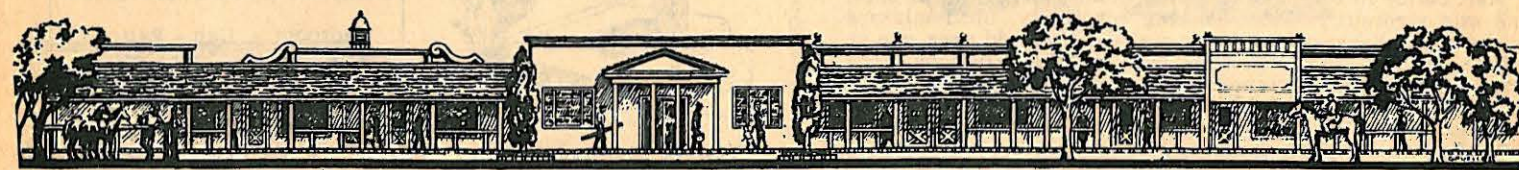

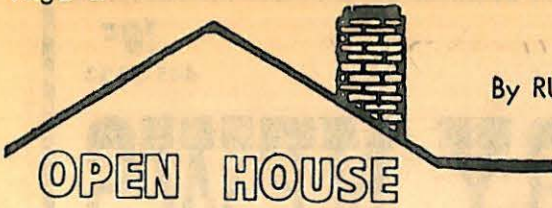

| 1 4 ounce package | 1 No. 2 can Cherry Pie |
| vanilla pudding mix | Filling |

Melt butter in boiling water. Add flour and salt, all at once, and stir vigorously. Cook, stirring constantly, until mixture forms a ball. Remove from heat; cool slightly. Add eggs, one at a time, beating vigorously after each addition. Drop by large tablespoonsful onto a greased cookie sheet. Bake in a hot oven (400°) 45 to 50 minutes. Split puffs and allow to cool. Make pudding as directed on package, using only 1-1/2 cups of milk. Cool. Fold in whipped cream and flavoring. Spoon into puffs. Spoon Cherry Pie Filling over puffs and serve at once. Makes 8 large puffs.

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Responsible students at Berkeley

From a talk by Prof. Garff B. Wilson, University of California, Berkeley

The student on the Berkeley campus has been defamed and caricatured. The representative student is not a beatnik or a weirdie or a rebel. He is a clean-cut, serious, intelligent, idealistic student deeply involved in his studies, proud of his university, and keenly aware of his responsibilities as a citizen. News media seldom give the representative student any notice. Newspapers, TV, and radio record what is bizarre and sensational. For example:

You are aware that in December, 1964, 773 people were arrested in Sproul Hall sit-in. Do you know that in that same semester 3,540 undergrads made the honor roll with B average or better? A year later the percentage was raised one point--to 22 percent.

You read that hundreds of dollars were raised in December, 1964, to bail out sit-in students. Do you know that in the same semester \$9,602 were raised by students for Cal Camp for underprivileged children, staffed by 50 volunteer students?

You read that last year four students were suspended for participation in so-called "dirty word" demonstration. Do you know that in the same year, 262 students spent 20,000 hours in Resource Volunteer Program tutoring students in Berkeley public schools?

You read that this year three or four students were disciplined for defying campus rules. Do you know that 10 times that number cleaned off 200 cubic feet of refuse from a Berkeley hillside, removed 200 old tires from Albany mud flat, and cleaned up the east side of Aquatic Park? This was volunteer work.

You read that this year mobs, including some students, have marched in parades protesting Vietnam war. Did you know that there are now serving (or have recently served) overseas in Peace Corps 560 Cal students, far more than from any other campus in the nation--and do you know that this spring more than 1,000 additional Cal students applied to serve?

You read that Vietnam Day Committee held a "rowdy" dance in the campus gym. Do you know that last year 205 students joined VISTA (Volunteers in Service to America), and many more are in process of joining?

You read that last March about 800 students walked out of the Greek Theater to protest appearance of Ambassador Arthur Goldberg, but are you aware that 12,000 remained to give him more standing ovations than any Charter Day speaker has had.

You have read that frats hold beer busts, break windows, and swipe street signs. Do you know that for more than 30 years the

frats at Cal have financed a Big Brother Program in Berkeley to help rehabilitate delinquent boys? Do you know that last term, all-frat scholastic average was 2.61 compared to an all-living group average of 2.55?

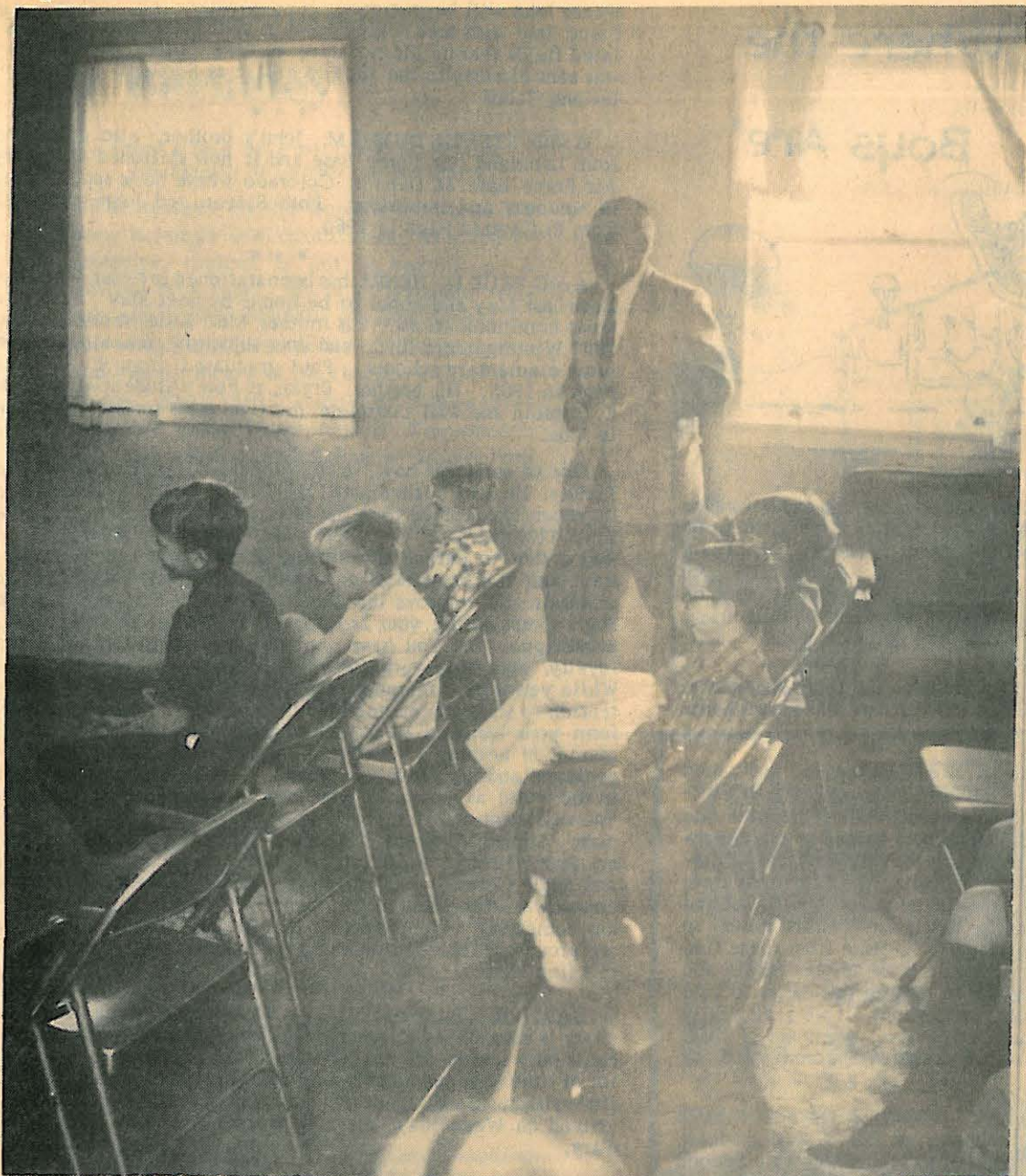

Money still talks, but unless you have lots of it today, it says—nothing doing.

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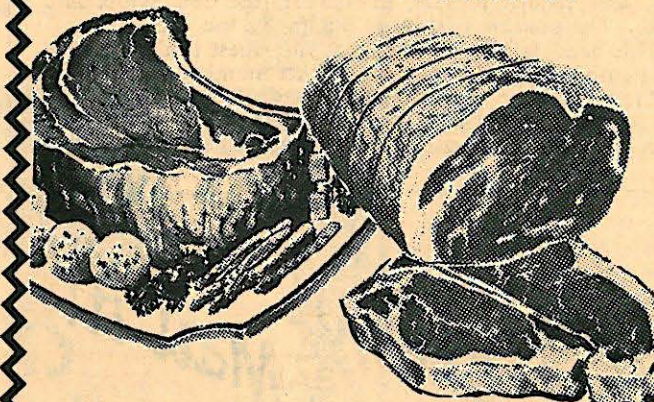

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WHAT'S DOING?

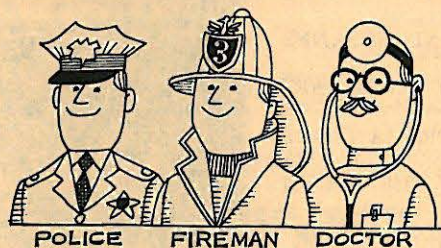

HEARS FLUORIDATION DISCUSSED

Dr. Norman Sperber, D.D.S., spoke at the last meeting of the Alpine Chamber of Commerce in favor of the long-debated and much-feared, fluoridation of water supplies.

Dr. Sperber pointed out that those who are in favor of this means of preventing decaying in teeth, are not adding anything to water that is not already there in some amounts. Fluorides are in most water supplies to some degree. Actually in some areas, there is far too much fluoride and here it should be taken out of the water, rather than added to the water.

When asked why so many people seem to fear and misunderstand fluoridation, Dr. Sperber reminded the audience of the fear that usually accompanies any new discovery. He pointed to the Salk vaccine as an example, among many others.

In considering religious considerations, Dr. Sperber pointed out that the element is not a medication, merely a control of natural elements which are part of a normal water supply.

He explained that there is a great deal of emotional opposition where people feel that there is "intrusion on personal liberty."

In commenting on the often-heard objection that fluoride is a poison, he likened it to many other elements which are useful but also in large quantities, would be dangerous. He stated that in order to become the least bit ill, two bathtubs full of fluoridated water must be drunk at one sitting. In order to commit suicide, 50 bathtubs full of water would have to be consumed at one sitting.

Dr. Sperber gave many examples of the helpful benefits of fluoridated water which have been documented.

At the close of the session, it was suggested that the opponents of fluoridation be given a chance to bring their side of the questions to the people in Alpine. This will be done at a later date this year.

C of C Report

At the quarterly meeting of the Alpine Chamber of Commerce, the dates of the Alpine Viejas Days Horse Show were once again announced as May 6 to 7. The committee, under the chairmanship of Paul Nichols, is meeting regularly and accomplishing much. They hope to have everything lined up before long to make this the best show that Alpine has had.

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RABIES CONTROL — YOUR QUESTIONS ANSWERED

(A Public Service)

Since the extended rabies quarantine became effective throughout San Diego County on New Year's Day, the San Diego Department of Public Health has reported a flood of questions from dog owners.

Dr. J. B. Askew, director of public health, said yesterday that many of the questions are related to vaccine and vaccination requirements. He gave the following answers to questions the health department has received:

Do dogs have to be revaccinated if they were originally vaccinated out of the state?

Yes, unless the owner can show proof that the dog has been vaccinated since Oct. 1, 1965, with the two-year vaccine.

Is it all right if you give a dog a rabies shot while she is nursing puppies?

Yes.

Why does the law specify that dogs over four months of age must be vaccinated against rabies -- because they cannot contract the disease until this age?

No. Even puppies can be infected with the disease and become rabid. The law sets four months as the age to start vaccinations, because younger dogs are not fully enough developed to build immunity from a vaccination. Puppies under four months of age must be restricted at all times so they cannot run loose.

Why is it that cats in the San Diego area are not required to have licenses and vaccinations?

Because cats seldom transmit rabies. If a rabid dog chases a cat, the cat either escapes the dog completely or, if caught, is usually destroyed by the dog.

Why can't dog owners, particularly owners of a number of dogs, give their own rabies vaccinations instead of having to transport the dogs to a veterinarian?

As legal proof that a dog has been vaccinated the law requires a certificate of vaccination

signed by a veterinarian who has been registered to practice veterinary medicine in the State of California. Veterinarians know how to vaccinate dogs effectively. Most dog owners do not. Enforcement of a rabies control program in which dog owners vaccinate their own dogs would be cumbersome and probably impossible.

If a dog has been vaccinated, is he safe from rabies when used to hunt?

He is probably safe from rabies, but it must be remembered that no vaccine is 100 percent effective. Rabies vaccine is believed to be about 99 percent effective. Your dog could be the one in 100 that is not protected by vaccination. In any case, your dog should not be used to hunt in San Diego County now unless it is on a leash. Under the extended rabies quarantine, no dog may run loose in any part of the county at any time.

When and where can dogs be inoculated against rabies?

Dogs may be vaccinated against rabies by any private veterinarian throughout the year. The San Diego Department of Public Health sponsors public nonprofit dog vaccination clinics in the City of San Diego each December through the cooperation of the San Diego County Veterinary Medical Association. The clinics were held last month on Dec. 5, 6 and 7. Information on vaccination clinics in other parts of the county may be obtained from the San Diego County Livestock Department.

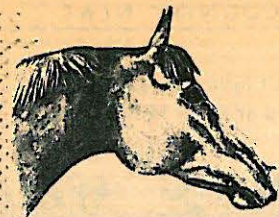

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Clinics Set

Thirty-three locations throughout San Diego City and County have been selected for public measles vaccination clinics to be held from noon to 4 p.m. on Saturday and Sunday, February 25 and 26.

Boys and girls, ages one through nine, who have not had measles or who have never been immunized against measles, will be vaccinated at the measles clinics.

"Many persons are still under the impression that measles is a harmless disease of childhood," said Dr. Lawrence E. Reck, of the San Diego County Medical Society. "This is far from the truth. Measles can be very serious. Almost one out of every six children who have measles suffer some type of complication such as pneumonia, ear infections, deafness, encephalitis and mental retardation."

Parents should bring their children who are from one through nine years of age and who are not protected against measles, to the clinics for vaccination. Parents will be requested to donate a dollar, or whatever they can afford, to help meet part of the cost of the vaccine. However, no child will be refused because of inability to pay.

On Sunday, February 26, clinics will be open from noon to 4 p.m. at schools in many county areas.

Senator Clair W. Burgener has announced his appointments to the State Republican Central Committee for the 1967-68 term.

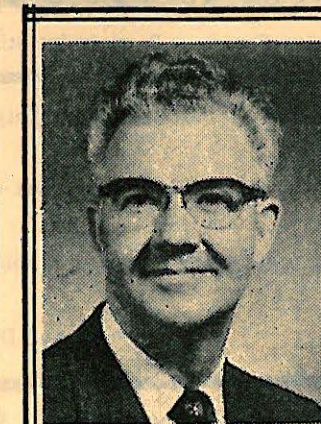
