







Fictitious Firm Name

BEEN LEGALLY REGISTERED?

The requirements of Section 2466 of the Civil Code, says "Every person and every partnership transacting business-under a fictitious firm name-must file a certificate stating the names in full and the place of residence of such person and the member or members of such partnership—such certificate must be published, once a week for four consecutive weeks."

If you have neglected this procedure, do you realize that the name of your firm is not protected and that you are not entitled to maintain suits for collection, or for other purposes, in the courts of the State of California?

Since we have all had the experience of paying our federal and state income taxes this nonth, it seems quite appropriate odiscuss a hot issue that is pending in the Legislature hat of a state withholding tax. Federal income taxes are colected through a withholding ystem of payroll deductions. he question before the Legisature is whether the same nethod should be adopted for ollecting state income taxes r whether we should continue o require a single, lump sum ayment due each April 15.

This subject is not a new one the Legislature. It was hotly ontested during the last year nd defeated. The proposal this ar is authorized by a minority arty leader but strongly opposed the administration. lere are brief arguments for

e witholding: Many people leave Calirnia before taxes are due each ar, thus escaping payment id adding to the tax bill of the st of us.

WATCH FOR ROCKS

Motorists travelling U.S. 80 (Interstate 8) in the Alpine area should be alerted to intermittent traffic delays effective 7 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. daily for the next three to four weeks.

The section of highway involved lies between Puetz Valley road on the west and Tavern Road on the east, a distance of approximately one mile. The possibility of large bold-

ers and rocks rolling down onto U.S. 80 while they are being removed for construction of the new freeway causes the intermittent delays. Flagmen and signing are being provided to help assist motorists through the construction area.

Mrs. Hawkins stated that we now have a Litter Ordinance to enforce but it is hoped the citizens will have a basic "Springtime Cleaning" urge and the places marred by litter or debris or poor maintenance will be corrected through a natural desire for a clean and gracious environment and appreciation for a desirable community appearance.

RATES INCREASE

An increase in international surface and airmail rates will go into effect Monday, May 1, acting Postmaster Haakon Magnussen announced today.

The new international rates. he said, will not apply to mailings for members of the Armed Forces overseas. Domestic postage rates are applicable to mail addressed through APO's and FPO's.

The rate increases for both surface and airmail - averaging 13% – were first proposed on January 14 and publicly confirmed on March 1. The Department explained at that time that they were needed to help offset a deficit of about \$16 million in international mail operations.

Specific information on the new international rates can be obtained from the service window at the post office.
