Walking the Pacific Crest Trail

"TRAIL TO A CURE" • Al O'Neal

Potluck Luncheon & Presentation, Sunday, February 19, 2017

he guest speaker for our February General Membership meeting is Al O'Neal, long-distance hiker and long-time Alpine resident, who will share his experiences hiking the Pacific Crest Trail in 2016. This will be an opportunity for us all to experience the awe-inspiring beauty of this majestic mountain trail through the eyes and camera of one who has walked there.

Al is a retired contractor and business man who has always been an avid camper and backpacker. He married DeeAnn in 1975 at Yosemite Valley, CA, and in 1980 they moved to Alpine. Here they raised two sons, Jordan

and Galen, and they now have two grandchildren with number three on the way.

Al was scoutmaster of Alpine' Boy Scout Troop 105 from 1996 to 2001, and while leading the scouts on a campout in the High Sierra he had his first serious thoughts about attempting a through-hike of the Pacific Crest Trail.

The Pacific Crest Trail is a long-distance and mostly natural wilderness path covering approximately 2,650 miles from the U.S. Mexican border near Campo, California to Manning Park, British Columbia, just about eight miles north of the U.S. Canadian Border. Few people attempt a through-hike on this trail, and even fewer succeed.



Al began his hike April 9, 2016 and pressed on until October 16 when blizzard conditions stopped him just short of the Canadian Border. He will complete the final 30-mile segment in 2017.

Why is it a "Trail to a Cure"? Al's granddaughter, 9-year-old Kalista, was diagnosed 3 years ago with Histiocytosis, a rare blood disease. Al's journey is not just a personal goal, but also a fundraising effort for the HistioCure Foundation, honoring Kalista's continuing battle against this disease.

The Alpine Historical Society and the Alpine Community lost a good friend and longtime Life Member on October 7,

2016 when Don Walker passed away at the age of 91. Don was a grandson of Fredrick B. and Bevie Walker who, in 1894, purchased 160 acres of land in the Viejas valley and soon thereafter established The Willows resort. Don was born at the Willows Ranch in 1925 and was preceded in death by his wife Maxine whom he called "The Love of my Life".

Don will always be remembered as a great story teller, and also for his generous nature. For many years he pulled the Society's float in Alpine parades with his Farmall Regular tractor. Over the years he donated many historical items to the Society, including the antique farm equipment which has been the centerpiece of our outdoor exhibits for as long as anyone can remember. In 2013 Don gave the Historical Society a pre-1906 "Doctor's Buggy" that was used at the



Willows Resort, making regular trips to the museum to check on the progress of our restoration efforts. On one of his trips, we were able to recruit him to help with sanding parts of the buggy.

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'n 1829, 21 year-old James Birch, a stagecoach driver from Providence, Rhode Island, moved to Sacramento to make his fortune in the California Gold Rush. But when he found that the cost of gold prospecting was much higher than he expected he put his skills to use by operating a stage line to transport passengers and supplies to the California gold mining sites. Within five years, his California Stage Company became the biggest and most far-reaching stage line in the state, serving every

TIMELINE ALPINE 1857–1860


part of northern California and extending as far south as Los Angeles.

In 1857, the US Post Office awarded Birch the first contract to deliver mail by an overland route to California. The new company, called the San Antonio & San Diego Mail. also transported passengers and baggage on their twice monthly service between San Antonio and San Diego. That same year Birch advanced funds to Cockney Bill Williams to create the *Viejas Stage Stop*, where the stage could be provisioned with fresh horses and mules, feed for the animals and some limited food and beverages for weary travelers. This earliest form of public transportation passed through the area that would eventually be called Alpine, crossing

the future site of Wright's Field and passing north of where the John DeWitt Museum currently stands, on its way down to Los Coches and San Diego.

Over the next three vears a series of misfortunes fell upon Birch's SA&SD Mail. During its first month of operations, lames Birch died on a steamer ship that ran aground during a vicious storm. His partner took over operation of the line, but expenses far outpaced income. So, piece by piece, the Postal Service cancelled his contracts and gave them to a competitor, the Overland Stage Company.

The **SA&SD Mail** sued Cockney Bill for settlement of his debts, which he was unable to pay due to loss of revenue from the stage line and from falling livestock prices. In 1860 the SA&SD Mail ceased operations in San Diego County and it would be nine more years before the first permanent settlers discovered this place we now call Alpine.
