














## The third day

The Cedar fire continued its advance, moving In from Descanso and Cuyamaca toward Julian. Officials evacuated more residents, and firefighters battled unfavorable weather conditions. Smoke and ash continued to fill the air throughout the county, and more residents were allowed to return to the ruins of their homes. By nightfall, the Battle for Julian had become a real but symbolic front, as firefighters worked to keep the wildfires from entering the community's historic downtown.
















