Nature Walk Enjoyed

Books, magazines, exhibits by local artists are all in the Alpine Branch of the San Diego County Library. But also, there are unexpected opportunities. For instance, if it hadn't been for the five Smokey Bear Summer Reading Club winners, 10 other children and four mothers plus your librarian would not have had a unique nature walk last Saturday afternoon.

The nature walk took place at the Silverwood Sanctuary of the San Diego Audubon Society located in Wildcat Canyon six miles from Lakeside. The group was led by Frank Gander, resident naturalist at the Sanctuary — 83 acres of wooded, rocky land.

Mr. Gander is a distinguished naturalist of wide experience, in our National and State parks as well as in the San Diego area. Formally he was animal caretaker at the San

Diego Zoo, director of educational activities at the San Diego Natural History Museum, Supervisor of nature study in San Diego rural schools, as well as being owner of the Lakeside Nursery, and creator of Kissing Rocks Gardens near Escondido.

Mr. Gander expressed appreciation for the attention which the children paid to his talk about the 50 different plants, rocks, animals, trees and birds seen on the walk. We, of Alpine, are grateful to Mr. Gander for extending our horizons! We could not have had a more knowledgeable or delightful guide. Mr. Gander said that the Sanctuary is not yet open to the public but small groups which would like an acquaintance with local wildlife may contact him at Silverwood, 13003 Wildcat Canyon Road, Lakeside, — telephone 443-2998.

Dr. Howard Ball Passes

Dr. Howard Ball, who was a resident of Alpine from 1937 until about 1960, died last week following a heart attack.

Dr. and Mrs. Ball came to Alpine and lived on El Rancho Metate where their son, John was born, just two weeks after they moved here.

When Dr. Ball was a resident here, he was keenly interested in community affairs. He was president of the Alpine School Board for several terms and he was always interested in seeing that teachers were paid what was a reasonable salary. He felt that the profession, as a whole, was underpaid.

Dr. Ball was a distinguished

pathologist, and received an American Cancer Society research grant in 1955 for a project involving surgery on rats and the curbing of tumorous growths. In 1956 he received a second grant from the state branch of the American Cancer Society for research in cancer control.

He was a native of Vermont and came to San Diego in 1931.

Survivors include his widow, Elizabeth; three sons, Newton, Franklin and John; two daughters, Mrs. Olive Woodridge of Alpine and Mrs. Mary De Jone. He is also survived by his mother, Mrs. Mary Ball of Santee.

STILL ROOM

"Grossmont College is still accepting applications for admission even though some county junior colleges are turning students away," announced Harold G. Hughes, College President. "We are glad we can still offer classes and intend to extend enrollment opportunities as long as space can be found for one student in one more class," he added.

The College, built for 2,500 day students, should well exceed the 3,300 jammed in for the fall semester last year. Through careful scheduling of facilities and personnel, as many as 3,700 could be accommodated.

Interested students who have taken placement tests must apply at the College Admissions Office prior to the close of registration September 1 in order to complete clearance for the opening of classes September 12. In selected courses, enrollment can be completed without the necessity for the placement tests. Transcripts of previous high school and college work must, in every case, be filed prior to completion of admission.

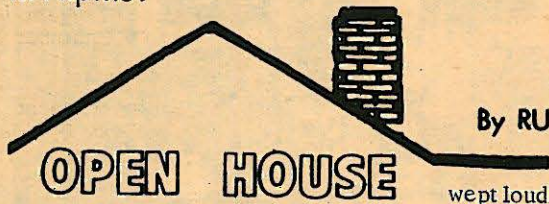

Mr. and Mrs. Hugh Trail have had a few guests in recent weeks. First their daughter and son-in-law, Mr. and

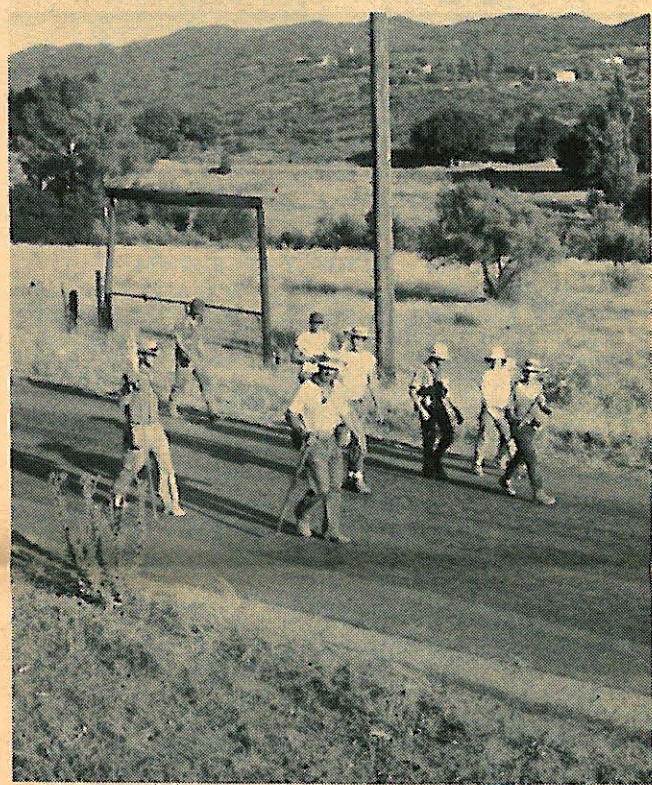

THE BOYS COME MARCHING HOME — WITH BLISTERS ON THEIR FEET?

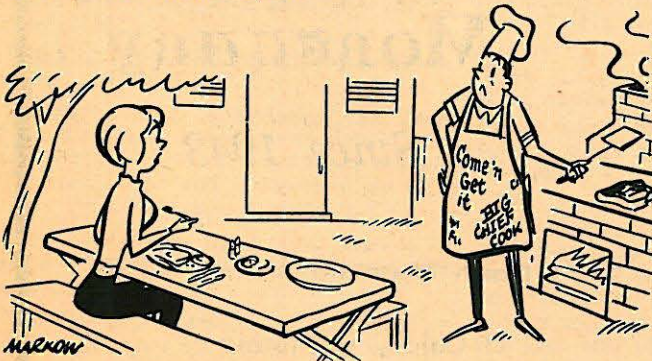

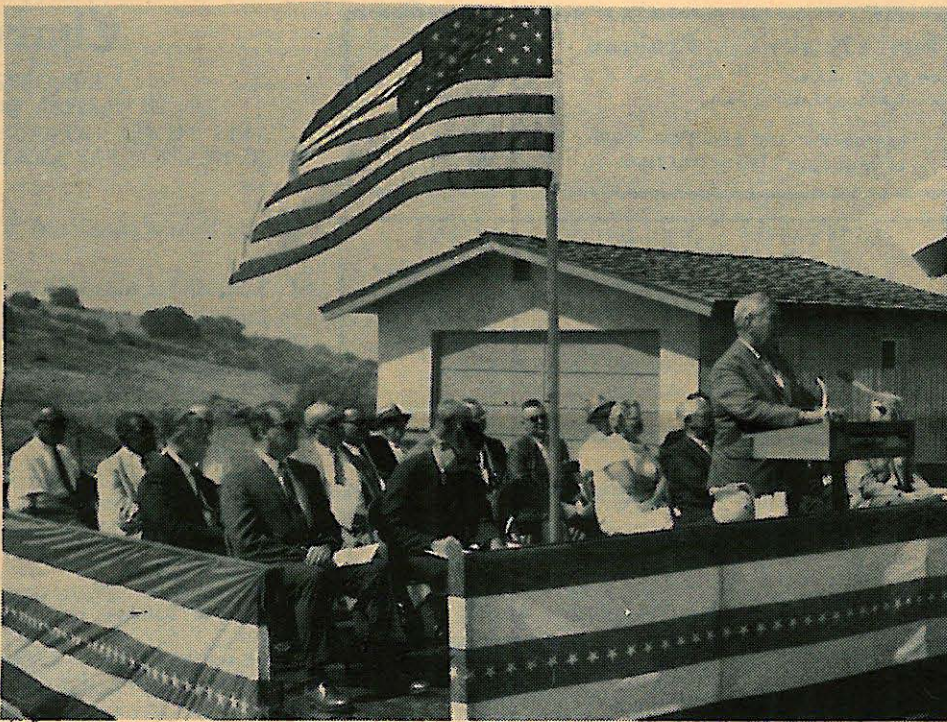

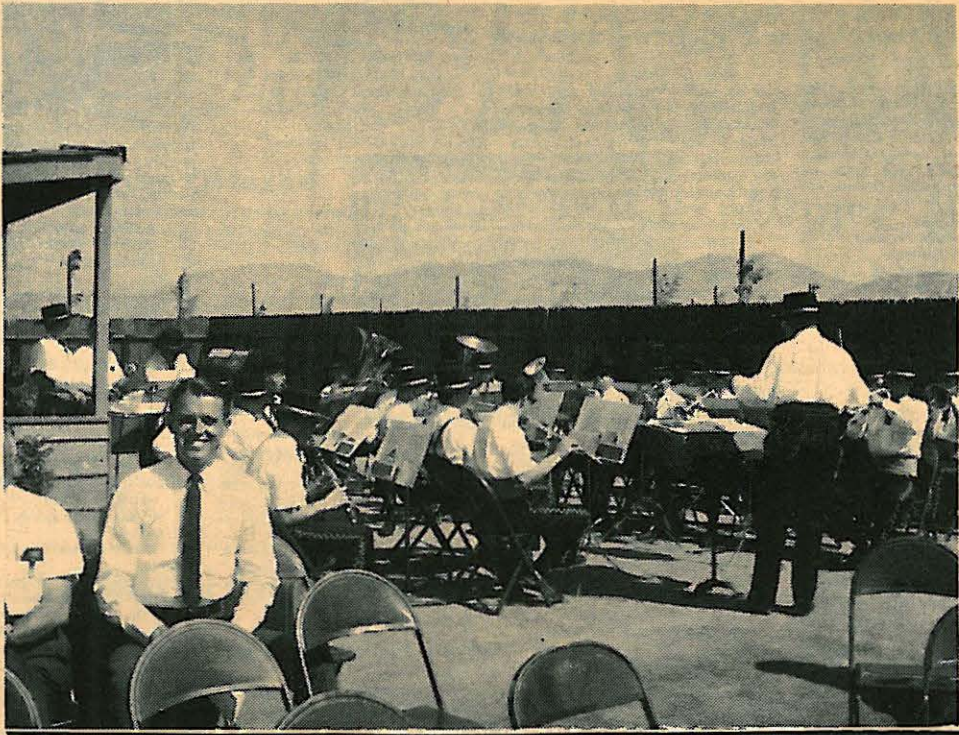
