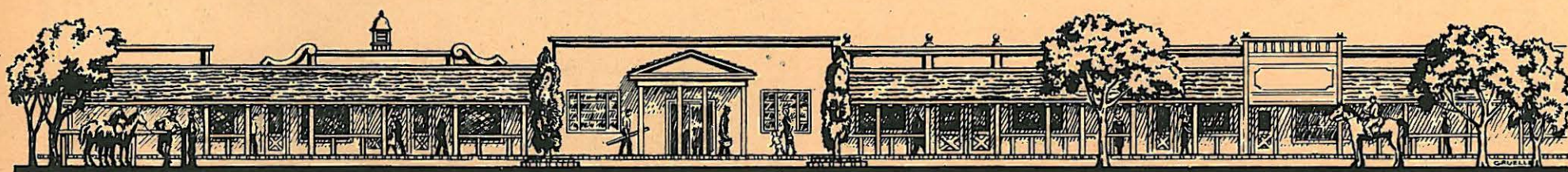

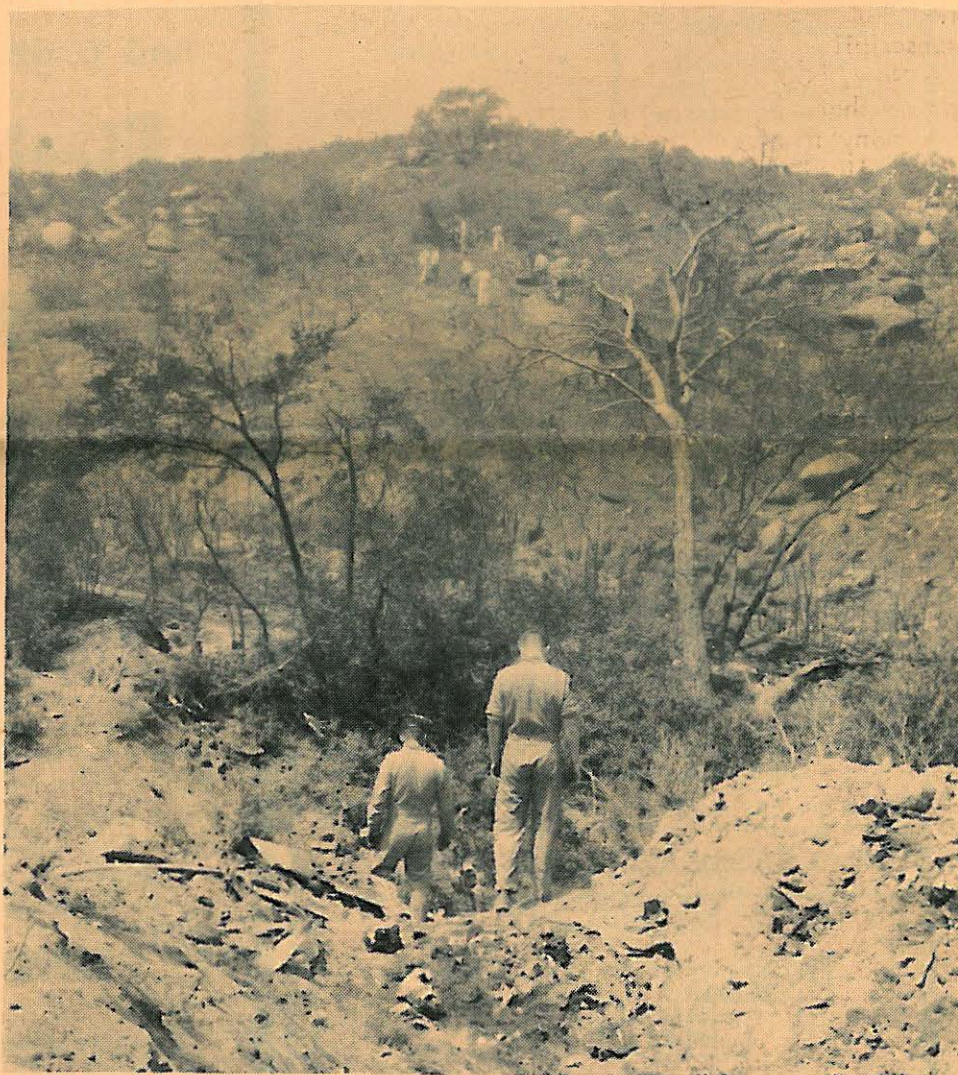
August 5th is the official West Coast Premiere of "The Sisters" and the first time that Loring's highly acclaimed ballet will have been danced to live orchestration.

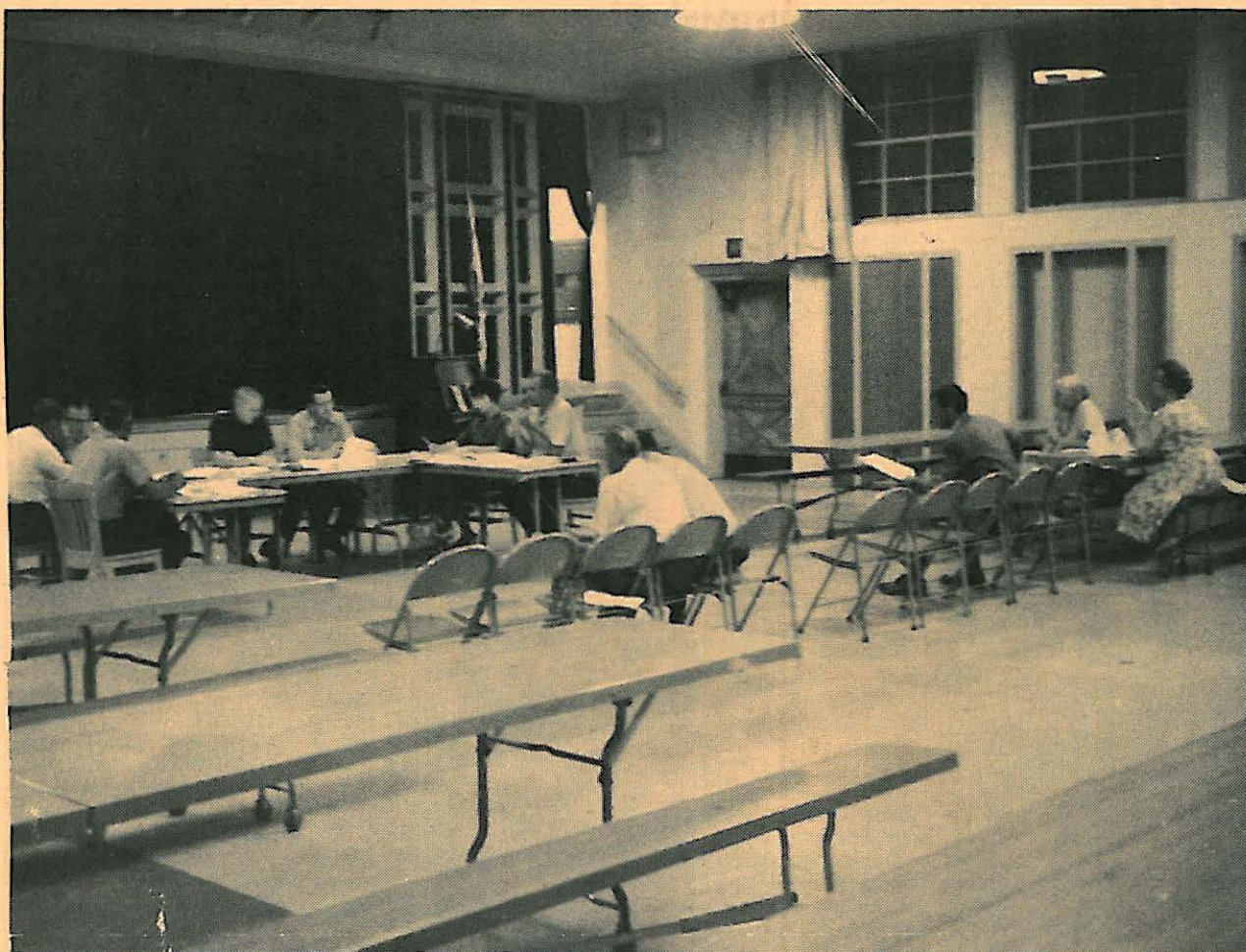

# Fictitious Firm Name

BEEN LEGALLY REGISTERED?

The requirements of Section 2466 of the Civil Code, says "Every person and every partnership transacting business—under a fictitious firm name—must file a certificate stating the names in full and the place of residence of such person and the member or members of such partnership—such certificate must be published, once a week for four consecutive weeks."

If you have neglected this procedure, do you realize that the name of your firm is not protected and that you are not entitled to maintain suits for collection, or for other purposes, in the courts of the State of California?

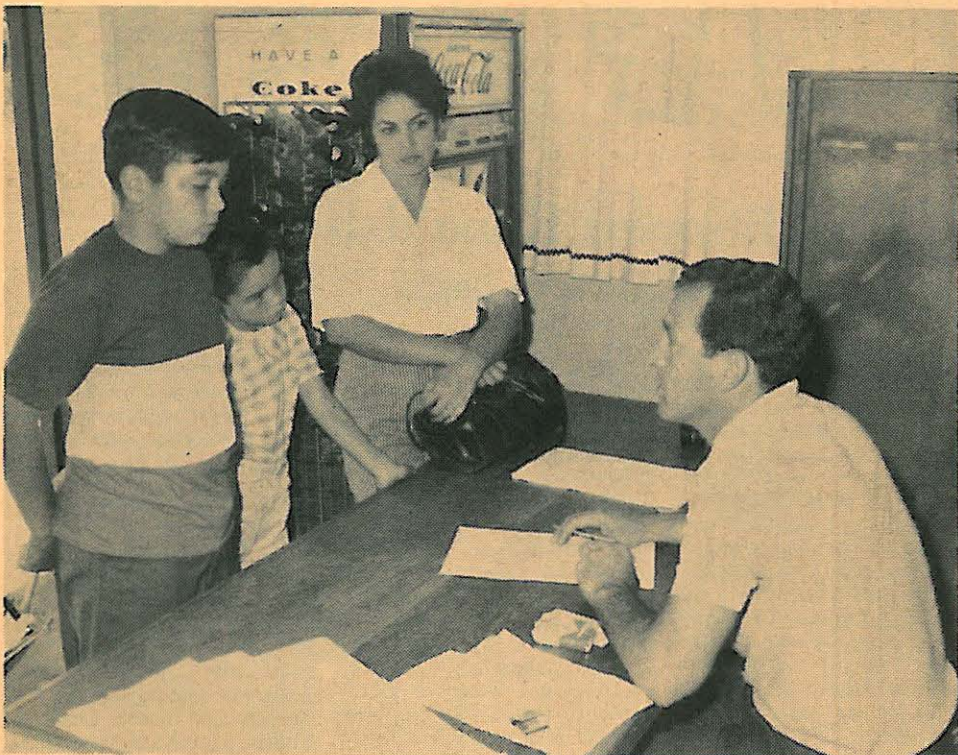

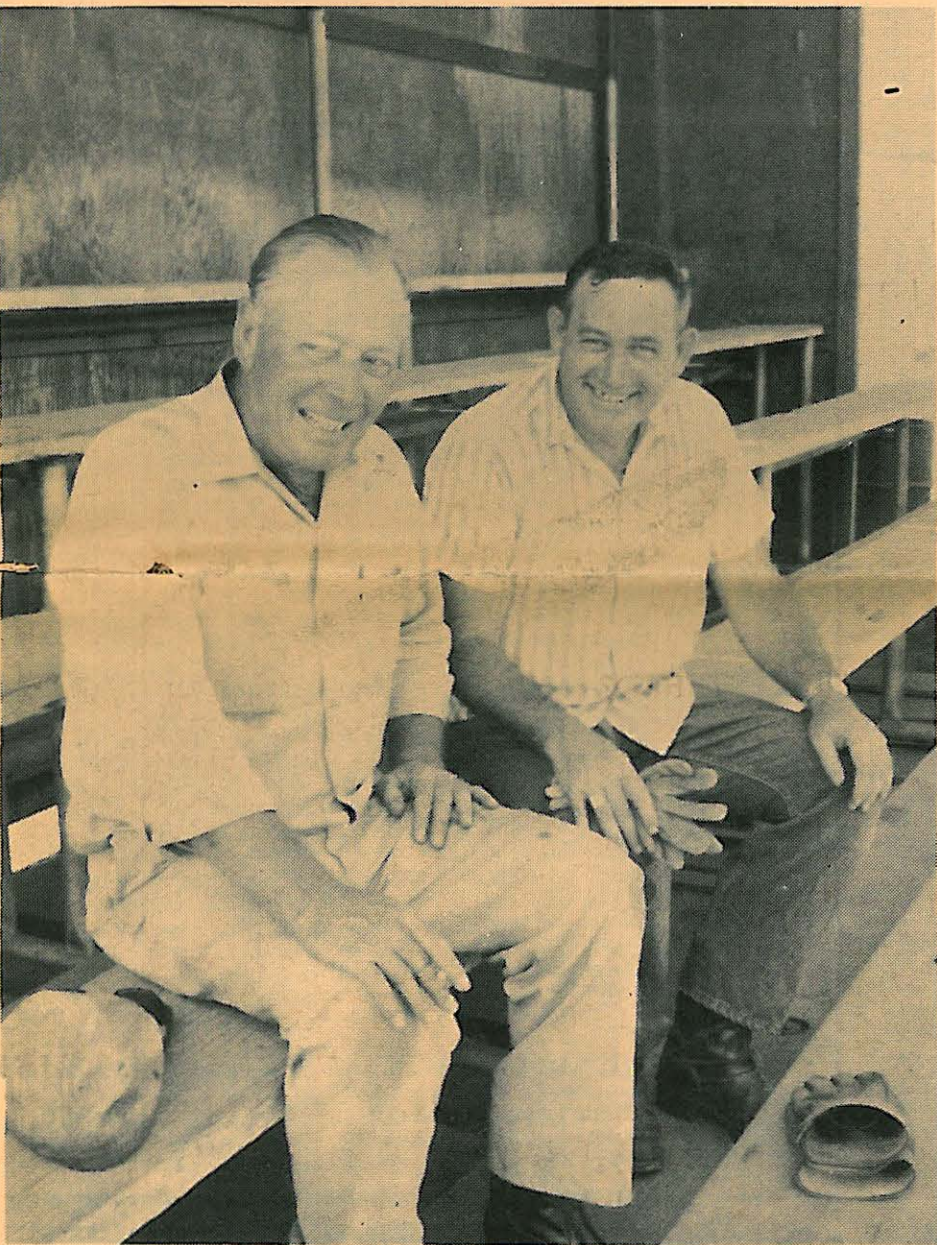

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I recently auditioned Ronald Reagan for the role of governor.

The location was a soundstage in Hollywood, where television cameras recorded the event for Reporter-at-Large, a Thursday-night series I produce for Channel Nine, the Los Angeles station of RKO-General.

I began the audition by reminding Mr. Reagan that he had migrated to Hollywood in 1937 as a radio announcer and that he had been required to serve an apprenticeship in "B" pictures before he was awarded even small roles in major films. Later, in the same spirit of gradual maturation, he had been assigned the second lead in the Errol Flynn movie, Santa Fe Trail, before he became a full-fledged star as the playboy King's Row. Now that he had decided on a new career, in government, I asked what made him feel he was instantly ready for the number-one role in the number-one state. Mr. Reagan replied:

"The time has come for ordinary citizens to bring some commonsense solutions to the problems of California!"

Mr. Reagan also noted that Dwight Eisenhower had run for President without previously having served in election office. I asked if there were anything in Mr. Reagan's background to compare with General Eisenhower's experience as Supreme Commander of Allied Forces in Europe during World War Two and during the post-war organization of the Atlantic alliance.

"Fortunately, I don't have to compare to that administrative experience, because I'm not seeking the Presidency."

In that case, would Mr. Reagan please compare his administrative experience with that of Pat Brown, who originally ran for governor only after the public had had a chance to appraise him for seven years as San Francisco's District Attorney and eight years as California's Attorney-General.

"Maybe Pat Brown is so far removed from the thinking of the rank-and-file people because he's never done anything but work for government!"

Mr. Reagan became so enthusiastic about this line of reasoning that he went on to declare — now without using the word "maybe" — that Governor Brown's experience in government was actually the cause of California's increasing crime and taxation. I remained silent, waiting for a reply to my question.

"I am not suggesting that anything I did on the screen qualifies me to be governor. But I am suggesting that I've had experience that — if I didn't have it — if I didn't have this understanding it has given me — I wouldn't have — certainly — the nerve to — to do what I'm doing!"

I continued to remain silent, still hoping Mr. Reagan would respond to my question. Finally, my patience was rewarded.

"As for my qualifications: I'm relying for the most part on more than twenty years as an officer, board member and six times president of a nation union, the Screen Actor's Guild. I sat across the table from the men who run the motion-picture business! And this is big business!"

I pointed out that California was a somewhat bigger business, with a gross income exceeded only by England, France, West Germany, the Soviet Union and the United States of America.

"Yes, and California's present governor is too involved in California's business! I intend to reverse that policy!"

One had to admit that Reagan's lack of government experience seemed to qualify him for the role of an un-governor. But I called his attention to the fact that even America's leading advocate of un-government, businessman Barry Goldwater, had practiced his philosophy on the Phoenix City Council before offering to represent his state in the U. S. Senate.

"Senator Goldwater didn't take one job as a stepping-stone to the other. Nor have I set out to have a political career. Nor did I ever intend to!"

I wasn't quite sure how that answer was responsive, but the answer did raise another interesting question. If Mr. Reagan had no desire for a political career — a position he also had stated very emphatically in his recent autobiography — why had he entered this race?

"After the last election, I suddenly felt a need for everyone to do everything they could to contribute to restoring the balance of power between the two parties."

I reminded Mr. Reagan that

other actors had felt a similar obligation to the two-party system, but they had proceeded somewhat less impetuously. Republican George Murphy served a quarter-century apprenticeship within the GOP, rising to State Chairman in the mid-fifties, before he sought his party's nomination for the Senate. By contrast, Mr. Reagan had not registered as a Republican until 1962. In a more recent example, Republican Wendell Corey sought nomination as a congressman only after serving on the Santa Monica City Council. Even more modestly was manifested by Robert Ryan, a Democrat, who recently rejected suggestions that he run for the Senate on the ground that it would be unethical for him to exploit his Hollywood fame to win elective office. Mr. Reagan's reaction to these cases was almost emotional.

"Are actors forever forbidden to compete in politics?"

I assured him that a movie star has the same rights as the next person. But I suggested that a film celebrity is faced with a special problem about demonstrating his sincerity when he enters the stage of politics. I reminded Mr. Reagan that he had noted in his autobiography that "much of our profession is taken up with pretending," and that "there is something about this crazy picture business that makes all of us develop a chameleon quality."

I observed that such admissions cannot help but stir doubts about the philosophic commitment of stars who become candidates, especially when the star has eloquently campaigned for both Barry Goldwater and Harry Truman. In response to those observations Mr. Reagan replied:

"Since there seems to be so much concern about my sincerity, let me ask a question. What do you think would make me do what I'm doing if I'm not sincere?"

I did not attempt to reply, trusting that the ordinary citizen watching my show would arrive at the correct answer by applying some common sense.

## ILLNESS COSTS

SAN DIEGO — Between July, 1964 and June, 1965 acute respiratory conditions cost Americans more than 658 million days in bed, Mark W. Kerby, Alpine area chairman of the Tuberculosis & Health Assn. of San Diego County, reported yesterday.

He said his report was based on a newly published statistical report of the National Tuberculosis Association, parent of nearly 2,000 voluntary Christmas Seal agencies in the U.S.

Acute respiratory conditions cost nearly 100 million children more than 189 million school days, and more than 100 million wage, salary, and fee earners lost more than 240 million work days.

Emphysema, a condition that makes breathing extremely difficult, increased by 105.4 percent between 1961 and 1965. In 1965 there were 267,000 cases of emphysema. Bronchitis, with emphysema rose to 121,000, a 98.4 percent increase, and chronic bronchitis rose by 80.7 percent to 421,000 cases.

In 1963, emphysema ranked as the second most frequent diagnosis and tuberculosis the fifth. Cost of disability benefits for emphysema are estimated at \$80 million yearly, \$60 million to beneficiaries and \$20 million to dependents.

Between 1959 and 1964 deaths caused by emphysema rose by 104.4 percent; chronic bronchitis, 90 percent; lung cancer, 31.5 percent; chronic interstitial pneumonia, 16.3 percent; and other types of pneumonia (except of newborn), 10.7 percent.

In the same period deaths caused by tuberculosis of all kinds dropped by 27.5 percent and by asthma by 10.9 percent.

How can these costs be reduced?

"By seeing your physician at the first sign of respiratory trouble," Kerby said.
