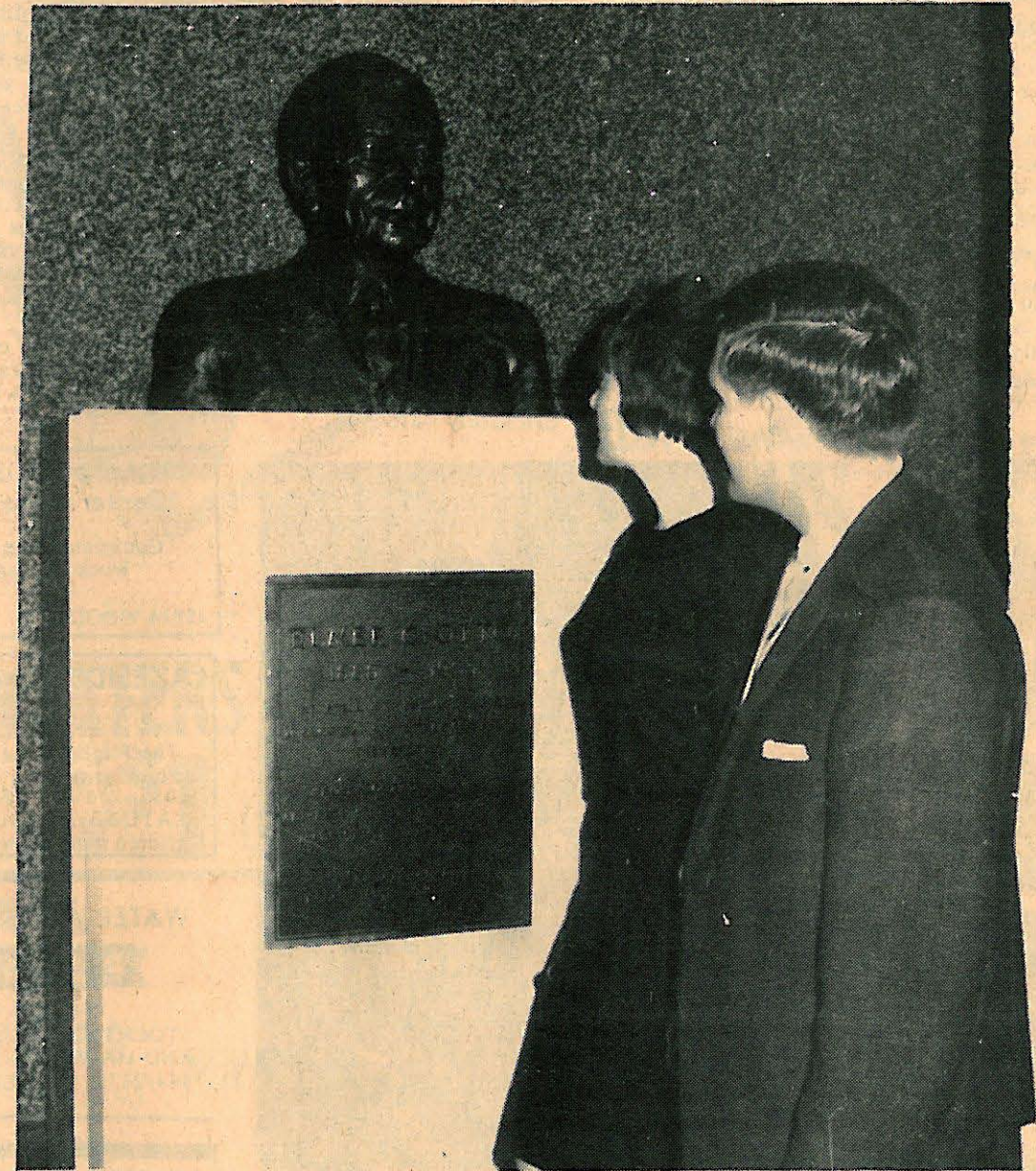

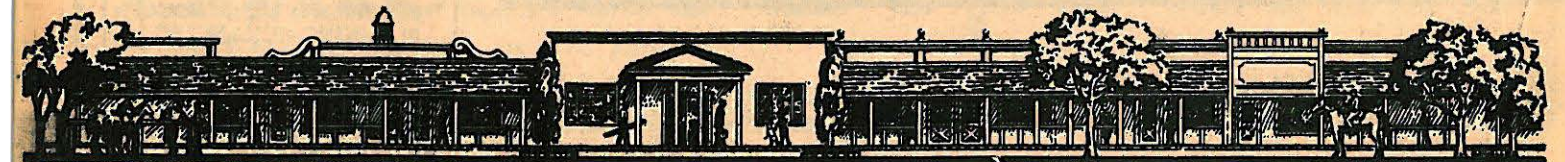

### TB STILL AHEAD

Tuberculosis is still the leading  
killer among contagious diseases  
in California, Mark W. Kerby,  
Alpine area chairman of the  
Tuberculosis & Health Assn. of  
San Diego County, said yester-  
day.

Citing a report recently by  
Dr. Lester Breslow, state direc-  
tor of public health, he said TB  
took the lives of 1,178 Califor-  
nians in 1965. Syphilis, second  
deadliest communicable disease,  
accounted for 231 deaths.

The 4,908 new, active cases  
of TB reported to state health  
officials in 1965 compare favor-  
able with 5,328 reported in 1964,  
"but the rate of decrease is not  
as rapid as we hoped it would  
be," Kerby said.

The number of cases in TB  
"pockets" still remain alarm-  
ingly high, with Los Angeles  
leading the state with 1,525 new  
cases in 1965. San Francisco  
reported 531; Alameda, 235;  
San Diego, 223; Fresno, 236;  
and Sacramento, 195.

Other counties reporting more  
than 100 new TB cases were  
Orange, 177; Riverside, 115;  
San Bernardino, 128; San Joaquin,  
148; San Mateo, 101; and Santa  
Clara, 127.

The Tuberculosis & Health  
Assn. of San Diego County, pub-  
lic, and private medical auth-  
orities are cooperating in a  
widespread effort to reduce TB  
cases. Each of the counties listed  
above is eligible for continuing  
federal aid to a nationwide pro-  
gram to wipe out TB, he said.

"Despite all our best efforts,  
without public knowledge and  
support, we cannot defeat TB,"  
Kerby said. "Christmas Seal  
contributions support public  
health education and informa-  
tion activities designed to coun-  
ter the widespread idea that  
tuberculosis is a thing of the past.  
"We hope our present cam-

aign will allow us to extend  
our efforts so that we may reach  
our final goal of removing tu-  
berculosis from our county," he  
said.

## Gallop Gossip

During the week we visited the Tolbert Horse Farm at 15341 Toya Ln. in El Cajon where they have some beautiful Arabs. One of these is a mare by Ronek and out of Manda and her name is Ronada. She is twelve years old and eight foals and is expecting a ninth. This year, a half-brother of hers, Maseyn was a National Top Ten gelding in halter and a Top Ten Park Horse. Ronada's sire Ronek, was bred by Kellogg's and was one of the few Arabians that was five-gaited. Herbert H. Reese in his book, The Kellogg's Arabians, said about Ronek, "An exhibition of this aged but still fiery stallion was given at the Cow Palace in San Francisco in which Ronek as a five-gaited horse, raked fast and brilliantly as well as doing his other gaits in proper form. His animation and action were outstanding." This stallion had many champions and working class winners.

The Tolbert's have three Arab stallions, one of which is Wittraff, a bay, by the Polish bred Witez 11, a very famous stallion that sired many champions.

Silver Frost, their two year old colt, is by Serdeyr and out of Ronada, the mare mentioned above. He is a beautiful gray and has a wonderful disposition like his sire.

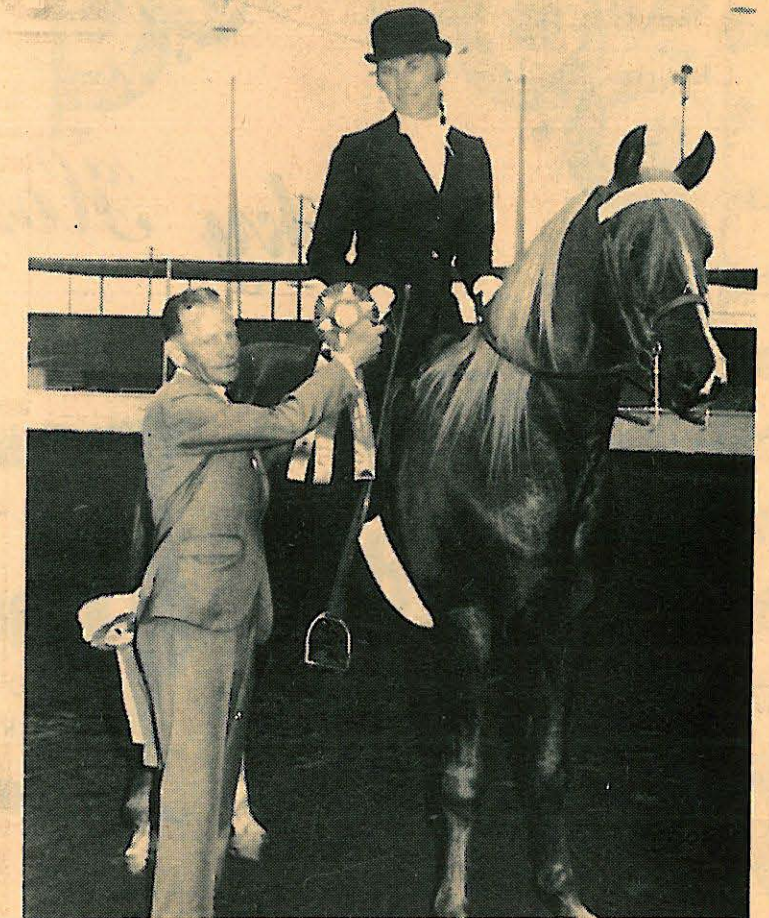
Third is Serdeyr, a bright chestnut with a flaxen mane and tail, by the International Champion stallion Serfix and out of Ganada by Hanad. Serdeyr's sire is Crabbet bred, and he has more champion get, by percent, than any other Arab. In 1962 Serdeyr was high point performance horse at Del Mar and at the Santa Barbara all Arabian show. In 1962 and 63 he was campaigned extensively throughout the western half of the United States and Canada. He was shown as a Western Pleasure Horse, Park Horse, and English Pleasure Horse. He won many championship and was often high point performance horse. In 1963 he led the Ural Centennial Parade and he was invited, and appeared in the Rose Bowl Parade. During 1964 and 1965 he was retired to stud.

This year he was brought out of retirement, and this summer at the Ridge Rider Show in Los Angeles, he won the English Pleasure Championship Stake; was fourth in the English Stallion class; was third in the Western Championship Stake and in the Western Pleasure Stallion class.

At the Del Mar Fair Horse Show, Serdeyr was reserve in the English Pleasure Championship Stake; he won the English Pleasure-Amateur Rider class; was second in the Western Pleasure-Amateur Rider Class; third in Western Pleasure, Limit; and fourth in the Western Pleasure Championship Stake. He was ridden this year by Chris Webb, in English, and by Hank Webb, in Western; they are from Bonita.

Serdeyr was in the Top Ten Pacific Slope, this year, and has never been out of the ribbons in the Regional Championships. He also qualified for the National Championships of 1966 and 67. Some of Serdeyr's foals have done very well at performance and halter. Two of his get that are doing good now in Park Horse classes are Serdan and Sercar.

We had a wonderful time at the Tolberts' and we hope to visit some other ranch or stable soon.



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
