**I** WAS so intrigued by "Barbed Wire in Lake Isabella" by Jesse S. James in the February 1971 RELICS that I decided to do some fishing on my own. But instead of dipping in a lake for barbed wire as Jesse and his squaredancing friend did, I wet my line in an old small-town cistern for mementoes of the past.

the past. The "fishing" took place in Larned, Kansas, at the back doorsteps of my sister-in-law's home last April. On previous visits I had cast an envious eye on her old cistern pump and had taken pictures of it and noticed that it was made by the Star Bucket Pump Mfg. Co., of St. Louis, Missouri. The pump was no longer operable. The iron chain that lifted the little sheetmetal buckets of water to the pump's spout had rusted out, broken apart and fallen to the bottom of the cistern.

On our last visit in 1972 I figured that if Mr. James could fish in a lake for barbed wire I could try my hand at fishing this cistern right at home. What might I salvage from the depths if I fashioned a hook from a wire coathanger and lowered it with a carpenter's chalkline 16' to 18' below ground level?

and lowered it with a carpenter's chalkline 16' to 18' below ground level? I took the metal lid off the pump to begin my fishing and lowered my line between the upper wheel and the side of the pump. I soon hooked onto something. I was expecting part of the chain. Instead my hook was taken by an iron wheel about ten inches in diameter. Where had that come from? It lacked a center hub to fit an axle and looked like an old car rim.

Naturally, I could not get the wheel through the small slit; nor could I let it drop back for fear of cracking the cement liner at the cistern's bottom. What to do?

Finally I went next door and enlisted the aid of Frank Schraeder, a retired wheat farmer who had lived around one of these old cistern pumps in his younger days. Frank proved to be knowledgable. He explained what the wheel was. It did not have an axle but rested in the bottom turn of the chain. It had wide flanges and its weight held the chain and buckets in place. He showed me how to shift a couple of long flat bars at the


base of the pump so we could lay the whole pump over on its side. Now we could and did get the wheel out. I started fishing again for the chain. I hooked into it but could barely lift one end out of the water when my light chalk line broke. We pulled out the first section and I helped him pull out the remaining section—a sixteen-footer, half the length of the original one-piece continuous chain. We dragged both lengths across the

We dragged both lengths across the sidewalk onto the lawn where we could hose down the loose rust. Then we rolled up some of the chain and placed it against the pump to photograph it. On our next trip to Kansas I'd like to




NOTES FROM THE LIBRARY





## Judd's Mud Shows Love of Life by Glo Newton

Observing wildlife in its natural habitat is a pastime which is common to most back-country people; the tools sometimes used are binoculars,



LEATA JUDD watches wildlife with a wire tool and sponge in hand, for she is a sculptor. A long-time resident of Alpine, Leata still thrills to the sight of a covey of quail or to the sound of the barn owl's flight. She is definitely one who appreciates nature.

Living on 20 acres off of Victoria Drive enables the Judds to see many rare sights in the wilds. Leata relates one time when her guinea hens chased off several coyotes who had chicken for breakfast in mind.

Leata became interested in sculpting through her father's (ROGER MOORE) great talent for it. Mr. Moore used to walk in the woods and work the natural Alpine adobe, leaving it in various stages for Leata to find. As a man in his 80's now, Mr. Moore has shifted his interest from sculpting the Indian to his study of Early Man. Mr. Moore lives with the Judds now, and enjoys his grandchildren JODIE, 14, and DAVID, 19, who are still ar home.

In addition to studying with her father, Leata also worked with local artist BYRON RODARMEL. It was during this period that she did busts of painter and serigrapher JUSTIN GRU-ELLE of Litac Lane, and her father (pictured). She went on to study with STAN STEDT of La Mesa, where she learned more about sculpting the human form.

A product of Alpine Schools, Leata laughingly says, "If they don't know me, they haven't lived here very long! Since she hasn't exactly been in hiding during her time here, she's right. A past member of the Woman's Club, Leata has been a member of the Alpine Area Art Association for four years. She has taken that membership quite seriously, holding several offices, and volunteering her time at Chaparral Middle School for many hours in the fields of clay, dry flower arranging, leather, and other crafts. This she has done long after her offspring graduated from the school.

Renewing an old custom of having art exhibits in the Alpine Library, this month's display couldn't be more fitting than to begin with Leata Judd's sculptures. The tradition was started years ago when HOLGER A. O. NICO-LIASEN'S sister wished to establish a memorial for her brother. The monthly exhibit was moved to the Art Chalet when it opened. Present Art Association Exhibit Chairman PAT HOLMES felt a need to show creations that didn't hang well. Thus, the library exhibit was reborn.

Leata hopes to do some larger sculptures in the future. Her part in the Mountain Mamas' Muddery necessitates small work as well.

Librarian PHYLLIS WATTERS is justifiably enthusiastic about the new exhibit. I think you will be too; for Leata's figures are more than representational sculptures. They show a genuine respect for life at all levels.







#### WENDELL SMITH'S WORK DISPLAYED IN ALPINE LIBRARY

Pieces of broken glass, pitch forks, broken pottery, nails, all sound like junk, but to Alpine artist Wendell Smith they're the inspiration for works of art. A display of Wendell's work can be seen at the Alpine Library.

Each and every artistic piece has an interesting story that accompanies it. The "Owl" that peers down from the wall behind Mrs. WATTERS' desk is constructed from relic material collected by Mr. Smith years ago. The head of the owl is a pie safe panel he picked up in a New Mexico ghost town. Pie safes were cabinets with doors. On each of the paneled doors were perforated tin pieces. In the early days, pies were baked and put in the pie safes to cool and keep.

and keep. A piece called "Bandelier Pueblo Pottery Shards " has been created from bits of Indian pottery found when the Smiths were coming back from the cave dwellings 25 or 30 years ago. Wen-dell united the bits of pottery in a sand casting creating a heautiful wall papel casting creating a beautiful wall panel.

Wendell's interest in the old and the artistic has lead him down many interesting paths since his retirement from the San Diego Union Tribune. He now uses his artistic talents, an interest in writing and photography, to write art-icles on interesting collections and relics.

His work room may look like a junk pile to the average person but to Wen-dell it's the beginning of artistic expression.


#### ALLIE VIGNEAULT SHOWS DOLLS IN SAN DIEGO AND ALPINE

### RECYCLED REFUSE REAPS RESULTS

What is junk or trash to most people, is a possible article for creative work for BUD PREISSER, who is currently exhibiting some of his creative arrangements of natural combinations at the Alpine Library.

Bud's display which will remain in the library the month of May includes beautiful handcrafted birds made from redwood and sugar pine, a road runner with its nest of eggs, two small chairs made from buckwheat, and several other interesting creations.

Once you view this display you would think that Bud has been working on his hobby for a long time. However, only upon moving to the Alpine Village Apartments recently and having a lot of time on his hands has Bud begun to work with native materials and discarded items. Not since teaching handicrafts at the Denver Athletic Club prior to World War II had Bud had a chance to work on small crafts.

Long walks in the "south 40" as Bud calls the area behind the Village Apartments, led him to the old DAVIS home which had been condemned. On his first walks he brought home redwood pieces and sugar block window frames. "That's where it all started," explained Bud. "I started carving birds using different combinations of woods." With each walk, a different treasure is unearthed and brought back to his apartment workshop which is a 20" by 8" (Yes, inch) doorway storage area.

Bud's wife MARY says, "He kept bringing old wood home. I kept wondering what in the world he would do with it." But Mary is quite pleased and often makes suggestions for his work.

Not only does he make attractive hanging baskets outside, plaques and arrangements inside, but he has worked making chains. He has different sized molds, usually pieces of wood, to guag the size. Finding old pieces of wire or his walks Bud turns them into chains for hanging potted plants or lately he's been making copper bracelets, an old remedy for arthritis which many believ to be a cure. Bud has given chains to some of the Village residents and some of the recipients don't even take them off their arms.

Bud's life now is quite a bit differen than when he was working with the Grossmont High School District, Bud retired as a shop painter there years ago, sold his house and moved to Alpine. His fear of not being able to garden or keep busy has been replaced by his excitement of working on his new found hobby.


