

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ALPINE HISTORICAL SOCIETY TO CONTINUE THE NWF COMMUNITY WILDLIFE HABITAT PROGRAM

n May 1, 1998 the National Wildlife Federation certified Alpine as the 1st Community Wildlife Habitat in the nation. For several years prior to that date, Maureen Austin had worked tirelessly with the NWF to establish this program and to make sure that Alpine was the first community to be certified. To accomplish this, Maureen launched CHIRP for Garden Wildlife, Inc. a non-profit corporation "dedicated to the preservation and enjoyment of birds, butterflies and other creatures of habitat. through hands-on and interactive programs and gardens". For nearly two decades Maureen, her husband Wally, and a cadre of dedicated members and volunteers generously gave their time

and talent to maintain that "first in the nation" status. Many of you will remember the annual Sage and Songbirds Festival and the popular Monarch Mania program which made us all more aware of how we could create beautiful gardens in our own space while providing much needed habitat for winged wildlife threatened by suburban development.

In December 2015, after nearly two decades of service to our community, Maureen and Wally sold their Alpine home and retired to La Quinta, CA to be closer to their family. At the same time they dissolved the CHIRP organization and put out a plea for a person or organization in the community to take over the Community Wildlife Habitat Certification

program. We saw this as a great opportunity to fulfil the

"conservation" element of the Alpine Historical and Conservation Society's mission (see below) and the Board of Directors agreed. Maureen was delighted that the AHS was willing to continue the program and Patrick Fitzgerald of the National Wildlife Federation supported us as well. So, in 2016 the AHS will be launching



a new program to fulfill this challenge. There are so many avenues this program can take within our Historical Society—all of which will require committed and dedicated volunteers. 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FOUR MEMBERS RENEW FOR A LIFETIME

FRANKLIN R. BALL of JAMES H. CLELAND of GAIL WILSON GUTH of ANNE TARR

e are delighted to announce that four of our longtime supporters have renewed their memberships at the Life Member status. In December and January we added Franklin R. Ball, James H. Cleland, Dr. Gail Wilson Guth, and Anne Tarr to our Life Member recognition plaque at the History Society's John DeWitt Museum. Each of these individuals have very interesting life stories that include a special fondness for Alpine and the history of this mountain settlement.

Frank Ball, one of five children born to Dr. Howard and Elizabeth Ball grew up on the family ranch, which they called El Rancho Metate, located on Tavern Road. All five children eventually married and moved

away, but sister Olive Ball Wooldridge moved back to Alpine to live in the family home. Frank left Alpine in 1955 to continue his education in Salt Lake City. He later returned to the San Diego area and has been a long-standing member of the Alpine Historical Society. Frank volunteers at the Motor Transport Museum in Campo, where he helps restore vintage vehicles, including the first motorized "Julian Stage", a 1912 Mack vehicle that shuttled people from the train station in Lakeside to the town of Julian.

James Cleland has lived in Alpine for 35 years and has been a member of the Historical Society for several years. James is originally from Alexandria, VA and spent a lot of time on the east coast and elsewhere before moving to Alpine. A retired archaeologist, James has some fascinating stories to tell of traveling the world to uncover secrets of ancient cultures. He enjoys hiking and is planning to return to Virginia for a canoe trip later this year.

Dr. Gail Wilson Guth was born in Canada and moved to Alpine with her parents Gordon and Mava Wilson when she was 2 years old. Her parents and later her brother, Jack Wilson, operated the Alpine Store, aka The Wilson Store, in the center of town until 1964. Gail has fond memories of playing the piano at the "Little Brown Church" before the new sanctuary for the Alpine Community Church was built. One of her favorite teachers was Hazel Hohenshelt who

must have been quite an inspiration because Gail Wilson Guth became Dr. Guth when she earned her PhD in Educational Administration.

Anne Tarr has been on the Alpine Historical & **Conservation Society** Board of Directors for several years. Born into a military family in Michigan, she moved frequently in her growing up years. She remembers being in Hawaii during the attack on Pearl Harbor and being evacuated to the mainland shortly afterwards. You might recognize Anne as the person who demonstrates the Singer treadle sewing machine in the Nichols house each year for Alpine History Day. She has always been an accomplished seamstress, sewing clothes for her husband and children, and designing and creating amazing quilts, some of which are proudly displayed in her home. Two that are particularly memorable are the complex Labyrinth Quilt and the Sampler Quilt which incorporates Underground Railroad symbols, guiding slaves to freedom in the North.

It is a real pleasure to welcome these four new Lifetime Members. Their support, along with the support of all our members, helps keep the AHS a strong and vibrant community resource.

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We are grateful to David & Lori Fountain of Hitech Screen Science Co., longtime members of AHS, for generously donating their time and the materials to make our new Lifetime Member plaque, currently on display at the Nichols House.

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EUCALYPTUS TREE REMOVED

n December 2, the CM Precision Tree **Company** removed the 80-foot tall eucalyptus tree that posed a threat to the historic carriage house and caretaker's residence at the John DeWitt Museum. Although we don't know the age of the tree, we do know that roots of the tree had grown under the buiding's stone foundation, causing cracking and upheaval in the historic structure. Even though the tree was kept trimmed, periodically it dropped branches, causing concern that a large falling limb could damage the structure or could be catastrophic to occupants of the residence.

In true professional style, the CM Precision Tree Company dispatched a well-trained crew of experts along with a mobile crane and

giant chipper. While a skilled tree cutter worked overhead, roping and cutting the top branches, the ground crew monitored the work from below. Then, as the crane operator lowered the huge branches to the ground, the crew fed them into the chipper, creating a truck load of mulch that was hauled away. As the cutting progressed to the main trunk of the tree, larger sections were cut, lowered and then stacked on the truck for removal from the site. When the tree removal was complete, the crew cleaned up all the remaining debris, leaving the site clean and tidy with one very large stump cut nearly flush with the ground.

But the story doesn't end here. A few days later, Jim Beaty, owner of the **Bates Tree Service** called to say that his company would

donate the cost to grind out the stump, a procedure that minimizes regrowth from the old stump. Well, since we used our entire grant funding just to have the tree removed, this was a very welcome surprise. The labor and equipment for grinding the stump was provided by **Forest Stump**, a professional stump-grinder from Alpine.

We very much appreciate the professional and safe manner in which the staff of the CM Precision Tree Company and Forest Stump performed the work. Additionally, we wish to thank San Diego County for awarding the grant funds for this project, Baltazar Marquez for moving farm equipment and preparing the site, and Ky Blackledge, our neighbor, for allowing us to use his corral for staging the crane and chipping equipment.
