coffee and a tour of inspection of our many remodeling projects, including the new centrally located stairway down the middle of the house. She rejected my invitation to go down it, because only the treads are in place and they are pretty far apart. You have to be cautious, but they are usable in an emergency. She approved of our bathtub, which was sunken once but is now back on a more commonly acceptable level. "What made you change your mind?" she asked. "I really never did think a sunken tub was safe." "It was the stairway," I said, "we had to make room for it, and that meant making the bathroom smaller. . . . I was interrupted by a crash, and a series of heart-rending whines, whimpers and cries of panic from little George, our youngest puppy, who had fallen downstairs again and become wedged between the stair treads. Little George is very sweet but a trifle clumsy, and more frightened than hurt, he was easily consoled with a dog biscuit which he proceeded to crumble happily on the sofa under the reproving eye of my mother-in-law.

"I WENT THROUGH much this same process of home building many years ago," she said, settling back comfortably in her favorite rocker, "when we first came to California, from Michigan. We decided to build a house — not just remodel, mind you, but we started from scratch. Robert's father had never built anything before, but he didn't let that stop him. We stayed with my sister and her four children — we had four, also, and the men began work on our new home. Now eight children under one roof can be a problem,

so as soon as it was possible we decided to move into our house, finished or not, and of course it was far from complete. We had part of our roof and part of our floor in, but they didn't match, exactly. It was summer, and we pretended we were camping. The children's beds were set up on the part which was floored, and every day we worked and added on, and things were coming along, but oh, so slowly. The house was on the side of a hill, much like yours, and one night Betty, our youngest, had a really dramatic accident. On the side of the house where her bed was the siding hadn't been installed yet, and somehow the bed got shoved out of place, and sound asleep and undisturbed, she rolled clear down the side of the hill.

Other Editors Think

The Clean Bill Is Dangerous

An anti-obscenity initiative known as CLEAN (California League Enlisting Action Now) is apparently gaining support from church groups throughout the state.

We cannot believe that its newly-gained supporters understand all the implications of the virtuous sounding bill.

Even people who agree with the purposes of the CLEAN campaign should be aware of the proposed legislation's nearly-confiscatory provisions and the provision that law enforcement officers will stand guilty of a law violation if they don't make an arrest and confiscation on the demand of any citizen.

If the initiative attempt is successful, every political jurisdiction in the state will have the power to pass its own laws regarding criminal aspects of sexual activity. California has a highly mobile citizenry. Statewide uniformity is necessary in some areas of criminal law.

One section of the law calls for seizure of all copies of any object which any public officer believes contains obscene material. The measure contains specific language permitting any citizen to impel such an officer to act, under threat of action against the officer.

The provision dealing with seizure states that the taking of evidence must begin the next day to determine whether there is any basis for the material having been seized. It allows any amount of time for taking testimony, and gives the court two days more for ruling as to whether it was proper to seize the material.

A newspaper that printed a story of a sex crime, an illustration in an add or a news column of a woman in a bikini or lingerie might be in danger of falling under provisions of the seizure section. Some reader, any reader, might consider a view of a woman's thighs obscene. (One reader wrote to inform us that pictures of women clad in leotards exercising, illustrating a column, were obscene!)

This one reader could put a newspaper in a position of marketing a daily paper several days, or a week, old.

Before sensible citizens rush out to endorse what they believe is a simple law providing against something truly dangerous, let them examine first the even greater dangers contained in that proposed law.

One of the constitutional rights we treasure most, the freedom of the press, could be jeopardized and made mockery at the whim or will of any egocentric, extremist, neurotic or psychotic group or individual.

From our point of view, CLEAN is a dirty and dangerous campaign.—(From the Nevada City Nugget.)

Pineapple Sandwich Hot Weather Favorite



A generous spoonful of fluffy pineapple dressing tops each of these beautiful open face chicken sandwiches. The salad, meat and bread combination makes this a hearty, refreshing meal. Provide knives and forks and big glasses of lemony iced tea. French or raisin bread are especially good choices for these sandwiches.

Canned pineapple shows up in many refreshing ways in summer menus. Keep a supply of unsweetened pineapple juice chilled for thirst quenching. Pineapple slices, chunks and tidbits are popular to combine with summer fruits for salads and desserts.

- 3/4 cup mayonnaise
- 1/4 cup chili sauce
- 2 tablespoons chopped green onion
- 1/2 cup whipping cream
- 1 (8 3/4-ounce) can pineapple tidbits
- 6 slices French bread
- Butter
- Western iceberg lettuce
- 12 thin firm tomato slices
- 6 large slices cooked chicken or turkey
- 3 sliced hard cooked eggs
- Seasoned salt
- Pepper

Combine mayonnaise, chili sauce and onion. Fold in stiffly beaten cream and drained

pineapple. Toast and butter bread; arrange on individual plates. Top each slice with crisp lettuce, then 2 tomato slices, a chicken slice and 3 or 4 egg slices. Sprinkle lightly with seasoned salt and pepper. Spoon on pineapple dressing. Makes 6 servings.

Step number two of the California Highway Patrol's "safe car" program, inspection of passenger vehicles by a team of officers in specially marked roadside lanes, gets under way today in six locations throughout the State.

Bradford M. Crittenden, Commissioner of the Highway Patrol, said the safety lane operation is starting on a limited scale because "we are trying something new and we want to learn all we can before expanding the operation to other sections of the State."

Six teams, consisting of four traffic officers and one civilian anti-smog device expert, will work out of Patrol zone offices located in Redding, Sacramento, San Francisco, Fresno, Los Angeles and San Diego. Location of the inspection lanes will be changed from time to time, but they will be set up on surface streets rather than freeways.

Special signs will be posted far enough ahead of the safety lane to inform motorists that they may be channeled into the inspection area at the direction of a highway patrolman stationed at the start of the lane.

"We will direct only as many cars into the inspection lane as can be handled without causing the motorist any undue delay," Crittenden said. "The inspection will be conducted on a production line basis with each member of the team responsible for specific things."

A vehicle that passes the inspection will receive a sticker that indicates it is equipped as required by the Vehicle Code and that no defects were found. If defects are found, the driver will be so informed and instructed to have them corrected and then have the car reinspected by a member of the Highway Patrol.

"The sticker is not a guar-

antee that the vehicle will remain in good condition," Crittenden emphasized. "It is still the responsibility of each motorist to be sure that any defects that might arise later are corrected immediately."

The Patrol has been conducting roadside safety inspections since May 1 of all passenger vehicles stopped for an observed traffic law violation. This procedure will continue during the inspection lane testing period.

BOARD MEETS

The Alpine Local Fire District Board meeting was held last week.

In behalf of the Fire Department, Asst. Fire Chief, Jack Blankenship read a proposed agreement providing reciprocal cooperation between the Local Fire District and the U. S. Forest Service. The agreement in general provides for continuing with the same realistic cooperative working arrangements that have existed between the two agencies for the past several years. After careful study of the proposal, the Board authorized its Secretary, Orville Palmer to sign the agreement when certain corrections were made.

In order to hold the District tax structure as near as possible to the 1965-1966 figure the Board approved an amendment to its adopted 1966-1967 Budget along lines recommended by the San Diego County Auditor and Controller.

On recommendation of Fire Chief Malcolm Huey, Jr., the Board authorized purchase of five additional Plectron Radio Receivers. This now equips the Volunteer Firemen with a total of eighteen, deemed sufficient for its present man power.

When it came to paying bills presented, the Board decided not to pay, at this time, one submitted by Cochran-Moore-Winchell Co. for \$305 for certain insurance on the new LaFrance Fire Truck, but instead request that agency's representative to attend the Fire District's September Board meeting to explain the bill.

ALPINE - Many who enjoy the "Home on the Ranch" program, were surprised and very pleased to hear one of our own residents discussed this week.

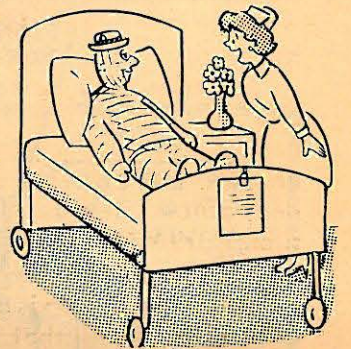
Howard Keddy had interviewed Al Adams on his turkey ranch and the noon program carried a report of this interview.

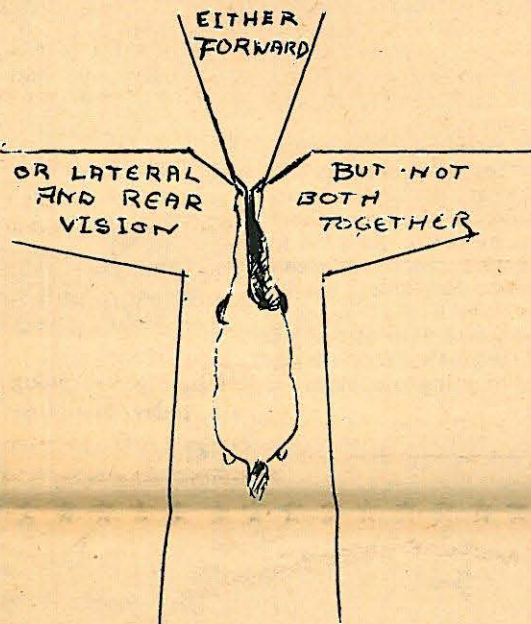

Medicare Further Explained

Every month, 120,000 Americans reach the age of 65. The soon-to-be-65's are asking these days, "When is the best time for me to sign up for medicare?"

The answer, according to Arlyn B. Carr, Social Security District Manager in San Diego, is that they should sign up two or three months before they reach 65.

If they wait until the month they reach 65 or the following 3 months, their hospital insurance protection under medicare may begin right away, but their coverage under the voluntary doctor bill insurance cannot start until one to three months after they sign up.

Carr explained that the medicare law provides a seven-month initial enrollment period for the voluntary doctor bill insurance part of the program. This period begins with the third month before the person is 65, includes the month in which he reaches 65, and ends with the third month thereafter.

"The best time to enroll," Carr said, "is in one of the three months before you reach 65. If you do so, your protection can start with the month of your 65th birthday. Waiting until that month to sign up will mean the coverage can't start until the following month. And enrollment in one of three months after the month you are 65 can mean a delay of up to three months in the start of your protection."

He further explained that failure to sign up during the seven-month initial enrollment period may mean that the individual will have to wait until the next general enrollment period. This is always the last three months

of odd-numbered years. But even then the older person will have to wait until the following July for the protection to start, and premium payments will be 10 per cent higher.

"This matter of a delayed start in protection could be serious if the individual had high medical expenses meanwhile," he pointed out. The voluntary medical insurance part of medicare covers doctor bills for home, office, and hospital visits, surgeons' fees, and a wide variety of other medical expenses in and out of the hospital.

Hospital insurance coverage begins with the month a person reaches 65, providing he applies to establish his eligibility no later than 12 months following that month, Carr said. Like social security cash benefits, hospital insurance payments may be retroactive for up to 12 months. There is no such retroactive payment under the medical insurance part of medicare, Carr said.

Carr reminded those people who work during daytime hours that the office will be open until 9 p. m. on Wednesdays and from 8:30 a. m. to 4:30 p. m. other weekdays, except Saturday.

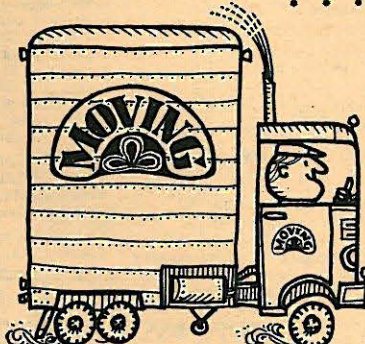
